### Woman and Son Killed in Wreck

A young Abilene woman and her small son were killed early Thursday in a one car accident 5.3 miles south of Bronte on U.S. Highway 277, a short distance south of the Juniper schoolhouse.

Mrs. Richie F. Cravens, 25, was driver of the car, and her son, Russell Lamar Cravens, 3, was a passenger. The boy was dead at the scene of the accident and Mrs. Cravens was dead on arrival at Shannon Hospital in San Angelo. The accident occurred about 7:15 a.m. and the car was traveling north.

Highway Patrolman Bobby Hart investigated the accident and reported that apparently Mrs. Cravens fell asleep, ran off the roadway, hit a culvert and turned over several times. The 1968 Chevrolet was completely demolished.

Mrs. Cravens, the former Glenna Beth Eisenbach, was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Eisenbach of San Angelo. Her husband is a former Merton resident.

All the couple's friends and relatives are cordially invited to attend the reception.

A contract was executed Wednesday afternoon for construction of a 40 bed nursing home in Bronte. The successful bidder was Oscar Wagner of San Angelo, and the amount of the contract was \$215,139.70.

Bids were opened last Thursday, with Wagner submitting a bid of \$204,504 on a 32-bed structure. The board of directors of East Coke County Hospital District met Tuesday night to discuss the contract and were told

they could add eight more beds, making a total of 40, for \$13,211.

A couple of alternate items included in the original bid were deleted from the contract and the final result was the \$215,139.70 figure.

Rev. C. R. Blake, chairman of the board, said Thursday morning that the fence at the site will be moved this week and Wagner will move in equipment and begin work Monday. A total of 217 working days will be allowed for completion of the project, making a probable date of completion some time in July of 1971.

In their Tuesday night meeting the board unanimously agreed on the installation of an all-electric energy system for the home, including heating, cooling, cooking, water heating, etc. The contractor told the board that an all-electric setup would save the district \$1,737 in installation costs, which was a big factor in the decision. Members also agreed to bypass curbing and paving of the streets in the area as a part of the contract.

The new nursing home will be located on U. S. Highway 277 in the south part of Bronte. The building and grounds will cover an entire city block.

East Coke County Hospital District, owner of the home, is made up of residents of commissioner precincts 2 and 4 of Coke County.

### Sunday School Class Honors Youngblood

Mr. Youngblood, who is president of First National Bank and has been working down on the corner here since 1922, also celebrated his 84th birthday Wednesday.

Mr. Youngblood was born in Milam County and moved to Nolan County when a small child. He graduated from the now defunct Hylton High School and enrolled in Texas A&M. He attended the college one year and came home to take a job as cashier of the bank at Blackwell in 1912.

That year was not only important to him as the beginning of his banking career, but it was also the year he married Alma Mahaffey of Mount Vernon. He had met the young school teacher in West Texas, but they re-

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Austin — Freshman state legislators received some sobering news in their first orientation conference before the legislative halls open on Jan. 12.

About 30 legislative newcomers turned out for the two-day schooling in the capital city. Major state officials and agency heads functioned in the role of professors.

In addition to warnings that money and legislative redistricting problems lie ahead, young lawmakers got word that welfare cuts are virtually certain early next year.

Welfare Commissioner Burton Hackney reported this grim news on the plight of his agency. He announced that "unless an emergency appropriation is made early in the upcoming legislative session, we still face the prospect of cuts in Aid to Families with Dependent Children and/or medical assistance in the first few months of 1971."

Commissioner Hackney added that "even with an appropriation that would take us up to the

annual ceiling on state money for public assistance, we can predict the need for a cut in AFDC grants by June if the rolls continue to grow as they have."

Texas' constitution sets a ceiling of \$80 million for financial assistance to welfare beneficiaries. Hackney said he has asked for \$96 million for fiscal 1972 just to cover the present level of public assistance checks.

House Speaker Gus Mutscher urged freshmen to utilize the formula of "knowledge, cooperation and understanding" in the work ahead.

