A doctor member of the Congress proposes that the Federal these programs before the coun-Government purchase annual insurance for each one qualified health care for its citizens. for medicare. He suggests that the Federal Government pay 85 per cent of the average \$400 health care expense and the State assume the balance.

Under this system, the dost to the Federal Government would be approximately \$1 billion more a year but would not be subject to unexpected escalation as is the present case. The proposal would actually intend to eliminate medicaid, which is a problem to the States, and to operate one program of medi-

The cost to those who contribute to Social Security for insurance would be .4 per cent of their taxable earnings. All other with salaries or earnings would pay on their income tax return. It is estimated that receipts from this source would total roughly \$2 billion annually which would go into a pool of funds from which the Social Security Administration would reimburse 90 per cent of medical expenses under a prescribed formula. Persons over 65, because they have medicare protection expenses, would apply to the extent of those actually paid by the individual in excess of 25 per cent of his gross income.

The present medicare program is heavily burdened with large administrative costs involving processing rather small claims. It takes about as much time and effort to work out a small claim as it does one for catastrophic or high cost illness.

The American Medical Association recommends a type of prepaid insurance shared by the Federal Government and the various States. Some hospital associations of which there are a number recommend a "group practice" system something like a mutual insurance arrangement. In fact there are a number already in operation-some on an experimental basis. The Kaiser Company operating in the north-

west States is the largest. Un- The Bronte Enterprise der this type of organization, individuals simply pay insurance in a group and the managers of the group contract with doctors and hospitals to take care of illness when it occurs.

Whatever changes may result from hearings now in progress there is no doubt about the need for some changes. Two very direct problems should be solved. ues to increase at a rate which will soon be beyond the reach of those who need it. The other is more efficiency at less cost to the government.

Since the Federal Government is in the health care business, difficulties in our health care along with the several States implementing medicaid, it is a matter of trying to find better answers and to try to improve try reaches a real crisis in

New Type Terrace The Bronte Enterprise Easier to Work

A new type terrace system for cropland is becoming more popular with producers in the Coke Soil and Water Conservation District. It is the level parallel terrace, designed to take the inconvenience out of farming terraced land, such as point rows.

A number of cooperators with the district have just recently put in parallel systems. John Dyess, north of Bronte, and Weldon Fikes, north of Robert Lee, have completed this week 44,000 feet. Luttrell Construction Co of Bronte was the contractor on the Dyess farm and Harmon Construction of Robert Lee did the work for Fikes.

This type of terrace is more expensive to construct than the regular level terrace, but does much more to increase the production of crops, and makes the field easier to work. The extra leveling and land farming between terraces gives a more uniform distribution of water, especially from rainfall of heavy downpours. This levelness helps to reduce erosion and movement of soil between tertaces. Following heavy rains, parallel terraces also have the advantage of practically eliminating the dry and wet spots that usually occur in fields that have regular terrace systems.

Both Great Plains and ACP cost share programs are available in Coke County for construction of parallel terraces. Staking and checking out assistance can be obtained by contacting the local Soil Conservation Service office.


