

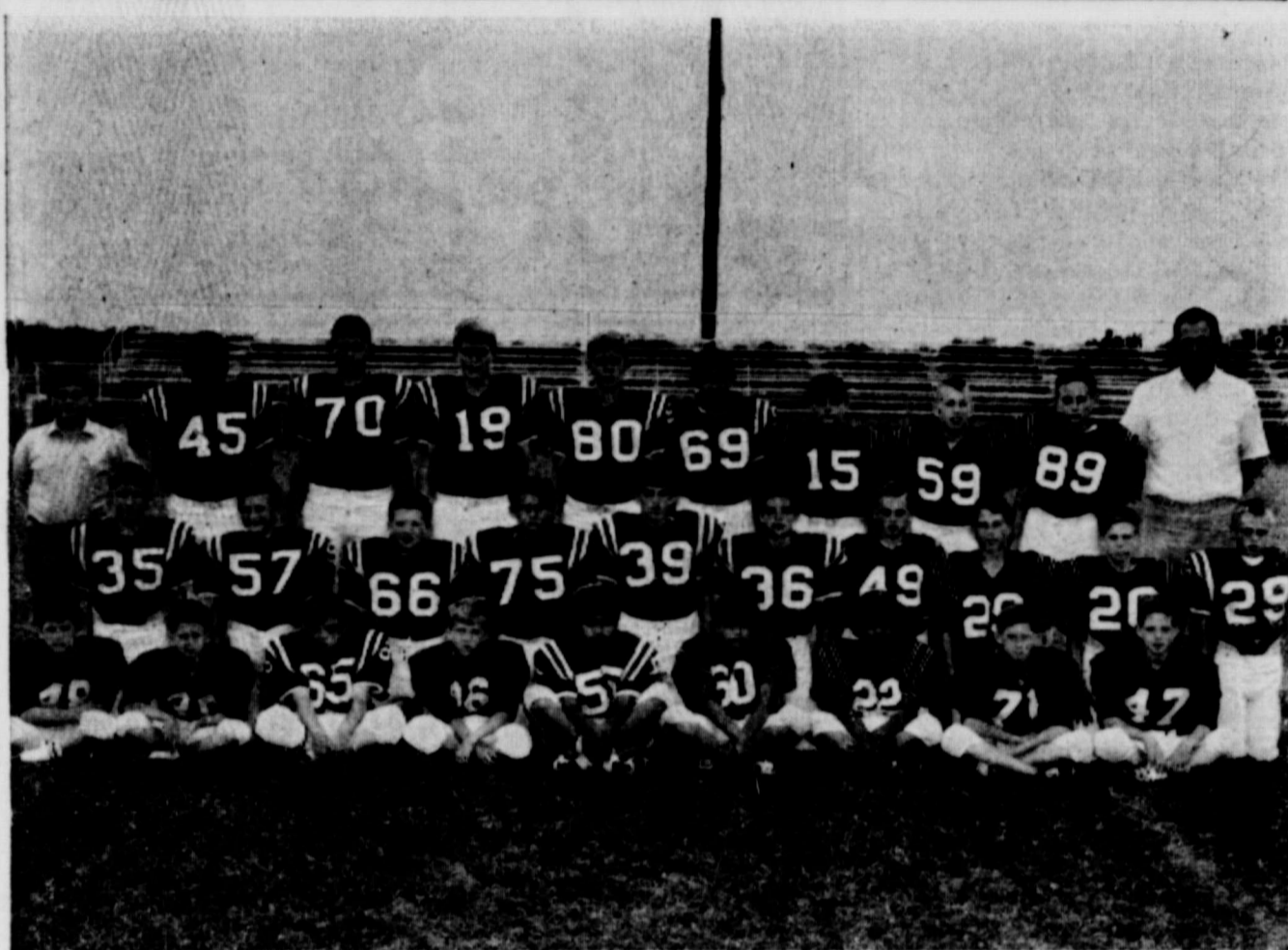

The Bronte Shorthorns were on their way to Eden Thursday at press time to wind up their 1970 season in a game with the big Bullpup team. Kickoff time was 6 p.m.

### Band to Take Part In Homecoming At Angelo State

The Bronte Longhorn Band will go to San Angelo Saturday where they will take part in homecoming activities at Angelo State University. They will participate in a downtown parade at 2 p.m. and will be guests of the university at a 7:30 p.m. ball game.

Twelve area bands will take part in the halftime activities at the football game, and the Longhorn Band will compete against other Class B bands who are participating in the homecoming for a \$100 scholarship and a trophy. Other Class B bands who will be on hand are Eden, Roby and Santa Anna.

