Danny Cooper set a new regional record in the high jump, clearing the bar at 6 feet 3 3/4 inches.

The 440 relay team also won first in their event with a time of 44.2. The team is composed of Joe Basquez, Bobby Skelton, Mike Arrott, Donnie Thompson and alternate, Gary Skelton.

Donnie Thompson placed third in the 100 yard dash with a time of 10 seconds and the mile relay team was third in their event with 3:32.7. Boys on the mile relay team are B. Skelton, Arrott, Willie Sanchez and Thompson.

On to State

The track team and their coaches, Gerald Sandusky and Bob Shields, will travel to Austin May 7-8 to participate in the state meet. Two top winners in the regional meet compete at state level, so Bronte will have entries in the 440 relay and the high jump. Boys making the Austin trip will be Arrott, Basquez, Cooper, Sanchez, B. Skelton, G. Skelton and Thompson.

The high jump event is scheduled for noon Saturday and the relay event is at 2 p.m.

Other teams in the regional meet last weekend were Sundown, Tornillo, Roby, Hermleigh and Jayton.

Austin — Texas is going to have liquor by the drink — and faster than nearly anybody expected.

Legislature completed action on the bill last week, spelling out the machinery for legalized mixed drink sales in open bars, and Gov. Preston Smith promptly signed it into law.

Smith said the measure will have "tremendous impact on the economy of our state" through increasing tourism.

Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. has sent out instructions to local officials, noting particularly that the bill provides for mandatory local option elections on the drinks issue in 46 counties on May 18.

Counties which must schedule referendums in their "all wet" areas in connection with the May constitutional amendments vote are those which last November approved lifting the open saloons ban and which contain cities or precincts where "package" sale of distilled spirits already is legal.

Die cautioned judges and clerks of those counties that they must call local option elections prior to April 28 to assure 20 days' notice. Elections will be held only in areas (precincts and cities) of the 46 counties where sale of all alcoholic beverages is legal. Only in counties where sale of all alcoholic beverages is legal countywide will the May 18 vote be held throughout the county.

"It is a relief to have this issue settled in Texas once and for all," commented Smith.

Later election can be called in other partially wet counties by the standard petition route.

COURTS SPEAK — Following U. S. Supreme Court approval of massive busing to achieve racial balance, federal court at Tyler ordered three all black school districts dissolved and told the state to eliminate any racially separate unit.

Fourth Court of Civil Appeals in a Toyah school district case held that it is illegal to conduct public business in closed meetings with the public barred. Actions taken in illegal meetings are illegal and void, Court held. Decision reversed a lower court.

State Supreme Court said Abilene police needed no search warrants to search the pockets of a man suspected of being about to sell marijuana.

INSPECTION PROGRAM APPROVED — Texas meat inspection program finally has received federal approval.

Accreditation of the Texas State Health Department conducted program was based on a recently completed survey of the state's 800 meat processing plants and slaughterhouses and findings that they had met standards equal to those of the federal government.

U. S. Secretary of Agriculture last February caused concern by advising the Health Department that federal standards were not met. New Texas Meat and Poultry Act went into effect Sept. 2, 1969, giving authority for an inspection program to the division of veterinary public health of the State Health Department. New school was established to train inspectors to meet the federal guidelines.

Purpose of the program is to give added protection to the consumer, according to State Health Commissioner Dr. James E. Peavy.

LAND BOARD MEET RE-SET — School Land Board reset its oil and gas lease sale for July 6 after learning that the U.S. Corps of Engineers apparently will permit drilling in coastal waters.

May 4 sale of submerged leases on state lands had been cancelled after the Corps declared a moratorium on off-shore drilling pending draft of an environmental impact statement.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong said the Corps will issue permits while a statement of environment is being drawn. Armstrong said applications will be processed through normal procedures under specified conditions. Nominations for tracts to be sold at the July sale must be in the general land office by May 14.

Short Snorts

Texas civil juries in damage suits will be able to return verdicts by 10-2 (rather than unanimous) votes under a new law passed despite a filibuster in the Senate.

State game management officers are authorized to assist in enforcing the antiquities code.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

Medical fraternities at UT Medical School, Galveston, are not entitled to property tax exemption as a matter of law, ruled Attorney General Martin.

