### AD-LIB-BEN

President Nixon's recent proposal to do some things to halt the run-away in the economy of the United States was fine, except for being a couple of years late.

The President's number of orders will not be discussed here, since we feel sure they have already been aired sufficiently for everybody to have at least a token knowledge of them. All were designed to slow down the spiraling inflation in the U. S. and/or to stabilize the dollar in the world money market.

To the proposals made by the President we would like to suggest another:

We suggest the President propose to the Congress when it convenes again in September that a bill be passed which would cut the salaries of every employee of the Federal Government by 5 per cent.

This would be all inclusive, beginning with President Nixon's salary and going on down through the ranks to the smallest-salaried employee on the Federal payroll.

This small cut would not kill any of the millions who are being paid from the income taxes which all of us pay. This move would cut the Federal expenditure (which Mr. Nixon claims he is trying to do) by several billion dollars. And, it is extremely doubtful if we would lose too awful much help.

This cut would do a great deal toward warding off the \$20 billion-plus deficit which has been predicted for this fiscal year.

In addition, the side effects of this earth shattering move could have a great deal of effect on recovery of the country's economy. It would show that the administration means what it says in trying to curb the inflation which has gnawed away all the benefits which should have re-

## ASCS Has Answers On Freeze

All residents of Coke County may obtain answers to questions on operation and interpretation of the Presidential Order of Aug. 15 on prices, rents, wages and salaries from the Coke County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Office. The announcement was made by Frank Percifull, chairman of the Coke County ASCS Committee.

County ASCS offices throughout the United States have been chosen as information centers to answer questions from all citizens on President Nixon's Executive Order which is designed to stem inflation and strengthen the national economy.

The Coke County ASCS Office is receiving official answers to questions concerning the President's action, and any person in the county who wants precise

information should get in touch with the County Office, Percifull said.

The Coke County ASCS Office is located in the courthouse at Robert Lee. Address is Box 27, Robert Lee and the phone number is 453-2751.

County Executive Director J. E. Quisenberry Jr. is in charge of the office. The office has a staff of two persons, Jessie Faye Russell and Thelma Jo Hinnard.

"Ours and all ASCS offices throughout the nation, will function as information centers in all locations outside of highly urbanized areas," Percifull said. County ASCS offices are not to handle complaints or appeals, he said. They will serve only to provide official information. Persons with complaints will register them with the most convenient district or sub-district office

The 1971-72 school term got underway Monday with about a 10 per cent increase in enrollment over the September figures for last year. On Tuesday this week there was a total enrollment of 335, compared to 304 at the same time last year. Supt. C. B. Barbee said he expected a few more students to enroll during the next few days.

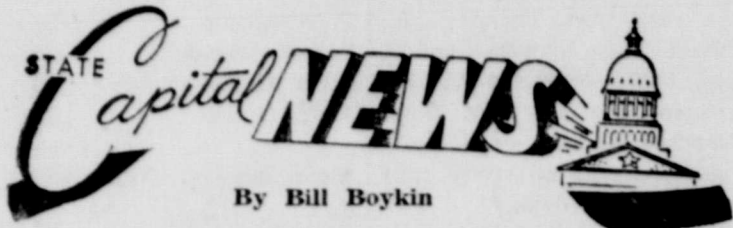

(Editor's note: The following article was written several days ago and quite a few developments have since occurred in the feud between Gov. Preston Smith and the U. S. government.)

Austin — Texas became one of the first states to defy President Nixon's wage freeze order as it applies to public employees and school teachers.

Gov. Preston Smith, after three days of conflicting reports, issued a proclamation instructing agency heads to ignore the Aug. 15 order against pay raises for teachers and state workers. Raises were authorized by the Legislature long ago and funds appropriated for the new budget beginning Sept. 1.

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Bronte

Committee held the opening round in its hearings on stock-loan scandals involving high state officials.

Frank W. Sharp, onetime head of Sharpstown State Bank and National Bankers Life Insurance Company, was the star witness. He told Committee members he and House Speaker Gus Mutscher had a "tacit understanding" that there was a link between stock purchases in NBL by the speaker and passage of banking bills favored by Sharp in 1969.

Speaker Mutscher borrowed money from the Sharpstown Bank to buy the stock as did a few other state officials including Governor Smith.

Sharp denied, however, he ever gave anything of value to a state official in exchange for a political favor.

