

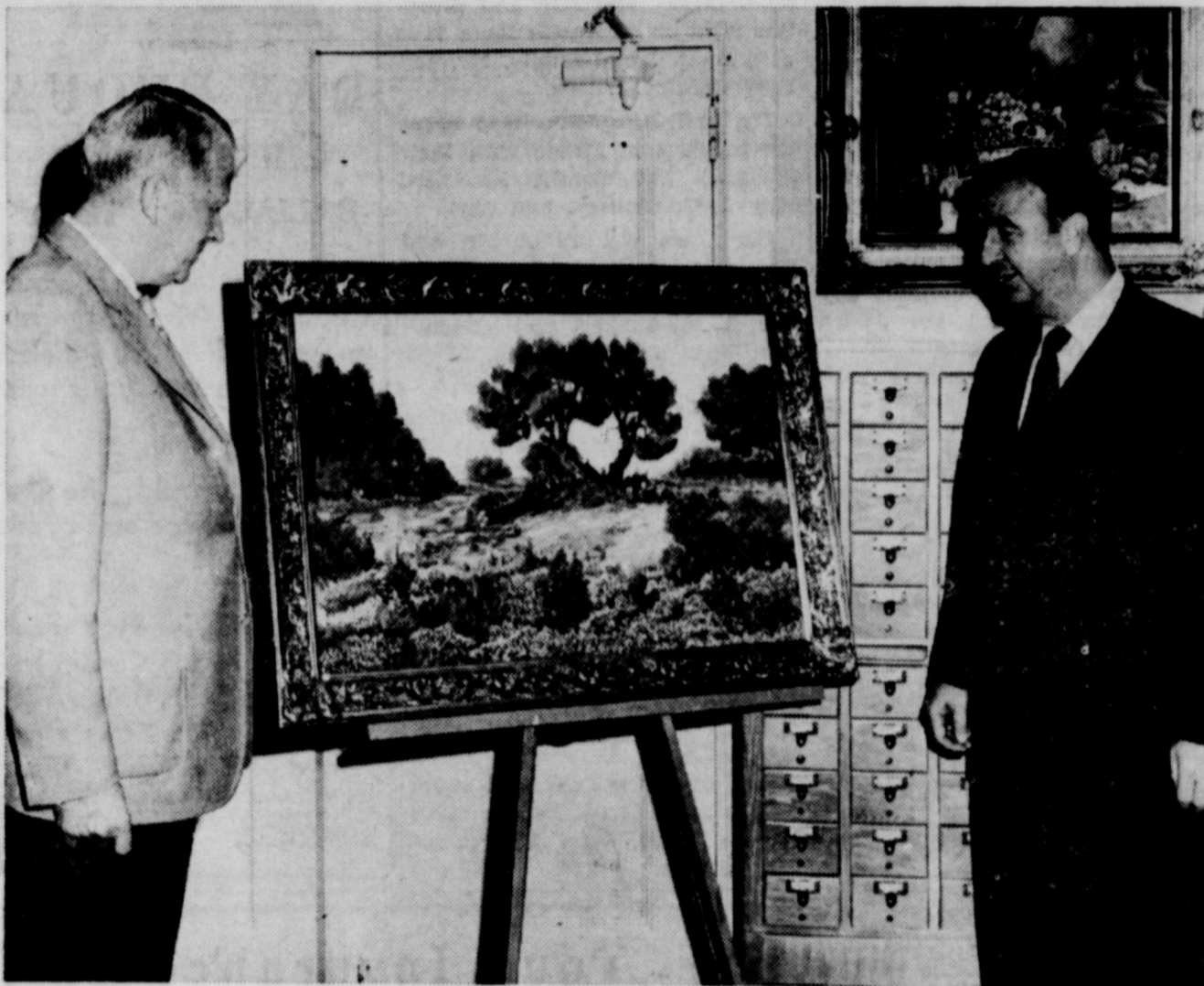

County Stock Show Monday

tation Program. In addition to his painting, he now teaches art here, at Ballinger and at Winters and operates an art shop in Bronte. Another one of his paintings, "Royal Table," can be seen at right.

The annual Coke County Stock Show will be held Monday, Jan. 4, in the county showbarn in Robert Lee. Sixty-seven FFA and 4-H Club members with 185 animals will compete for show honors and a place in the premium sale.

Activities will begin on Sunday afternoon, Jan. 3, with animals being brought to the showbarn between 1 and 4 p.m. Weighing,

classifying and the last grooming work will take place Sunday afternoon and night.

Judging will start Monday at 9 a.m. with the judging of the breeding swine. Through the day the market swine, market lambs, breeding sheep, then cattle will be judged. The sale of the premium lambs and pigs will begin at 3 p.m.

Judging the 1971 show will be done by Bill Scott, vocational agriculture teacher at Abilene High School. Scott will judge all three divisions of the show.

Directing the 1971 County Show will be the Coke County Stock Show Association directors. D. J. Walker Jr. is president of the association; J. F. McCabe Jr., vice president; Roy Tinkler, secretary. Association directors are LeDrew Arrott, Paul Burns, Wayne Arrott, J. Lee Ensor, D. J. Walker Jr., Frank Percifull, J. W. Service Jr., J. F. McCabe Jr., H. H. Brunson, Joe McCutchen, Foy Askins, Wilbern Millican, Roy Tinkler, Bill Magness and B. A. Boykin. Edward Cumbie will be auctioneer for the sale and Garland Davis will serve as show clerk.

Everyone is invited to attend the show and have lunch on the grounds. Coke County Home Demonstration Clubs will have lunches, refreshments and sandwiches available.
