Horns in Regional Contest

Nursing Home Election Planned

Directors of East Coke County Hospital District announced this week plans to call a bond election to finance construction of a nursing home in Bronte. Present plans call for a \$250,000 issue to be used to build a 32 bed home for those who need nursing care. Tentative date for the election has been set for Jan. 15.

C. R. Blake, president of the hospital board, said this week he would like to emphasize that the entire \$250,000 may not be needed to build the nursing home and, in that event, the bonds would not be sold. The architect's estimate of cost for the complete project amounts to \$244,600.

Of this amount, \$167,000 covers actual cost of the building and the remainder of the estimated expense would be used for such items as a maintenance building and fence; paving, curbing and sidewalks; kitchen equipment; architect's fees and miscellaneous expense; financial advisor's fee; furniture and furnishings; and expense of landscaping.

The plans are designed to make it possible to add up to a total of 60 beds without requiring additional service facilities or personnel. Along with the rooms for 32 beds are dining and recreational facilities, treatment rooms, a service area and offices for administration of the home. The plans for the building are laid out in three wings, with 10 rooms in two of them and 12 in the third.

Necessary legal notices calling the election will be published at a later date, and will give all details in regard to the balloting. Officers of the hospital district include C. R. Blake, president; Matthew Caperton, vice president; Waymon Perciful, secretary; LeDrew Arrott and E. F. Glenn, members.

Pruitt Speaker At World Meeting

The Rev. Donald F. Pruitt, who is now serving as Secretary of Missions of the Baptist Missionary Association of Texas, will speak at the thirteenth annual Missions Symposium of the Baptist Missionary Association of America Dec. 3 and 4.

This association was formed slightly less than 20 years ago and is strongly evangelistic and missionary. There are now 58 missionary couples around the world in 16 different countries.

The annual meeting is held each year at the Temple Baptist Church in Little Rock, Arkansas, and is attended by several hundred persons from a number of states and foreign countries. Also featured on the program will be missionaries from Japan, Brazil, Uruguay, Guatemala, Portugal, Mexico and Bolivia discussing the various aspects of mission work in their respective countries.

Rev. Pruitt, who lives in Red Oak, has formerly pastored churches in Lamesa, Port Arthur, Jacksonville, Santa Anna and Talpa. He is married to the former Miss Noragene Taylor and they have three children.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Noah Pruitt Sr. of Bronte and is a graduate of Bronte High School.

Coach Cecil Toliver said Gerald Sandusky had a couple of good workouts this week, and Toliver said apparently all his charges have recovered satisfactorily from their night in the snow last Friday. "Our boys are in good shape and have a lot of enthusiasm worked up for this game," he added.

Proclamation Issued

Mayor Royce Lee has issued a proclamation naming Friday as "Bronte Longhorn Regional Championship Day." The mayor in his proclamation called on all Bronte citizens to support the team and attend the ball game. He noted the favorable publicity and good will brought to the Bronte community by this year's championship team.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said Bronte will be the visiting team and local fans will sit on the east side of the stadium. The Longhorns will wear white uniforms. Admission prices to the game will be \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for students.

The Longhorns will travel by school bus to Snyder and will leave at 4 p.m. followed by the band bus at 4:40. The team will eat at the American Restaurant in Snyder.

Superintendent Barbee said perhaps the best way to get to the Snyder stadium is to turn left on the street running south of the Scurry County Coliseum.

Radio Station KRUN, Ballinger, will run a live broadcast of the game for those who are unable to attend, and a re-broadcast will come on the air Saturday at 3:15 p.m. for those who would like to hear a re-play of the contest. KRUN also will tape the pep rally which will be held at 2:10 p.m., and will broadcast it at 4:30 p.m.

Crowd Needed

Coach Toliver said he hopes a large crowd of Bronte fans will be on hand for the game. "This will be the toughest game we've had all year and our boys need all the support Bronte fans can give them," he said.

To restore the non-stick quality to Teflon, scrub it with a plastic scrubber but never a metal pad or scouring powder.

Once a week scrubbing should renew both old and new types of Teflon finishes.

To remove unsightly stains and restore the utensil to an almost new look, use a special commercial cleaner designed for Teflon or use the following recipe:

In the utensil boil one cup water, a half cup household bleach and two tablespoons baking soda for 5 to 10 minutes or until the stain disappears. Wash pan thoroughly and "season" with oil. To "season" add oil and heat until warm and let set for one half hour at this temperature. Rinse and it is ready for use.