#### Get Division III

The local band received a Division III (good) rating at the UIL marching contest Wednesday in Sweetwater. Twirlers did somewhat better than the entire band, with Sallie Richards receiving a Division I (superior) rating and Dawn Cumbie and Diane Arrott receiving a Division II (excellent) rating.

The Shorthorns are completing a very successful season and went to Eden with a 4-1-1 record. They have defeated Wall, Eden and Robert Lee, tied Robert Lee in the first game of the season and suffered one defeat to the Roscoe Clodhoppers.

#### Down Robert Lee

Last Thursday night, in their final home game of the season, the Shorthorns trounced the Robert Lee Eagles, 16-0. Both counters were made in the first half.

The first six points were made by Nelson Coulter on a 1 yard run. The ball was placed on the 1 after a 35 yard pass play from Alan Barbee to Jim Dan Raughton. The second counter was on a 5 yard carry by Louis Martinez. Barbee ran both conversions for the 4 extra points.

Coke County went along with the majority of Texas voters Tuesday when they voted better than three to one for all the Democratic candidates on the ticket. The general election was held all over the country and results dashed hopes of the Republican administration for a majority in the U. S. Senate.

Texas was one of the main plums sought by the Republicans into the campaign of George Bush against Democrat Lloyd Bentsen. Coke County gave Bentsen 681 votes to 227 for Bush.

Gov. Preston Smith had a whopping big 715 votes to 212 for Paul Eggers, the Republican can-

didate. Other candidates in the Republican column of the ballot received even fewer votes than did these two for the two top races in the state.

#### 3 Amendments Carry

Three of the seven proposed constitutional amendments carried in Coke County: No. 1 which relates to the removal of judges under certain circumstances; No. 3, which provided for assessment of agricultural lands on a basis of productivity; and No. 6, which provided for increase of homestead exemption from \$5,000 to \$10,000.

### Deposits, Loans Show Increase At First National

Deposits and loans are up from a year ago at First National Bank in Bronte. This information was revealed in a state of condition which is being published in this week's Enterprise.

Deposits were up \$160,374.43, from \$2,911,527.81 on Oct. 21, 1969, to \$3,071,902.24 on Oct. 28, 1970.

E. F. Glenn, executive vice president of the bank, said the main thing he attributed the increase to was the initiation of a savings account and time deposit program.

Loans on Oct. 28 amounted to \$1,433,804.86, compared to \$1,192,211.70 a year ago, for an increase of \$241,593.16.

Total resources reflected the upward trend with a figure of \$3,562,799.47 on Oct. 28, compared to \$3,355,065.53 in October of last year, an increase of \$207,733.94.

Capital accounts approached the half million dollar mark, with \$50,000 capital stock, \$150,000 in the surplus account and \$200,897.23 in undivided profits, for a total of \$400,897.23.

## Horns To Meet Wall In District 6-B Game

The Longhorns will face a tough outfit when they go to Wall Friday night for next to the last ball game of the 1970 season. The Hawks have an enviable season record of 6-0-0 for 205 points to their opponents' 18.

They have played only one district game when they defeated

The Horns need a win and it would certainly be a feather in their cap if they could hold the powerhouse of District 6-B to a low spot on the scoreboard.

The Wall-Hawley contest was the only one played last week in the district. Only other game on schedule Friday night is a district contest with Jim Ned going to Hawley.

Austin — With the next legislative session just two months off, a blue ribbon speaker's committee has set out to evaluate the jobs of state lawmakers and how they can better perform their duties.

First meeting of the 150-member panel named by House Speaker Gus Mutscher and headed by Waggoner Carr, former attorney general, was held at the capitol last week.

One of the first things Mutscher suggested was a study of the work load heaped on officials who draw only \$400 a month base pay. Committee is expected to come up with a recommendation and support for legislators' pay raises.

Mutscher asked the group to give special attention also to legislative facilities, ethics and internal security.

He further suggested a look at steps now taken to assure protection for orderly conduct of the state's business at the capitol and "physical protection" of

state officials, employees and the public.

Mutscher said both houses of the legislature will hold a pre-session conference at Lyndon B. Johnson School of Public Affairs at the University of Texas.

Carr ruled out the study of such matters as annual legislative sessions and abuses by joint conference committees, since the committee was named by the House speaker and was not authorized by the Senate.

Four sub-committees were named and immediately began work. Sub-panels will work in areas of duties, responsibilities and compensation; ethics and standards of conduct; physical facilities and internal security.