Further schooling for lawmakers is ahead at a University of Texas special orientation program.

COURTS SPEAK — State Supreme Court has agreed with the federal court's finding that three key sections of Texas' obscenity law are constitutional. But it skipped ruling on two other sections and ordered the Wichita Falls court to move ahead with its case against a theater show-

ing "stag" movies.

In other rulings last week, the high court held that:

\* In spite of mandatory retirement provisions of the constitution, retired judges over 75 may be assigned to head special litigation and be paid as "visiting judges."

\* Appeal of an Abilene attorney whose license was suspended after conviction for conspiracy to defraud should be turned down.

\* Judgment of \$600,000 favoring a Dallas bank in a loan dispute with a Denton County man is valid.

It should hear on Jan. 13 the Getty Oil Company appeal from a lower court finding that the firm must lower its pumping units which are interfering with the irrigation system of a Gaines County farmer.

\* A Garland widow should get a hearing on Dec. 16 on her suit to collect \$20,000 in life insurance on her deceased husband.

\* Court of Criminal Appeals refused to lower the 99 year prison sentence given a San Angelo man in a car bomb killing.

\* A Dallas woman should not be jailed for contempt for not complying with a court order to deliver obscene film over which she had no control.

COURT APPOINTMENTS DUE — Gov. Preston Smith soon will have two appointments to make to the state's highest courts.

Judge Clyde E. Smith, 73, of Woodville has announced that he will resign his seat on the State Supreme Court on Dec. 31.

After Jan. 1, the Governor also must name a successor to Judge John F. Onion Jr. of the Court of Criminal Appeals. Next year the San Antonio judge moves up to presiding judge of the Appeals Court, vacating the seat he held as a regular court member since 1967.

Two years remain in the terms of both these judges.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES — Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held that a person calling for a local option wet-dry election in a subdivision that has not held one in a year is not required to make a deposit with the county clerk—and any such deposit should be refunded.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

\* Banking corporation stock, in a firm not doing business in the state on Jan. 1, 1970, is not taxable for ad valorem purposes for 1970.

\* Texarkana is not qualified for an airport building grant from Texas Aeronautics Commission because it owns an airport facility jointly with Texarkana, Ark.

\* Current Texas Tourist Development Board chairman remains in office until the expiration of his term as a board member. Board will then elect a new chairman.

\* Harrison County Commissioners Court can pay for the defense of its sheriff and two deputies in a civil rights action filed in South Dakota.

\* A corporation doing business as a detective agency must file a surety bond or insurance policy with the Secretary of State.

DRAFT CALL — A December draft call of 489 was announced by Col. Charles M. Duncan, acting state Selective Service director.

Local boards will fill the call with men having random sequence numbers one through 160—as far as possible. Some with higher numbers may get called by some local boards.

Quota is Texas' share of the national total of 7,000 men, all for the Army. Inductions are set for Dec. 1-17.

On December 31, all men in 1-A, 1-A-O or 1-O with numbers

lower than the highest reached during the year by their own local boards will be assigned to an extended priority selection group for call during the first quarter of 1971. Those with a higher number than the highest reached will be assigned to the second priority group for 1971.

SCHOOL FOODS PROGRAMS NOTED — Governor Smith notified 1,182 school superintendents that he wants all Texas pupils to have full access to food programs.

He called attention to food services and equipment made available through the National School Lunch Act as mandatory on Jan. 1, 1971. Smith said that hungry children are vulnerable to malnutrition's effect on growth, ability to learn and general intellectual performance.

Short Snorts Outgoing Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, who banned mini-skirts and long sideburns, gave his official endorsement to pants

suits as women's office attire.

This year's cast of the minimum foundation school programs will top \$1 billion, an increase of \$233.7 million over last year.

Governor's migrant task force will hold its first meeting here on Nov. 23.

Criminal Justice Council has looked over 29 action grant applications totalling \$1.1 million.

