## Primary Election Saturday

Saturday is election day and Bronte citizens will watch with keen interest two contested races: commissioner and justice of the peace for precinct 2. No other local races are contested.

Bobby Vaughn and Jesse Parker are seeking the commissioner position being vacated by Howard Brock. Earl D. "Pete" Nutter is seeking reelection as justice of the peace and is being opposed by Cecil Kemp.

### Use Care in Voting

Voters are urged by party officials to use care in voting. This year's ballot is like the one used two years ago, in that squares by candidate's names have to be marked with an "X" in order for the vote to count.

The old method of scratching out names of candidates a person is voting against will only cause the ballot to be thrown out.

Special caution is urged when a voter wants to vote for a candidate who has no opponent. The box by the candidate's name must have an "X" placed in it for the vote to count.

### State Contests Few

In state races, a hot contest has developed between Senator Ralph Yarborough and Lloyd Bentsen for the senate seat now held by Yarborough.

Attorney General Crawford Martin has an opponent in David H. Brown of Sherman. Fred Williams and Bob Armstrong are going after Jerry Sadler's job as Land Commissioner.

Ben Ramsey has opposition in Connie Lawson. Three candidates

are seeking a place on the Supreme Court of Texas. They are Matt Davis, James G. Denton and Hawthorne Phillips. A vacancy on the Court of Criminal Appeals is being sought by Earl Smith of San Angelo and Truman Roberts of Hamilton.

Unopposed candidates in the county include W. W. Thetford, county judge; Mrs. Winnie Waldrop, county and district clerk;

The 440 yard relay team is made up of Nicky Arrott, Randy Barbee, Bobby Skelton, Donnie Thompson and Willie Zuniga. The lads qualified for state by taking second at the regional meet in Lubbock with a 45.0. The Horns were outrun only by Jayton who had a 44.7.

Nicky Arrott took second place in broad jump, also, with a 20-0¾, and will go to state in that event.

Austin—Experts on moods of voters think that fewer than half of the 4,100,000 Texans who registered to vote will take part in the primaries, Saturday.

Precinct conventions, also slated for both parties Saturday, haven't produced a ripple of controversy.

Since there is no contest for the governorship in the Democratic primary for the first time since primaries were begun, less attention is being given to statewide races. The Texas Election Bureau is estimating that 1,800,000 Democrats will vote.

Main attention has been going to two contested races. Lloyd Bentsen Jr. of Houston is trying to oust Sen. Ralph Yarborough. State Rep. Bob Armstrong of Austin and Fred Williams of Houston are trying to defeat Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler.

The Yarborough-Bentsen race has proceeded at a fairly cool level.

Little attention has been paid to the effort of David Brown of Sherman to defeat Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin, or to the campaign of Connie Lawson of Taylor against Railroad Commission Chairman Ben Ramsey.

Lawyers are taking an active part in the two high court races. Hawthorne Phillips of Austin, Judge Matt Davis of Texarkana and Judge James G. Denton of Lubbock are seeking an open seat on the Texas Supreme Court. Judge Truman Roberts of Hamilton and Earl Smith of San Angelo are candidates for an open place on the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Other statewide offices are uncontested.

Saturday's Republican primary is expected to draw about 150,

000 voters. U. S. Representative George Bush of Houston is favored to win the U. S. Senate nomination over Robert Morris of Plano. It is Bush's second try for the Senate. Paul Eggers of Wichita Falls, although he was ill and unable to campaign for nearly two weeks, is favored over Roger Martin of Gainesville in the gubernatorial race. It's Eggers' second race for governor.

**TUITION RAISE PROPOSED**—Coordinating Board of Texas College and University System is urging legislation to boost tuition fees in senior institutions from \$50 to \$125 a semester.

Spokesmen said students should pay at least 25 per cent of the cost of education, and that is what the tuition hike would produce.

Board at the same time postponed action on a staff recommendation that it place new enrollment ceilings for the University of Texas at Austin (35,000) and for Texas A.&I. at Kingsville (7,500).

Private and independent college spokesmen, meanwhile, called on the board for aid, including a "tuition equalization program" to place them in a better competitive position with tax supported schools.

Tuition recommendation calls for \$500 a semester fee for out-of-state students. Junior college local boards would set their own tuitions but not at more than 75 per cent of senior college fees for in-district students or 90 per cent for out-of-district enrollees.

**GRANTS APPROVED**—Gov. Preston Smith approved a \$124,996 grant to the Kleberg County Community Action Committee in Kingsville.

Grant involves \$4,169 in unexpended funds, making a total of

\$129,165 for a 12-months program beginning May 1. Bulk of the funds will go to Neighborhood Service Centers.

Smith earlier approved a \$10,090 state regional planning assistance grant to the Golden Crescent Council of Governments. Council serves Lavaca, Jackson, DeWitt, Goliad, Victoria and Calhoun Counties. It is based in Victoria and includes eight cities and seven special purpose governments.

Texas Criminal Justice Council, meanwhile, announced it has \$4.6 million available in action grant money to strengthen law enforcement. Money will be used by the state and allocated to units of general local government to fight crime and improve police work.

