
He was born June 16, 1909 at Fort Chadbourne. He had practiced law in San Angelo. He received his law degree in 1929.

He was married to Helen Norris Berry in January 1948 in San Angelo.

Mr. McDonald had a long and colorful career as a lawyer. He erved as Coke County attorney shortly after being licensed. He served in the legal department of the Navy in Washington and in the South Pacific in the Navy's Communications Intellgence organization during World War II. He was commended for invaluable contribution to the prosecution of the war by the Commander of the South Pacific.







A total of 2313 vehicles have been registered in Coke County, according to Tax Assessor - Collector O. B. Jacobs. The registration period ended March 31.


Jacobs said they issued 1254 licenses for passenger cars, 480 for commercial vehicles and 310 for farm trucks.
