

Coke County had a total of 1485 registered voters when the deadline expired Jan. 31.

But, the deadline was no deadline at all. The Texas Legislature passed a law this week which extended the voter registration period through February. Why the extension was necessary has not been made clear.

At any rate, anyone who lives in Coke County, and has not registered, can go to the office may be purchased from any mem- of Tax Assessor-Collector O. B.

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

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

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
