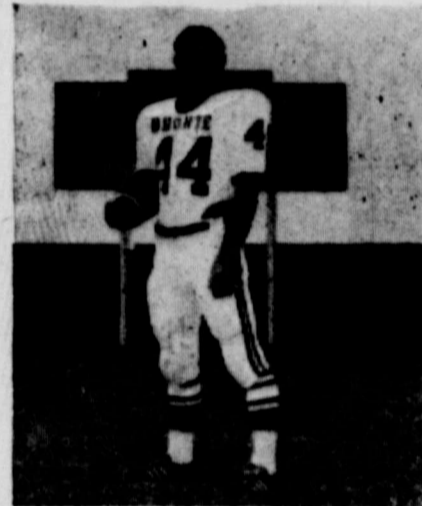

All-American Mention Goes To McCutchen

Doug McCutchen of Bronte (Pop. 999) has been named Southwest Conference offensive sophomore of the year in an Associated Press annual poll of coaches. His outstanding record of 1,068 yards rushing during regular season play with the Texas Tech Red Raiders put him in a select group of great Southwest Conference football players. Only four players in SWC history have passed the 1,000 yard mark and McCutchen became the fifth.

In addition to the Soph of the Year honor, the former Bronte Longhorn was named fullback on the second offensive All-Southwest Conference team. The great Steve Worster of Texas received the fullback slot on the first team.

McCutchen's coach, Jim Carlin of Texas Tech, who is in his first year on the job, was named Coach of the Year by AP.

Doug was the only sophomore on the second offensive team.

Word was received Thursday morning that Doug McCutchen was awarded an honorable mention on the Associated Press All American team for major colleges in the United States.

This latest honor for the former Bronte Longhorn was first learned here this morning when Radio Station KRUN, Ballinger, spotted Doug's name on the AP release which came over their news wire. An article in afternoon dailies also carried the story.

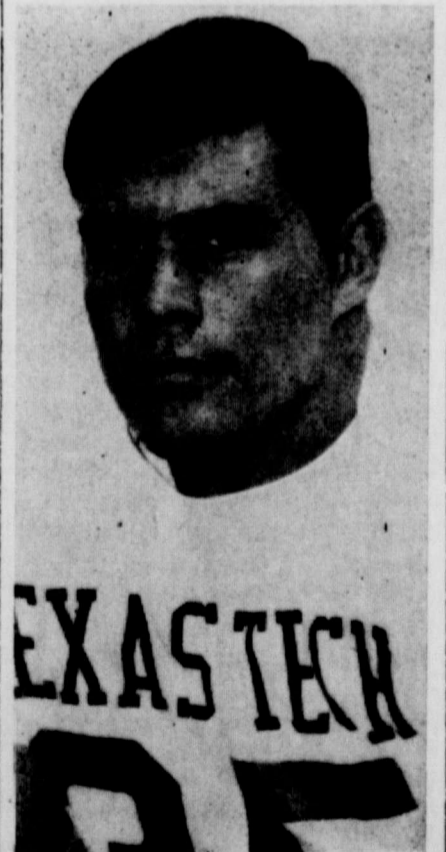

Holiday Fashion

Pick a new fashion beat as you plan for holiday parties, and remember what ever you choose, think about the total look.

Begin at the top with your hair. Curl, braid, ribbon or bow it. Add the neckline news of chokers and dog collars. Then put rings on your fingers. Don't forget to give some thought to finish line; legs should match with the right shoes or boots.

You may add some of this year's accessories to last year's dress. Take last year's mini and add velvet pants.

If you're planning on something new, you can choose from a wide variety. Fabrics are rich and elegant, with lots of velvets, soft wools, jerseys and crushable knits. Necklines are high,

and sleeve and hems are long. There's a whole rainbow of color, from purples, corals and yellows to muted browns, greens and grays.

Also found in holiday looks every year are crepes, chiffons and organdies in fluted, sunburst or fan-pleated dresses. Metallics are also a hit on the fashion scene this year.

Frills and spills are not compatible, so wear party garments with care.

Plan Holiday Meals

You can plan now for the holidays ahead and avoid the last minute meal time and party preparation rush.

Just consider the number of guests you expect, and allow for a few unexpected drop-ins.