Christmas Toys

A well-designed toy costs no more than an ordinary toy but it is more valuable to a child.

Children's toys should be selected as carefully as any other purchase.

Look for toys that are washable, have no breakable parts, are sanitary, made of "safe" ma-

terials and do not have too many details.

Buy toys that let a child use imagination and creativity. He has plenty of both.

A child is interested in what he can do with a toy; a parent usually wants one that looks real.

Wooden blocks, stylized boats, trains, cars, some movable machinery, hand puppets, puzzles with large pieces, baby dolls and doll houses are good choices for young children.

Small children need toys that they can grasp easily. Older children are able to manipulate more complicated toys.

USE PLANTS FOR CHRISTMAS PRESENTS — For the individual who has everything, a potted plant for the home or office. It will be appreciated for a considerable period of time.

Martha Washington Chocolate Candy

Martha Washington Chocolate candy can be made now and kept until Christmas. They are liked by everyone. Chopped candied cherries may be added for variety.

- 1 Can flaked coconut
- 1 cup pecans, chopped
- 1 can sweetened condensed milk
- 1/4 pound soft margarine or butter
- 2 boxes confectioners powdered sugar

Blend all ingredients and roll by hand into small balls about 3/4 inch in diameter. Chill in refrigerator, (about 1 hour or longer). Insert toothpick into each ball and dip into chocolate-paraffin mixture to coat thoroughly, or two seasons work nicely.

Chocolate Paraffin mixture: Melt 1/4 pound paraffin and one large (12 ounce) package chocolate bits in a small sauce pan over low heat (10 to 15 minutes.) Use for dipping as directed.

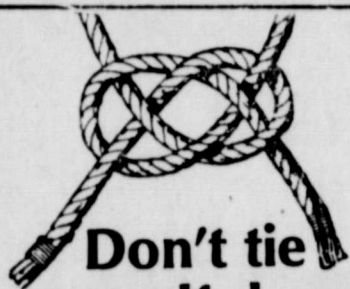

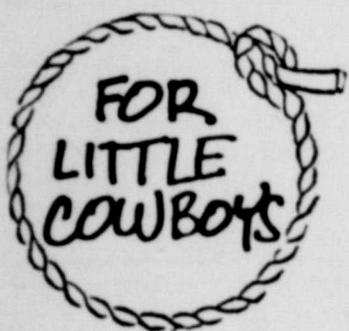

4th Period TD Gives Horns Bi-District Win

It was a real snow job last Friday night in Fort Stockton when the Bronte Longhorns defeated the Fort Hancock Mustangs, 7-0, in a bi-district football contest. Bronte's lone score came in the fourth quarter when Quarterback Keith McCutchen tossed a pass to Wingback Randy Barbee from about the 11 yard line. End Willie Zuniga's kick was good for the extra point. The big touchdown play was set up by an 18 yard scamper by Nicky Arrott.

The ball game was played in below freezing weather on a field covered with about nine inches of snow. The slippery surface and slippery football proved real problems for the Horns as they lost four fumbles and had trouble getting traction needed to run with the ball.

In spite of the weather, a good crowd of Bronte fans braved the

storm and backed the team. However, the cold did keep any sizeable number of Fort Stockton fans away from the game. Supt. C. B. Barbee said the net take home pay for the school amounted to only \$54.

The win gave the Longhorns the championship of Districts 7-B and 8-B and a berth in the regional playoff which will be held Friday at Snyder. The Longhorns will meet Sundown for the regional title.

First Quarter

Craig Miller kicked off to Jerry Graves to start the ball game and he was pulled down on the 28. On the first play from scrimmage a Bronte fumble was recovered by Jose Perez on the 43. Rudy Luera, the wheel horse for the Mustangs carried for a 1st on the 32. Luera and Quarterback Robert Galindo moved on downs to the Bronte 20

for another 1st. The Fort Hancock lads moved on to the 15 where the Bronte line held and there the Horns took over.

Arrott went through the middle for 4 and a penalty made it 2nd and 1. McCutchen kept for the 1st on the 30. Bronte drew a 5 yard fine making a 2nd and 15. McCutchen went for 8 yards and Arrott carried to his own 49 for another 1st. The next play was another fumble, however, and the Mustangs had the ball on their 45.

Luera did all the ball carrying to make a 1st on the Longhorn 45. Then the Mustangs bogged down and were faced with a 4th and 13. Miller punted a minikick to the Bronte 40.