Texans' personal income rose three per cent in September, University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

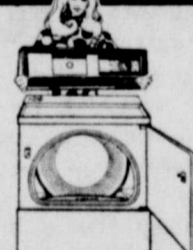
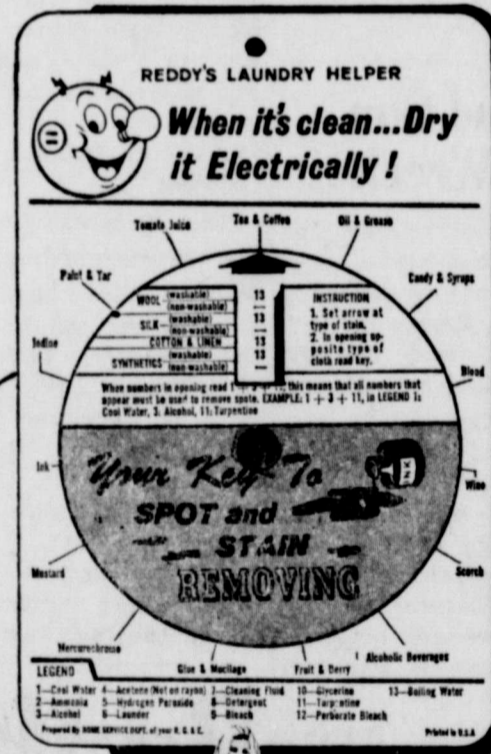
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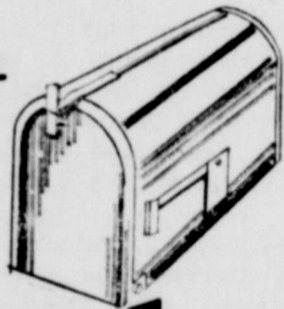

# Horns Drop Final Game to Jim Ned

It was a pretty hot football game last Friday night, but the weather was COLD. The Longhorns wound up the 1970 season with a 24-12 loss to the favored Jim Ned Indians when they traveled to Tuscola for a homecoming game. All the scoring took place in the second half as the scoreboard had two zeroes on it at intermission time.

### First Quarter

Danny Cooper's kickoff started the ball game as it went to Teddy Hallford who was tripped up on the 15. Stanley Egger and Bobby Saling did the ball carrying and had to punt on 4th and 11. It went into the wind and was short to the Jim Ned 33.

Joe Basquez and Kim Barrett carried but made only 2 yards, so Cooper threw a long pass to Basquez but it fell incomplete. Cooper set up to try a field goal, but it was no good, so the Indians took over on the 20.

The Indians made a 1st on the 30 and that was it. The punt went out on the Bronte 45. The Indians then recovered a fumble on the 45 and ran three plays before they had to punt. It went to the Bronte 25. After three plays and a couple of penalties, Mike Arrott punted a long one 55 yards to the Jim Ned 25. The Indians got a drive going and made 1st downs on their 39 and 49 and the Bronte 25 as the quarter ended.

### Second Quarter

The Indians were penalized 5 and made short yardage, but the Longhorn defense held and the Bronte lads took over on their 25 yard line. Cooper, Basquez and Arrott gained 11 yards for a 1st on the 36, then Arrott went for 6 and Basquez caught a pass for a 1st on the 50. That was about it, however, as Skelton made a short gain and Bronte drew a 15 yarder for clipping. Cooper tried a pass but it was intercepted on the Indian 45.

Mike Watson picked up 7 and Eggers threw a pass to Mark Marshall on the Bronte 35 for a 1st down. Again the Longhorn line held and four plays later the Horns took over on their 35 yard line. Arrott carried three times but wasn't able to make the needed 10 yards, so he punted into the wind and the ball came down on the 49. Watson went 16 yards for a 1st at the Bronte 35 and again the Horns held and took over on their 33.

Arrott gained 4 yards on two carries, and after an incomplete pass, the Horns punted but a penalty against the Indians gave them the ball and a 1st at mid-field. Jim Ned drew another 5 yard fine and Arrott went 14

yards for a 1st on the Indian 30. It looked as though the Horns were on the move, but a couple of plays later the Indians recovered a fumble on the Indian 20. The half ended two plays later and everybody made a bee-line for the coffee bar.

