Wilmeth Man Accidentally Shot

Funeral services for Robert C. "Bobby" Simpson, 50, were held Sunday at 3:30 p.m. in St. John Lutheran Church in Winters. Burial was in the Lutheran Cemetery.

Simpson, a Wilmeth community rancher, was found dead about 4:30 p.m. Friday on the Copeland Ranch, about six miles northeast of Bronte. His body was found lying across a fence by Flossie Elmore, who was going to fish on the ranch. She said when she found Simpson's body, she went back to the ranch for help.

Justice of the Peace Cecil Kemp of Bronte ruled death due to accidental gunshot wound. Witnesses said Simpson was apparently attempting to cross a fence when an 8 mm. rifle he was carrying discharged.

He was born March 22, 1920, in Burnet County and moved to Runnels County with his parents, and the family settled in the Winters area. For the past 25 years, he had lived at Wilmeth. He was a Navy veteran of World War II.

He was married to Rosalie Ernst Dec. 15, 1938, in Winters. He was a member of St. John Lutheran Church where he had

served on the church council.

Survivors include his wife; his mother, Mrs. A. E. 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Austin — Welfare beneficiaries late last week got the bad news they had been expecting — there will be substantial cuts in their assistance payments on May 1.

Level of aid will be reduced to Aid to Families with Dependent Children by about one-third, according to Welfare Commissioner Burton G. Hackney. Board of Public Welfare scheduled a meeting Monday (March 22) to place its inevitable approval on the reduction.

"The hard fact," said Hackney, "is that no more state money is available under the present constitutional ceiling on welfare expenditures. The Legislature has appropriated all that it can appropriate."

Average AFDC grant last month, based on PWD's formula of 75 per cent of "budgeted needs," was \$118.

Hackney estimated the average level will drop on May 1 to about \$80 a month.

In addition to steep cuts, about 4,500 families will be dropped from the rolls altogether, since at the newly-contemplated 50 per cent level of "budgeted needs," they will no longer be eligible for aid. Their income will meet the "standard of need" PWD must recognize with the limited

funds available. As of last month, there were 87,616 Texas families with 263,809 children receiving AFDC benefits. Rolls for the last five months have been increasing at a rate of almost 11,500 a month, according to Hackney.

A proposed constitutional amendment to increase the \$85 million a year ceiling on aid to aged, blind, disabled and AFDC will be voted on May 18.

Almost simultaneous with PWD's announcement of the cut (actually first predicted by Hackney last Nov. 12), Texas Citizens for Welfare Reform announced start of its active campaign to win approval of the amendment (Proposition 3) on the May 18 ballot.

SENATE PASSES LIQUOR BILL — Senate voted 22-7 approval of the local option liquor by the drink bill and sent it to the House.

Biggest battle in the Senate was whether retail package stores or wholesalers would sell to bar operators. Package stores won out, over the protest of Sen. Joe Christie of El Paso, author of the bill (SB 346).

Measure now calls for \$2,500 license fees for mixed beverage licenses, with \$2,500 first renewal

fees after one year, \$500 thereafter.

Bars would be able to serve drinks in one ounce mini-bottles or standard size containers. Senators rejected by 16-13 a "dram shop" amendment to hold liquor dispensers liable for damages of their intoxicated customers.

Rep. L. DeWitt Hale of Corpus Christi said he will ask for a hearing next week and expects an early floor debate.

"I don't think there is any question but that we will pass a bill of some kind," said Hale. "The fight is not over final passage but what's in the bill."

TAX HEARINGS BEGIN — Hearings on the tax bill were to begin in the Senate late this week and continue probably through most of next week.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes called on all interests to present their case and on all senators to ready their amendments or substitutes for the House-passed \$492.5 million sales tax-franchise tax-tuition increases.

Barnes expressed hope for more orderly floor consideration of amendments with revenue estimates and amendments prepared in advance rather than at the last minute as usual.