McCutchen almost hit Zuniga with a long pass, but it was missed by inches. Arrott made sufficient yardage for a 1st, but a holding penalty made it 2nd and 25. McCutchen got trapped on the 3rd down trying to find a pass receiver, so Barbee had to punt. It was a 40 yarder and stopped kerplunk on the Mustang 42.

A pass to Miller was good for a 1st on the Bronte 40 and Luera made a couple as the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Luera made 3 yards and Daniel Loa added 1. Galindo then hit Miller with a pass good for a 1st on the 21. The Horns held on the next series and took over the ball on their 15.

After Arrott made 3 yards, a second down fumble was recovered on the 15, but a penalty allowed the Horns to retain the ball. The next play was a rerun, fumble and all, and without the penalty, so the Mustangs took over on the Bronte 22.

The Longhorns defense stood its ground, however and after four tries, the Mustangs had to let the local lads have the ball on the 21. A run by Arrott and a penalty against the Mustangs moved the ball to the Mustang 42 for a 1st down. Barbee carried for a couple of yards, then Arrott carried three times for 10 yards and a 1st on the 30. McCutchen looked for a receiver, but had to keep the ball and went to the Hancock 11 for another 1st down. On the next play, fumbleitis again attacked the Horns and they lost the ball on the Fort Hancock 10. A couple of running plays netted no yards and a 3rd down pass was intercepted by Bobby Skelton on the Mustang 25.

Bronte drew a 15 yarder for

clipping on 1st down, then big losses were racked up as the Mustangs got through to trap McCutchen on pass attempts. However the Horns continued their efforts on through 4th down since halftime was fast approaching.

The Mustangs got off a couple of plays and Skelton intercepted a pass on the try just before the end of the quarter.

Third Quarter

Zuniga kicked to start the second half of the ball game. Luera carried three times, starting from the 38, for 5 yards, then the Mustangs had to punt. It sailed to the 29 where the Longhorns took over.

Arrott made a couple of runs for 16 yards and a 1st on the Bronte 45. Arrott then picked up 6 and McCutchen went for the 1st on the Mustang 32. A pass to Jerry Graves was good for 4. Arrott added 2 and McCutchen went for the 1st on the 14. Bronte drew a 5 yard fine during the next series for delay of the game, and after 4 unsuccessful pass tries the ball went over to the Mustangs.

The Mustangs were unable to make the needed 10 yards and had to punt. It went to Arrott and he was downed on the Fort Hancock 45. Arrott ran a couple of times for 8 yards and Graves added 2 more for a 1st on the 35. McCutchen and Arrott both made 4 and McCutchen almost made the 1st down as the quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

McCutchen kept on the first play of the last period and made the needed short yardage for a 1st on the 22. Arrott lost 5 yards and McCutchen made it back plus another yard on 2nd down. The 3rd down try was a crucial play as McCutchen handed off to Arrott who went through a big hole in the middle to about the 3 yard line for a 1st and goal. However, on the next play most of the gain was lost as the Horns drew a 15 yarder for holding. With the ball on the 18 McCutchen threw to Barbee for 7 yards, then threw an incomplete pass. It was on 3rd down that McCutchen and Barbee made connection for the single counter of the night. Bronte finally had 6 on the scoreboard, and Zuniga's conversion was yet to come. It was good and the score was 7-0.

Zuniga's kick went to Luera who was tackled on his 35. After failing to make the needed 10 yards, Miller punted for the Mus-

tangs. It went to Arrott who carried it to the Mustang 25. A recovered fumble cost a couple of yards and McCutchen went for 1 on 2nd down. Two incomplete passes gave the ball back to the Mustangs on the 25.

Again, the Longhorn defense held tight and Miller had to punt. The short kick went to his 45 yard line. Arrott carried for 2 and a penalty was good for 5 more. Then Arrott went to the 34 for a 1st down. Arrott made 4 more yards, but Bronte drew a 15 yarder for holding. Faced with a 4th and 9, the Horns decided on a field goal try by Zuniga. It missed the mark but it didn't matter since a flag was thrown and Bronte was penalized 5 yards. Another 4th down play saw Barbee punting and the ball froze on the 5 yard line without a bounce.

A pass to Miller was good for a 1st on the 15. Another pass was intercepted by McCutchen on the Mustang 45, and the cold, weary Longhorns decided the prudent course was to run out the clock. McCutchen took the snaps and fell on the ball until the time was used up. Final score: 7-0.