**CONSERVATION GROUP MEETS**—New Texas Conservation Foundation was charged by Governor Smith to work toward providing the state with a top system of parks, scenic points, refuges, scientific and recreational areas.

This Foundation was authorized by the Legislature last year to facilitate state acquisition of lands by gift or purchase and to accept money or property for parks, educational and scientific purposes.

Smith urged the group at its initial meeting here to function as the "strong right arm" of governmental departments and particularly the Parks and Wild-

life Commission.

Foundation named Glenn Biggs, formerly of Abilene, chairman, Reagan B. Cates of Victoria as vice chairman and Ralph D. Churchill of Dallas to head a committee mapping definite projects for the group to undertake.

**WHEN DISASTER STRIKES**—Texas National Guard units drew high praise for aid in the storm-hit communities of the South Plains.

Guardmen drew special commendations for duties in Plainview, Whiteface and Whitharral. About 300 were assigned to security, search, rescue work and traffic control.

Governor Smith notified all state agencies to stand by, and prompt requests for a federal disaster act were made.

State Department of Public Welfare set up an emergency food and medical program for tornad-stricken Plainview.

**EXPLOSIVES**—Texas is one of 32 states where anyone can freely buy dynamite from anyone willing to sell it to him, but state and national officials are trying to put a stop to such easy access to the high explosive.

There is a state law to stop sales or possession of bombs or dynamite, but the list of exemptions to the law is so broad that almost anyone can fit as a legal dynamite buyer. Attorney General's office is working on a

law to curtail the sale of explosives. Proposal will be submitted to the next session of the Legislature.

A bill is in Congress, supported by the Nixon Administration, that also would pose a federal ban on possession.

Dr. John Kinross-Wright, commissioner of mental health and mental retardation, has resigned his position.

University of Texas at Austin President Norman Hackerman has resigned his position, and will become president of Rice University on Sept. 1.

Governor Smith approved establishment of a residential manpower center in El Paso.

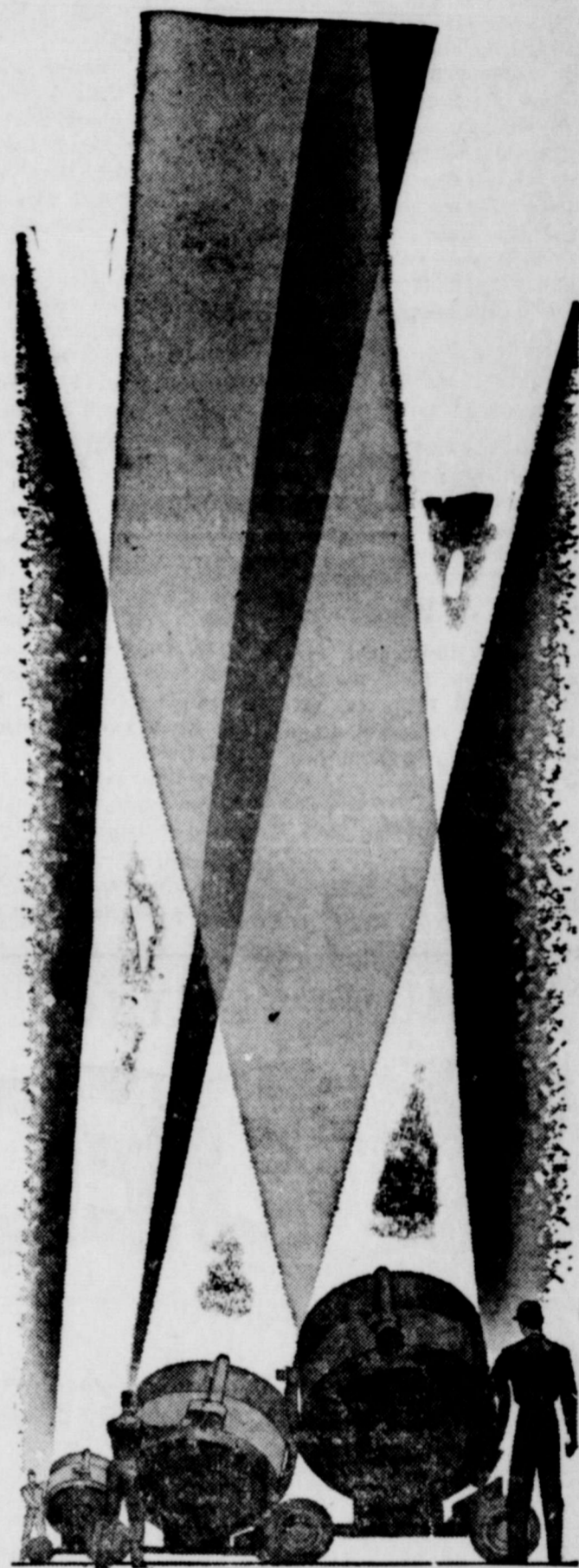

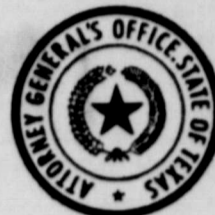

## Doug McCutchen Breaks Into Top Ranks in Texas Tech Football

The following column was written recently by Burle Pettit, a sports writer for the Avalanche-Journal of Lubbock. It concerns a Bronte lad who holds a special place in the hearts of Bronte citizens, and most especially, Bronte football fans. The column is being reprinted in full, since we felt our readers would be more than interested.