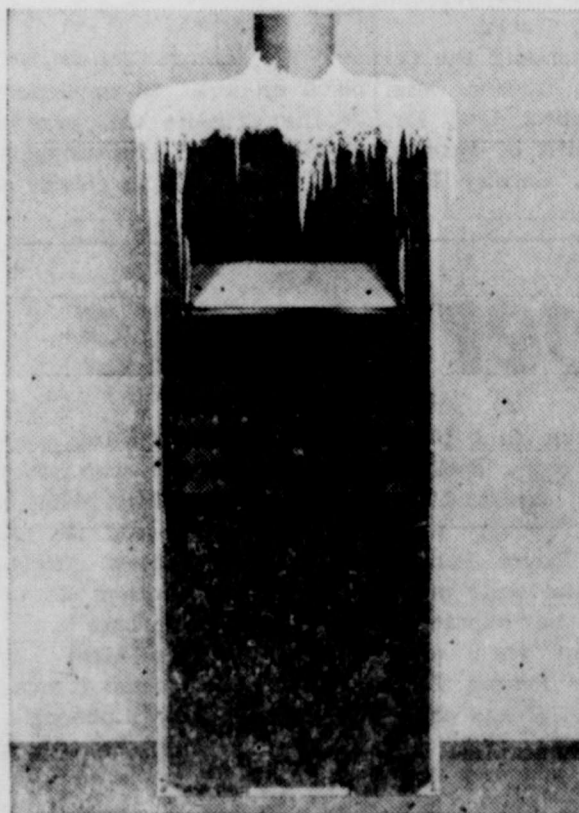

"As it looks from here"

Washington — The controversy continues to rage over whether or not the FBI taps telephones of members of Congress.

No one has come up with any substantiated evidence that the FBI has ever tapped a Congressman's or a Senator's telephone although many accusations are

made. As a matter of fact, it is wholly contrary to the policy of the FBI and the Justice Department of which it is a part.

For years the radicals have criticized the Federal Bureau of Investigation just as they criticize law and order of any kind. They criticize efforts at protecting our internal security because this is what many of them would like to destroy.

Pardon the personal reference but as an agent of the FBI at one time I know that its practices are extremely strict and exacting.

The FBI has always sought to avoid any act which could involve its agents in controversy of any kind. It has kept out of politics and has shunned all actions which might be interpreted as political.

Mr. J. Edgar Hoover, having headed the FBI all these years, has had the highest confidence of eight Presidents without ever having the criticism which has recently been heaped upon him. At the age of 76, he is vigorous, alert and unquestionably dedicated to serving the best interest of our country.

In 1917 J. Edgar Hoover was a 22 year old lawyer who became Assistant Attorney General in the Department of Justice. Seven years later the Attorney General at that time, Harlan Fiske Stone, appointed Mr. Hoover as Director of the Bureau of Investigation. He was directed to reconstruct the Bureau "According to the highest ethical and executive standards and remove all actions from partisan politics." He was instructed to remove from the Bureau any man as to whose character there was any ground

for suspicion. Mr. Hoover withdrew the Bureau from all extralegal activities and made it an efficient organization for the investigation of criminal offenses against the United States.

In 1934 the FBI, adapting to the wave of Federal crime, particularly a great increase in bank robberies, became the national law enforcement arm of the United States. Under law it assumed the internal security protection to identify radicals of both far right and the far left.

In war and in peace, in economic depression and prosperity, in times of violence and moral decline, Mr. Hoover has remained an American symbol of law and order. Striving for excellence and integrity for the entire organization, he has himself been an example of these virtues.

Mr. Hoover's age is used as the first point of attack on him but those close to the Bureau's operation can distinguish no difference in standards than those which it has historically maintained.

The FBI does not conduct its business apart from other law enforcement agencies. It works in cooperation with state and local law enforcement authorities. It seeks no publicity and, as a matter of fact, avoids it where possible.

The policy of the FBI is one of concentrating on gathering of facts, leaving to the courts and juries to act on its findings. It does not decide to prosecute. Information assembled is turned over to the Justice Department for Federal Grand Juries to act on. It is coldly objective in its investigations to determine facts. It does not offer conclusions, opinions, or involve itself in personalities. This has been its mission from the beginning and remains the case at present. Whether it be a member of Congress, people in high or low positions, the FBI will investigate if there is reason to suspect wrong doing. Their obligation is no less regardless of where the chips may fall. It does not, however, snoop for the sake of snooping nor tap telephones in the hope of finding something not connected with law violations.