BAPTISTS RELEASE SCHOOL — Baptist General Convention here approved the request of Baylor Dental School at Dallas to be released from church control so it could accept government financial aid.

Convention called on the University of Corpus Christi to repay a \$500,000 loan it received from the federal Small Business Administration to repair Hurricane Celia damage and borrow from a non-governmental source.

Delegates adopted resolutions commending national leaders for their spirit of peace to end the Vietnam hostility; urging courts to use discretion in dealing with each marijuana case on merits; and opposing grants of tax funds to parochial schools.

INSURANCE AD RULES PROPOSED — State Board of Insurance set a Nov. 30 hearing on proposed new rules governing advertisements by health insurance companies.

One rule would require a clear and conspicuous statement in ads of any waiting periods between the date of the policy and the time it actually provides coverage.

Another rule would make the same kind of clear disclosure necessary where coverage is limited for illnesses caused by conditions existing before policy date.

Suggested rules would apply to all newspaper ads, as well as radio-tv, billboards, leaflets, form letters and recurring representations by agents.

Companies would have to maintain a file of ads for inspection by examiners representing the State Insurance Board.

COURTS SPEAK — State Supreme Court set a Dec. 9 hearing on a Houston area welder's

accidental "injury" suit which intermediate court held showed evidence of occupational disease (siliosis).

Federal District Court here postponed until Nov. 12 a hearing on the San Antonio Conservation Society's suit to bar construction of San Antonio North 281 Expressway.

HIGH COST OF CAMPAIGNING TOLD — U. S. Senate candidate George Bush topped all spending by general election candidates, according to required reports filed with the Secretary of State. Bush said he has spent \$696,008 and received \$665,708 in contributions.

Gov. Preston Smith said he has spent \$652,860 and received \$534,651 in contributions. His Republican opponent, Paul Eggers, reported spending \$409,028 and receiving \$312,661.

JUSTICE PLANNING FUNDS RECEIVED — Texas Criminal Justice Council received final approval of its 1971 block planning grant, totaling \$1.2 million.

Money will be spent for statewide planning to improve the criminal justice system. Forty per cent of funds will go to local governmental units.

Texas will receive a block action grant of \$19 million for fiscal 1971 from the Department of Justice to support action projects in the field over the state.

STATE SECURITIES BOARD ENJOINS CHURCH — Deputy Securities Commissioner Roy Mauer has issued an order enjoining the Trinity Baptist Church of Austin from selling any type of securities.

Order said the church kept misleading, inaccurate and incomplete records. Also that Pastor R. D. Wade had been loaned \$25,000 in bonds on an unsecured non-interest bearing note which church members had not approved.

Wade had used \$18,000 of the bonds, according to the order, to purchase a motel in his own name. Eight series of bonds are outstanding, some of them default.

According to Mauer's order, the Board, as of Oct. 22, did not have the funds necessary to pay the interest and principal due Nov. 1.

Bonds were being sold to the public through Fred Matthews of Nationwide Church Bonds, Inc. of Birmingham, Ala., but Matthews was not registered in Texas as a security dealer, as required by Texas law.

WARNING ISSUED — Parks and Wildlife Department has issued warnings against using as food or water containers any of the one gallon DDT cans which recently washed up on the beach near Port Isabel.

Short Snorts Attorney General Martin has held that the State Health Department and Nursing Home Licensing Board could privately exchange confidential information.

New bank applications have been filed for Adlington and San Antonio.

Autos with inspection stickers numbered 11 must be reinspected this month, "12's" in December.

One hundred and eighty-six political subdivisions were required to buy \$103,674 worth of unnecessary coverage to get needed liability insurance, Dallas Sen. Oscar Mauzy has charged.

Construction was on the increase last month and the outlook for building in early 1971 is bright, says the UT Bureau of Business Research, which also advises that personal income in Texas rose three per cent in September.