He didn't say it in so many words, but you could tell Doug McCutchen was a little disappointed.

Spring training's first workout had just been completed, and he sat alone in silence along one wall of the dressing room. Elsewhere, the area was filled with the usual noises, horseplay and loud voices that mark the end of a hard day's work.

A bypasser paused in front of Doug, usually a very polite and very refined youngster, and quipped: "Bronte was never like this, eh Doug?"

"Bronte," McCutchen replied, almost tersely, "was a long time ago."

It had been that kind of day. Doug McCutchen, just over two years ago, had been the whiz-bang of Class B football. His senior year at Bronte, the stocky lad had galloped for almost 1,700 yards, and during his four year career, he personally had scored better than 600 points.

In a single game, a bi-district clash with Fort Hancock his junior year, Doug scored six touchdowns and rushed for over 600 yards.

Following his senior season, recruiters beat a trail to his door. The greatest Class B player since Kenneth Hall of Sugarland in the early 1950s, they all agreed.

"He's the best high school running back I've ever seen," said Grant Teaff, then a talent searcher for Tech.

Bronte, a village in Coke County, suddenly was famous for something other than the bass crop at Oak Creek Lake. Coaches from practically every Southwest Conference school, plus Oklahoma, plus Nebraska, plus a number of others found it.

Soon after signing day, McCutchen chose Tech and the South Plains lifted its eyebrows in anticipation.

Doug's freshman season had been good, but not sensational. That spring, he didn't match up to guys like Jimmy Bennett, a seasoned veteran, and Miles Langenhennig, a sensational freshman, and autumn's dawning saw McCutchen join the redshirt troops. He just wasn't ready.

"I was disappointed, of course," Doug recalls. "But I can see now that I had a lot to learn. In high school, I could go half speed and still get six yards. I never had any trouble turning the corner."

"Then, when I got here, I found that everybody was so much faster. I no longer was able to breeze wide, then sail upfield. I had to learn North-South running."

Spring training opened this year, and once more McCutchen had high hopes. He had served his hitch with the varsity's practice fodder and he was ready to play football.

Then here, on the first day of workouts, he found himself on the fourth team. Tomorrow would be worse. The second day of the spring, he was moved down to No. 5.

McCutchen wasn't happy. But his determination outweighed his disappointment, and his self-confidence never broke stride.

He rocked along as Tech's No. 5 fullback throughout the week. That Saturday, then, the Raiders gathered for their first game-condition scrimmage of the spring.

It was an unusual format. At one end of the field, the top two units, offensively and defensively, commanded the spotlight. Almost unnoticed at the opposite end were the threes, the fours and the fives.

While cameras ground away a recorded account of the Top Twos, the remainder at the opposite end banged away, virtually anonymous. Anonymous, that is, except to Jim Carlen.

After a bit of watching the scrubs, Carlen returned to the Prime End of the field. With him was Doug McCutchen.

"Get in there, son, and let's see what you can do against that

crowd."

Doug carried twice in a row and, in two thrusts, covered 40 yards. His second carry went in for a touch, and in his wake was a line of broken tackles.

That day he became No. 2, and he's gotten stronger and better and quicker with each workout.

"The thing that has helped me more than anything," Doug now explains, "is something Coach (Art) Baker tells us constantly. That is to concentrate on breaking the first tackle. I have found this gives me a focal point of concentration. Before, I was trying to remember too many things at once, and it made me indecisive. Now, I am running more by instinct."

Baker, Tech's offensive backfield coach, admits now that he almost "blew one" where McCutchen is concerned.

"I looked at his 40 yard speed, and I looked at him," Baker said. "I just figured he was another one of those little ol' stocky backs that don't have much ability. You always have one or two of them."

"Then I started seeing him running over people and past people. What he lacks in speed he makes up for in quickness and thrust. He's a good one."

Bronte suddenly doesn't seem so long ago. Not even to Doug McCutchen.

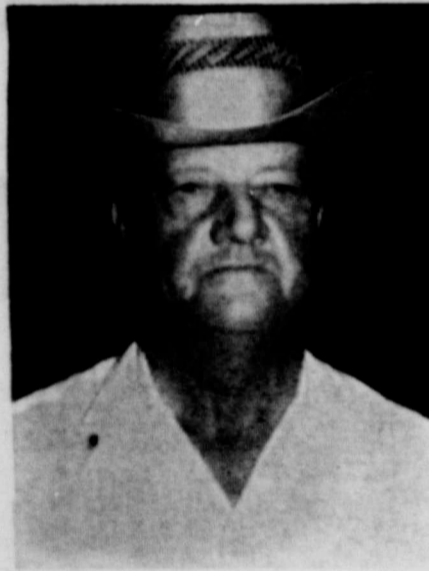