OIL ALLOWABLE SAME — For the third month in a row, Texas Railroad Commission set the oil production allowable at 82.1 per cent of potential. That will allow maximum production of 3,763,658 barrels a day in April. Actually, about 3,411,000 barrels probably will be the output.

Oil company executives said all evidence points to the need for a big effort to locate "massive new supplies of crude."

AG OPINIONS — Texas Water Quality Board cannot force the owner of a solid waste disposal dump to post bond for a license, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

* Legislature would have to vote authority for a county to lease its property.

* City and county may cooperate to establish an ambulance service by joint contract.

* Juvenile court has jurisdiction to declare males delinquent after 17th birthday and females after 18.

* Sheriffs are not bound to furnish county auditors a monthly inventory of supplies, menus and bills for feeding prisoners.

* Highway Department can award federally involved highway contracts which do not contain the general prevailing rate of per diem wages in view of the presidential emergency proclamation.

* Ward County may maintain a golf course on land owned by the City of Monahans.

* If county commissioners make final selection of a bank as the county fund depository, selection may not be retracted.

* Contract for delinquent tax collection entered by commissioners without notice to the county attorney should not be approved.

STUDY DROUGHT PROBLEM — Governor Smith led a state-federal delegation to Alice late last week to investigate the increasing drought problem in

South Texas.

Governor met with local officials, farmers and ranchers. He was accompanied by Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, disaster relief officials and legislators.

Smith said he is exploring the possibility of requesting that the region be designated a disaster area for federal aid in the form of low interest loans and emergency livestock feeding programs.

Short Snorts

Governor Smith in ceremonies at Texas Tech University, Lubbock, signed a bill authorizing \$185 million revenue bond program for building eight new higher education facilities.

There were 21,116,000 out of state and foreign visitors to Texas last year, who spent \$1.469 billion, according to State Highway Department calculations.

Senate passed and returned to the House with amendments a bill increasing tuitions of out of state students in Texas tax supported colleges from \$200 to \$500 a semester. (Students already enrolled would be exempt.)

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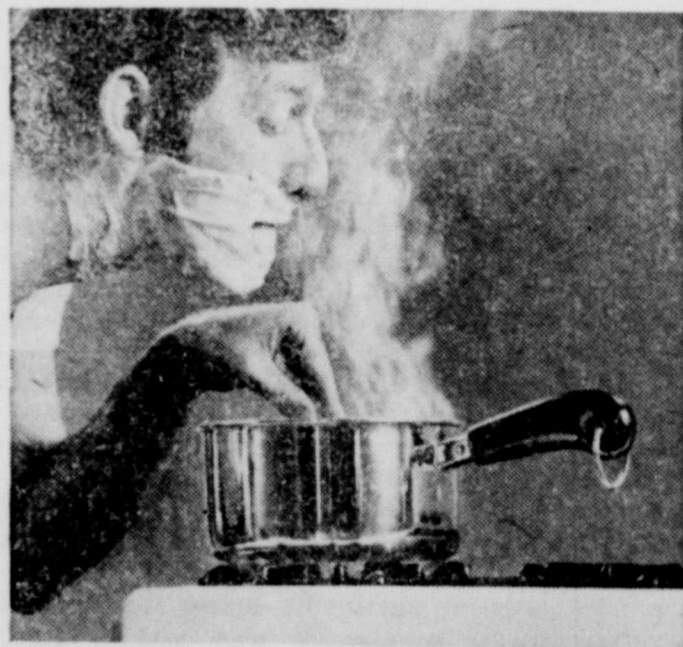

Washington — We saw a street a few days ago by the name of Idyllia. A curiosity developed and finally the word was looked up in the dictionary. It seems the source of the word goes back to the Roman poet, Theocritus, who wrote of pastoral life in Sicily. As related to music it seems to call for a pastoral composition.

Where it starts and ends was not determined but some romanticist must have been inspired to give the street its name.