Make full use of your freezer by preparing main dishes, desserts, garnishes and party fare well ahead of time and freezing them until needed.

Start your holiday baking, too! Preparation of many of the nationality breads and cookies is time consuming, but it can be a pleasurable experience when done in a relaxed atmosphere.

One caution to keep in mind is to use moisture-vapor-proof wrapping or air tight containers to insure good keeping of foods. Tin cans are fine for cookies and breads. If you plan to use some as gifts, you may even gift wrap them before freezing so they will be ready to give away.

Plan main dishes to include adequate meat or other protein food per serving. Be sure to pack them tightly to prevent the development of a warmed over flavor.

Some spices and seasonings tend to become strong under freezing conditions, so it's best to season foods lightly. Add more flavoring during the heating process before serving.

Store a few party foods and extra ice cubes in the freezer if you have space.

Include a variety of dips, since most will keep well for about six weeks. Appetizers and other similar dainties may be frozen in layers with a sheet of freezer wrap between them, with all the layers overwrapped. Pie dough for both pies and tiny tarts may be rolled into the desired size, layered flat, then over-wrapped. Allow dough to thaw before shaping.

You can also prepare various punch combinations and freeze them.

Plan your meal and party menus now, and make best use of your freezer space.

Austin — Legislative Budget Board staff members added little to the season's cheer for legislators with their estimate that even a rigidly conservative 1972-73 budget will require a \$643.5 million tax bill.

Lawmakers, who report for the biennial session in January, must pass a \$51.4 million emergency finance measure to head off a 20 per cent welfare cut in April, the Budget Board warned. And early approval of a constitutional amendment to raise the \$80 million welfare ceiling also will be necessary to avert eventual sharp reductions in aid to the needy.

Board stressed that its budget compilations allow for no new construction funds for any purpose (not even new colleges already authorized) and no money for state employee salary raises.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes called the situation a "crisis."

Senate leaders turned down a no-tax plan advanced by a Houston group. This plan would freeze teacher salaries, raise college tuitions, abandon general revenue appropriations for farm-to-market roads, change school finance formulas and divert a portion of the permanent school fund to current spending. Such proposals, said Barnes, "would get about two votes."

Sharp growth in welfare rolls and long range educational programs already enacted are primary reasons cited for the record tax need.

BOUNDARY HEARING SET
—Texas-Louisiana boundary dispute will be argued before Judge Robert Van Pelt in the U. S. Supreme Court in Houston on Dec. 16.

Judge Van Pelt is a senior federal district judge for Nebraska. Texas claims that midstream of the Sabine River, Sabine Lake and Sabine Pass were established in 1848 by Congress as the dividing line. Louisiana claims the entire river.

TEXAS FOURTH — Texas is now the fourth most populous state in the nation. New census figures show 11,298,787 population which includes 102,057 Texans abroad.

California still is No. 1, with more than 20 million. New York remains second with 18.2 and Pennsylvania is third with nearly 11.9 million.

Texas barely nosed out Illinois for fourth. Illinois' head count is 11,184 million.

TURKEY PRICES HOLDING
—Price of the Christmas turkey in Texas will be about the same, or maybe even less than in 1969, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White figures.

A wire service story on Nov. 25 stated that prices of Thanksgiving turkeys over the nation were nine per cent higher this year, but White said this was not true in Texas.

White based this statement on a survey of prices in leading markets of San Antonio, Houston and Dallas.

About 19 per cent more turkeys were produced in Texas this

year than in 1969.

HEARING SET—A December 21 public hearing will be held in the McAllen civic center on proposed piece rates for hand harvesting of agricultural commodities.

Rate system, under the state Minimum Wage Law, will be based on average worker productivity by commodity and will become effective on Feb. 1.

COURTS SPEAK — Reversing itself, the State Supreme Court upheld a \$10,000 libel judgment against a Denton publishing company as the result of an erroneous report (which the Court said was not privileged). Story reportedly stated that a local developer was bankrupt. In an earlier opinion, the High Court, by a 5 to 4 vote, had held for the newspaper publisher. Newspaper had quoted a statement made at a city council meeting but through oversight did not say who made the statement.

In other cases the High Court: * Upheld a lower court decision invalidating a Comanche County local option election to permit liquor sale.

* Affirmed the right of a Fort Worth school district to prevent students from belonging to secret clubs.