Accusations are made by prominent members of Congress that the FBI has placed surveillance upon the radicals participating in militant demonstrations. We can be thankful that someone is keeping an eye on those who would destroy this nation by subversion, espionage and conspiracies.

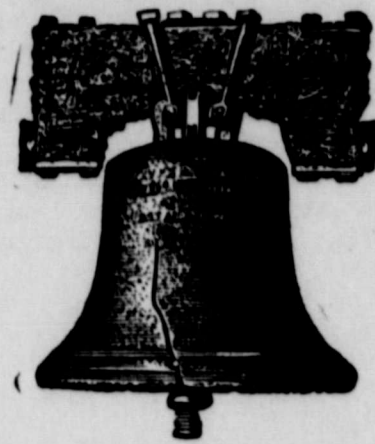
Abilene Office To Aid Blind

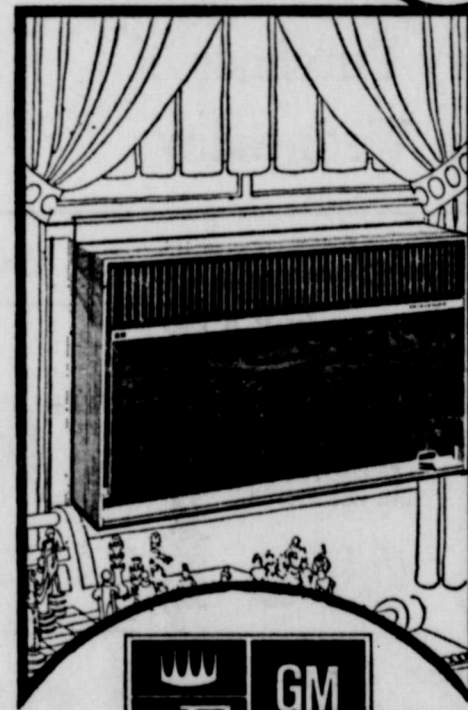
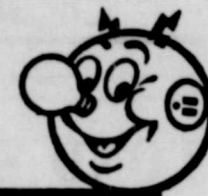

Springtime — Swindle Season
 Homemakers, beware. Spring—when people are at their most hopeful and vulnerable—is the season in which larceny is most rampant in the breasts of con men. At a time of year when many a woman's fancy turns to thoughts of improving her appearance, thousands of unscrupulous operators across the country get busy.

Among the numerous schemers who prey on the hopeful are those who peddle mail order gadgets which promise to do wondrous things to one's looks. Especially susceptible, after a long and sometimes broadening winter, is the lady who begins thinking ahead to wearing a bathing suit, or perhaps venturing into her first pair of "hot pants."

The more flagrant abusers of the printed promise include those firms which sell a variety of "spot reducers" through the mail. You've probably seen their ads. They usually feature those belt-like contraptions to be worn around the middle, and claim they will "whittle your inches away." Well, whittle they will, but mostly your pocketbook.

Reducing in Spots

The plain truth, according to the Better Business Bureau, is that reliable medical data says nothing will reduce the body in "spots" except a diet combined with proper exercise.

Equally ineffectual are those electronic vibrator devices—the kind that make you look like a walking ham radio station. Usually advertised as reducers and muscle relaxers, the only action you're likely to get from these is a small electric shock.

Then there are those pills sold through mail order, which promise to "depress the appetite." Most often they fill the user with a gaseous feeling. Frequently they cause nausea, too—a high price to pay for a temporarily depleted appetite.

Another heavily promoted gadget is the facial steamer, or sauna-like device, whose claim is that it will brighten the complexion and tighten facial muscles. The device is harmless enough, but the same results can be achieved with the application of a warm, wet towel. And at a saving of up to \$20.

If you have any doubts about mail order products or services—or wish to file a complaint after a sad but enlightening experience—contact a Better Business Bureau, or the Post Office Department, Inspection Service, Washington, D. C. 20260. Also,

the attorneys general in a number of states have recently formed consumer fraud divisions which will be helpful.

Remember the "s" in spring could also stand for swindle.
