health care expense health care expense and
State assume the balance.
Under this system, the cast to the Federal Government would be approximately $\$ 1$ billion more a year but would not be subject to unexpected escalation as is the present case. The pitposal would actually intend eliminate medicatd, which is problem to the Statek, and to operate one program hof medicare.
The cost to those who contribute to Social Security for insurance would be 4 per cent of their taxable earnings. All other with salaries or earn ings would pay on their income tax return. It is estimated that receipts firmm this source would total roughly $\$ 2$ billion annually which would go into a pool of funds from which the Social Security Administration would reimburse 90 per cent of medical expensels under a prescribed for mula. Persons over 65, because they have medicare protection expenses, would apply to the ex tent of those actually paid by the individual in excess of 25 per cent of his gross income.
The present medicare program is heavily burdened with large administrative costis inwolving processing rather small claims It takes about as much time and effort to work out a small claim as it does one for catastrophic or high cost illnesk
The American Medical Association recommends a type of prepaid insurance shared by the Federal Government and the va rious States. Some hospital associations of which there are a number recommend a "group practice" system something like a mutual insurance arrangement In fact there are a number already in operation some on an experimental balsis. West States is the largest. Undividuals simply pay insurance in a group and the managers of the group contract with doctors and hospitals to take care of illness when it occurs.
Whatever changes may result from hearings now in progress from hearings now in progress
there is no doubt about the need for some changes. Two very direct problems should be solved The cost of health care dontinues to increase at a rate which will ssoon be beyond the reach of those who need it. The other is more efficiency at less cost to he government.
Since the Federal Government is in the health care butsiness, along with the several stat implementing medicaid, it is matter of trying to find better nswers and to try to improve hese programs before the coun health care for its citizens.

very short period of time, thit very short period of time, thin
has become one of the most highly productive opeating units in the district. Adapted conservation practices are established for all fields and pastures. Two conservatilion pas- p.ac-
tices not generally used by produces not generally in used by pro-
duce district are being caldied out to increase production. Fertilizer has been applied to all fields and pastures accord-
ing to needs of the soil as indicated by soil analysis. They are making full use of water stored in a small flood ciant:ol retardnorth side of the farm. This supplemental irrigation water has helped to establish field erops and pasture grasses. for hay and grazing on about 70 acres.