### Third Quarter

Jim Ned's 2nd half kickoff went to Arrott and he hit the dirt on the 35. The Longhorns couldn't make a 1st and Arrott got a bad snap and couldn't get the punt away. He made a valiant effort to run the ball out but the Indian defenders tripped him up on the Bronte 37.

Watson, Saling and Eggers carried the ball and made 1st downs on the 24 and 12. They moved on down to the 4 and from there Salings went in for the TD. Watson ran for 2 and the score was 8-0.

After taking the kickoff, the Horns set up on their 25. Arrott quick kicked on 3rd down and it went to the Bronte 40. The Horns held and Jim Ned had to punt, but it was fumbled and the Indians took over on the Bronte 20 yard line. Eggers gained 3 and Watson went to the 12. A pass from there to Marshall and a run by Watson gave the Indians another 8 points. Score: 16-0.

Basquez took the kickoff and was stopped at the 37. Two plays later the ball went back to the Indians on a fumble at the 50. The Horns held tight, and Jim Ned punted into the end zone just as the 3rd quarter ended.

### Fourth Quarter

Arrott breezed for 27 yards but a clip put the ball down on the 30. Cooper kept for 5 and the Horns drew a penalty and had to punt. Again the snap was bad and Arrott had to run. He was dragged down on the 22.

The Indians moved the ball to the 6 and Marshall went in for another TD. Watson ran for 2 and the score was 24-0.

Arrott took the kickoff and was downed on his 49. After three tries the Horns had to punt and Arrott kicked it to the Indian 5 yard line. The Horns pushed the Indians back to the 2 yard line and the punt went into the wind and came down on the 6 yard line. Skelton made a yard and on 2nd down Cooper went over the right side to cross the double stripe and get the Horns on the scoreboard. Extras failed and the score was 24-6.

The Indians took the kickoff and after three downs punted to their own 44. Skelton went for 4 and a penalty made it 3rd and 1. Cooper kept for the 1st on the 31. Next play saw Cooper pass to Donnie Thompson for a 1st and goal at the 7. Arrott made 2 and a pass to Basquez put the ball on the 1 yard line. Cooper kept on 3rd down and went in for the counter. Conversion was no good and the score was 24-12.

Cooper kicked into the end zone and the Indians ran three plays and punted as the game ended. Score: 24-12.

The wind and weather were big factors in the ball game. The team with the wind to their back had a big advantage.

### CITY ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR TRASH HAULING TO RESIDENTIAL CUSTOMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF BRONTE, COKE COUNTY, TEXAS.

WHEREAS, there has never been a charge for trash hauling service within the City of Bronte, And

WHEREAS, the cost of providing for this service for the inhabitants of the City of Bronte has increased to where revenue from other sources is no longer sufficient to cover rising costs, And

WHEREAS, it now appearing to this city council that it is necessary and proper to prescribe a schedule of rates or charges to be paid by inhabitants of said city for trash hauling services rendered by The City of Bronte,

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRONTE, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first trash hauling bills rendered after the final passage of this ordinance, the maximum charge for hauling trash for residential customers is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

a. For each residence within the City of Bronte, a charge of 50c (fifty cents) per month shall be charged for trash hauling service rendered by the City of Bronte.

b. Such charge is based on the pickup of cans, trash, or rubbish,

at the ground level in an alley, or from the curb line of the street, so situated as to allow the pickup to be made with normal convenience.

c. Rules and ordinances in effect as of this date shall remain in effect as to contents of barrels.

SECTION II: For this monthly charge, the customer shall expect and receive pickup service twice per month.

SECTION III. The importance of this ordinance and the absence of any regulation relating to the levy and collection of a fee for trash hauling creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity and requires that this ordinance shall take effect, and be enforced after the date of its final passage, and it is so ordained.

Attached rules become a part of this ordinance.