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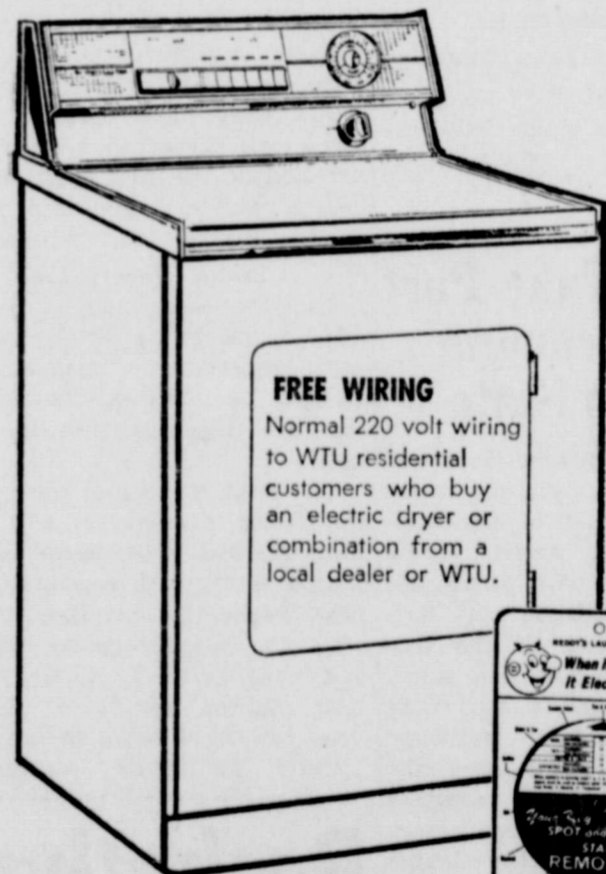
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**BLACKWELL LOSES GAME TO HIGHLAND, 63-36**

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# H D Agent's News Dept.

Christmas gift buying time is here so some help in selecting home appliances might help you to be a better Santa! Home appliances are very popular gift items on special occasions as well as Christmas. The following guidelines should be helpful to you in selection of gift items or small appliances for yourself:

Buy appliances from a reputable dealer. If not familiar with a dealer, call the local Better Business Bureau or Chamber of Commerce for information about the reputation of a business.

Shop in more than one store, comparing prices not only between stores but between brands as well. Be familiar with the manufacturer of the brand.

Choose an appliance which meets the family's needs and which contains features the family plans to use. Remember that an appliance intended for several years of service will require future needs. Choosing features and the price range directly relates to frequency of use.

Consider the construction of the product, noticing whether it will be easy to clean. Controls should be clearly marked, conveniently located and easy to manipulate. Heat resistant material handles, controls and base or legs are important for protection of the work surface. An Underwriters' Laboratories symbol on the appliance indicates that it meets certain standards for electrical safety.

Check the availability of service and replacement parts. Study the guarantee to learn just what is guaranteed, who is responsible for carrying out the terms of the guarantee and how long the guarantee is in effect.

Study the owner's manual before buying, asking questions about operation if necessary. After purchasing the appliance, read the manual thoroughly before operating, and refer to it as often as necessary until completely familiar with the operation of the appliance. Keep the manual as long as the appliance is in use.

If the appliance is used as a gift, make the receiver aware of importance of studying the manual and if required, sending in the guarantee slip that accompanies some appliances.

### Carpet Tiles

Carpet tiles, a new attraction in floor covering, is one of the easiest and most fashionable ways to add a dab of color and style to any room of the house.

Easy to install, do it yourself carpet tiles offer the average consumer a soft floor covering at attractive prices, and the tiles come in a variety of colors and patterns. They can be used as floor coverings, wall coverings, decorations, flower designs, outdoor mats, toy chest linings, coat covers, coverings for interiors of station wagons and boats—just about anything the consumer dreams up.

Home improvement centers, hardware stores and lumberyards are the major distributors of carpet tiles, but department stores are also beginning to carry the popular furnishing item.

The tiles were first introduced in 1966 and were made only by needlebonded olefin. Now they are manufactured by the tufting and flocking processes, making them more versatile for consumer use. The tiles are made from polyester, nylon, polypropylene and other yarns. Shag tiles have become the most popular style.

The most popular size tile is

9 by 9 inches, but they are also available in 18 by 18 inches and sell for about 68 cents per square foot.

## Alcohol, Minors Don't Mix Legally

County Attorney Frank C. Dickey has forwarded a letter to concerned county officials outlining some of the laws of Texas regarding possession and consumption of alcoholic beverages by minors.

Receiving the letters were Sheriff Melvin Childress, Judge W. W. Thetford, Justice of the Peace Roy P. Fites, Justice of the Peace Earl D. Nutter and Deputy Sheriff Grady Coulter.

Penalty upon first conviction of a minor for purchase, possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages is \$25 to \$200, and for subsequent convictions, \$100 to \$500.

Conviction for purchasing for, giving to or knowingly making available alcoholic beverages to a minor by an adult carries a fine of \$100 to \$500.

There are certain exceptions to these laws, including the giving of alcoholic beverages to a minor by a parent or legal guardian, or adult husband or wife.

Judge Nutter said he would like for these penalties to be presented to readers of The Enterprise.
