FEDERAL LAND BANK REDUCES INTEREST RATE

R. H. Emery, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of San Angelo, announced today that the Federal Land Bank of Houston will reduce the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 71/2 per cent. "This reduction will be effective on installments maturing on or after July 1, 1971 and affects more than \$110 million in variable rate loans to over 3200 Texas farmers and ranchers," Emery said.

The variable rate loan, which was introduced by the Houston bank in July 1969, lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. This is the second time since Jan. 1 that the billing rate has been reduced and the third such reduction in the past year. Emery said, "This action is in line with



Secretary of Transportation John A. Volpe established the Administration's position favoring a modest start in the "nofault" insurance concept. This concept provides that no matter who is at fault in an automobile accident the claimant collects. This, it is reasoned, would provide faster adjustments, reduce bureaucracy and court litigation in many cases. The theory is that it would eliminate costs all along the line and thus trim cost of insurance.

Actually, there is little experience to provide guidance for this idea. Massachusetts, from which State Secretary comes, has had "no-fault" insurance since last January. A number of States have the matter under consideration by their Legislatures. Senator Hart of Michigan has offered a bill which would in fact. nationalize the idea. His Committee has held a series of hearings on the proposition and will likely hold more.

These hearings have developed evidence that "no-fault" insurance for small accidents would formalize what is already a policy of some companies. To look further, however, the issue is not quite that narrow. The wider and longer range view touches on the moral question of what personal responsibilities a driver assumes for the privilege of using the highways and streets. It raises the question of whether safe drivers would not, in the end, subsidize the unsafe ones. being considered in the U.S. Senate, a disturbing aspect of the "no-fault" idea is that citizens in lesser accidents would be compelled to waive rights to use the courts to settle a claim they Another troublesome element

Made of cast aluminum with Swedish steel effect, the marker measures 18 by 28 inches and is sponsored by the Coke County Historical Survey Committee and Willie I. Tubb of 'San Angelo, native and long time resident of the area to be commemorated.

The inscription on the marker reads:

OLD COMMUNITY OF CEDAR HILL

The Cedar Hill area, settled by s to c k - farming homesteaders about 1890, was named for the nearby cedar-covered elevation.

A one-room school built in 1891 was located about 100 yards north of the cemetery, which remains. However, no post office or town ever developed.

Discouraged by drouths and the lack of conveniences, many people had departed by 1904. The school closed after 1917.

30 years later, an oil boom swept the county. Cedar Hill area, supplying 2 big companies, now les within one of West Texas' largest oil fields. (1970)

The name and location of the present marker will appear in the next edition of the Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers in order to stimulate tourist travel in this area, to arouse interest in historical tours, and to acquaint the people of this area with their unique heritage.