### TRASH HAULING RULES

1. Every residence is required to have a barrel which can be picked up and emptied into a pickup. Barrels must have a bottom in them.

2. Everything that is burnable should be burned as it is placed in barrels.

3. Such things as rocks, wire and other heavy objects should

not be placed in barrels, as it is up to the individual to haul off trash too heavy and hard to handle.

4. Trash which is not in barrels will not be hauled to the dump ground.

PASSED MAY 1, 1969, AND INCLUDED IN TRASH HAULING ORDINANCE NOVEMBER 5, 1970.

**CONCHO VALLEY COG  
RECEIVES STATE GRANT**

Gov. Preton Smith today approved a grant of \$7,752 to the Concho Valley Council of Governments to support its law enforcement training academy. Approval of the award was recommended by Texas Criminal Justice Council at its regular monthly meeting.

Judge Joe Frazier Brown, executive director of the Criminal Justice Council, said the grant will be used to increase the classroom hours offered by the academy to 240. Two sessions of 240 hours will be held for 50 to 60 officers. One session of 160 hours will be held at another location to certify new officers.

The academy is certified by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education.

An in-kind match of \$24,000 will be provided by the grantee for the project.

Counties in the Concho Valley State Planning Region include Coke, Concho, Menard, Tom Green, Crockett, Irion, McCulloch, Reagan, Runnels, San Saba, Schleicher, Sterling and Sutton.

The Criminal Justice Council, responsible for statewide planning, advises the Governor on administration of grants to units of state and local government to assist them in carrying out projects for improving the criminal justice system. The funds come from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, U. S. Department of Justice, under provisions of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968.

**Colorful Cranberries**

What could better represent the bright, cheery holiday season than colorful cranberries?

And this popular fruit comes to market just in time for the holidays. Preparation is usually kept to a minimum with cranberries, since there is nothing to peel and no seeds or pits to worry about.

Of course Thanksgiving dinner is incomplete without cranberry relish or some other cranberry dish. Fortunately, there's a plentiful supply of cranberries and cranberry sauce for the holidays.

When buying fresh berries, look for those that are plump and firm, with a lustrous color. Duller varieties should have at least some red color. Occasional soft, spongy or leaky berries should be sorted out before cooking, since they may produce off-flavor.

Steamed Cranberry Pudding is an old fashioned favorite.

1 1/2 cups all purpose flour sifted  
1 teaspoon double acting baking powder

1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 1/4 cups fresh or frozen cranberries

1/2 cup molasses  
1/4 cup water, warm  
2 tablespoons shortening, melted  
2 teaspoons soda

Have ready for sauce:  
1 cup sugar  
1/2 cup cream  
1/2 cup butter, melted  
1 teaspoon vanilla

Combine flour, baking powder and salt. Sift together. Add cranberries. Mix molasses, water, shortening and soda, and add to

1 1/2 cups all purpose flour, sifted  
1 cup sugar  
1 1/2 teaspoons double acting baking powder

1/2 teaspoon soda  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup shortening  
3/4 cup orange juice

Spread corners and sides slightly higher than center. Bake in 350° F. oven about one hour, or until crust is golden brown and toothpick inserted comes out clean. Remove from pan and cool. Store overnight for easy slicing.

cranberry mixture. Spoon into well greased one quart mold or cylindrical can. Cover mold with parchment paper, aluminum foil or several layers of heavy waxed paper and tie loosely in place.

Place in steamer, or on top of a trivet or wire rack in a large covered kettle or roasting pan.

Add water to just below top of rack. Cover pan, bring water to boil, reduce heat and let boil for two hours. When done, remove mold from pan and let stand a few minutes or set in cold water a few seconds before unmolding.

To prepare sauce, blend sugar and cream. Heat, but do not boil. When ready to serve, beat in butter with rotary beater. Add vanilla. Serve pudding hot with hot sauce drizzled over the top. Makes eight servings.

2 cups all purpose flour, sifted  
1 cup sugar  
1 1/2 teaspoons double acting baking powder

1/2 teaspoon soda  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup shortening