At this time of year, with some dreary days of winter and tax-paying time coming next month — with other things going on which disturb us, probably everyone yearns to find a place to escape it. A voyage to Idyllia would be as much as life on earth could offer.

Suppose we locate Idyllia lying east of Alpha Centauri in the Pledonians. It may be described

as the only perfect place in the world, having blues and greens, the air and water both crystal clear and pure.

The Idyllians are handsome people of skin coloring running from golden through rich reds, tawny blacks and shades of brown and yellow, one as admirable as the other.

The people are gentle, loving and kind. They have only one simple requirement, which really does not need to be a law — "Thou shall not hurt anyone else." It is never violated except by accident and there are seldom accidents. Their politics are simple too. Each year they elect some individual — it can be either man or woman. When chosen he or she rules for a year with the title of "The Poor Dear." At inauguration the folks gather around and consolingly whisper "The Poor Dear."

During the year, "The Poor

Dear" performs menial chores such as digging a ditch, taking out the garbage and bringing in water. In Idyllia the people consider these chores to be the only function of government.

A little imagination suggests that the word for "family" is the same as the word for "all" and that they live in true brotherhood.

There is, of course, no want, which removes envy and avarice among them. Their forests produce an unlimited supply of fruits and vegetables of thousands of flavors and varieties. The climate is perfect — warm, soft rains and caressing sunshine — which eliminates the need for shelter and clothing. Having no need for machinery of any kind, they don't have to build, work or repair anything. There are no traffic jams, strikes or pollution. Disease is unknown and war is unthinkable. Really, all they have to do is sing, dance, eat, splash in the surf and love one another. They are without crime, poverty or any sort of hangups.

With this perfect society, there is no need to talk about building a better world.

There is just one little concern about all this. From all indications, the life span of the Idyllians is very short. Few live beyond the age of 21 but occasionally one might be found to have reached 23 or 24. It seems those who live beyond 21 are those who might have developed some nervousness or be a bit more adventuresome than others. For this reason, they lived longer than those who do no work, have no worries and no responsibilities but who die early from boredom.

Well, back to the old routine, commonly referred to as the "rat race." Back to all the problems which weigh heavily and haunt us from morning to night. Back to figuring out how we are going to pay next month's bills, send the kids to school and there is likely to be an operation coming up pretty soon. Back to facing the deadline for making out that tax return. Back to the bickerings, the struggle for this and that and seeing and hearing of this imperfect world — except Idyllia.

Workers in the office of County Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs estimated Tuesday that they were two-thirds, or less, finished with their sale of 1971 license plates.

Jacobs urged everyone to "come on in" as new car tags must be installed before next Thursday, April 1.

This year's tags for passenger cars have black letters and figures on a white luminous background.

Figures Given On Coke Crime

Figure on crime in Coke County during 1970 have been released by Sheriff Melvin Childress. The figures were taken from his annual report to the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

The figures show that burglary was the chief offense of a major nature. There were 35 burglaries known to police, with 19 of them cleared up and one committed by a person under 18 years old. Thirty-two of the burglaries were by forcible entry and three were by unlawful entry.

There were four assault cases, two aggravated and two not aggravated. One case of larceny was referred to juvenile court while there was a total of 17 cases of larceny (over \$50) known to police. Seven cases of larceny (under \$50) were reported and two of them cleared to juvenile court. There was one arrest for vandalism and one for forgery or counterfeiting.

The report shows 39 cases of DWI, 13 violations of liquor laws and 20 arrested for drunkenness. Three persons were arrested for disorderly conduct, three for vagrancy and nine for all other offenses (except traffic).

Totals show 108 persons arrested and charged, 91 found guilty, 10 referred to juvenile court and seven disposed of in some other manner.

Coke countians should be interested to know that there were no arrests in the county during 1970 for murder, manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, arson, fraud, embezzlement, carrying weapons, prostitution and commercialized vice, sex offenses, narcotic drug laws, gambling, and offenses against family and children.