Former Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, appearing before the Committee, called the federal Securities and Exchange Commission investigation of stock-loan transactions a Republican-inspired political "hatchet job."

**OIL ALLOWABLE CUT**—For the fifth month running, Texas Railroad Commission ordered a reduction in statewide oil allowable, fixing it at 65.1 per cent of potential for September.

Figure is the lowest since August 1970 when it dropped to 62.9 per cent.

September allowable, down slightly from 66.2 per cent for August, will permit a 3,350,493 barrel per day production maximum flow, 45,264 less than the present top.

Nominations by crude oil buyers for next month totalled 3,218,430 barrels daily. That is 24,032 less than August figures.

Only one major producer, Shell, asked more oil in September. Ten asked the same allowable, and three wanted less.

**AG OPINIONS** — Counties adopting workmen's compensation for their employees must carry appropriate insurance or lose common law defense of contributory negligence and assumed risk, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

**WELFARE POLICY CHANGED** — State Board of Public Welfare has changed its policy to permit Old Age Assistance recipients to earn up to \$50 a month without loss of assistance payments, effective Nov. 1.

Under current eligibility rules, only \$7.50 of any income source is exempted in calculating an OAA recipient's budgeted needs for an assistance check.

New policy will exempt the first \$20 of earned income and one-half remainder up to \$80 a month.

Governor said OAA recipients will be permitted a better standard of living and not penalized for working. OAA average monthly grant is about \$62.28.

#### Short Snorts

Governor has been urged to permit the Legislature in special session next year to consider a competitive rate system for auto insurance.

New "Texas Hunting Guide" for 1971-72 is available from Parks and Wildlife Department showing seasons, bag limits and game law summaries.

More than \$1 million has been allocated for restoration and development projects at San Jacinto Battleground and Mission Tejas state parks.

Col. Wilson E. Speir, Texas Department of Public Safety Director, was named lawman of the year by Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Attorney General Martin filed suit again City of Galveston for environmental law violation in refuse disposal and city dump burning.

Sen. Ralph Hall of Rockwall said he will announce for lieutenant governor in September.

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## H D Agent's News Dept.

Jeans are not only making the scene—they are the scene.

From teens to toddlers, jeans are everyone's favorite clothing item for rugged action.

To teenagers, jeans are a high fashion item. The sooner the pants are faded, patched, cut off or fringed, the more important their place in the wardrobe.

But what about the little people — the sliders, fallers, runners, brawlers and instant energizers who run jeans ragged on the playground?

Here are several suggestions for mothers who are buying and caring for jeans of these active youngsters.

The most important feature to check when buying is durability. Even though most youngsters outgrow clothing before it is worn out, they usually go through jeans before their size changes.

Check for these features when shopping: double stitched flat felled seams, double knees, a strong zipper and shrinkage control. Labels supply much of the information.

In addition, some jeans may

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have a guarantee, an insurance of wear. For example, the manufacturer may insure that the knees of the jeans will outwear the rest of the garment.

Remember, if looking for ease in care, check to see that the jeans have permanent press finish.

### Appliances Precautions

Shock from an electrical appliance is a warning of danger. To avoid electrical shocks, a serious burn or even death, follow the simple precautions of electrical safety.

Don't touch water, water pipes or the sink when in contact with an electrical appliance, including a mixer, radio, hair dryer or electric shaver.

Prevent curious children from sticking a knife, fork or bobby pin into a wall plug; buy and install plastic inserts for the plugs in your home. The insert can be easily removed by an adult when the outlet is needed.

Always unplug the toaster before trying to remove toast that is stuck. Avoid putting a fork or any object in the toaster as the wires are not insulated.

To avoid a shock, unplug appliances at the wall outlet before disconnecting the appliance outlet. Always connect the appliance first before plugging the cord into the wall outlet.

Check the wiring in your home. Is it grounded? If the wall plug outlets have three slots for the 3 prongs on the plug, your electrical system is probably grounded. Grounding is particularly important when you are using an appliance defective with age.

If your system is not grounded, improve its safety by grounding the more hazardous appliances. Simply loosen a bolt or screw on the frame of the appliance and fasten one end of the wire under it. Sandpaper a cold water metal pipe and securely clamp the other end of a wire to the pipe. The pipe must be metal—not plastic. For safety have an electrician ground your appliances.

At the first sign of trouble, have your appliance and wiring checked and repaired.

Remember, a slight shock is a warning of danger. Next time it could be worse. Find out what is wrong and get it fixed right away.

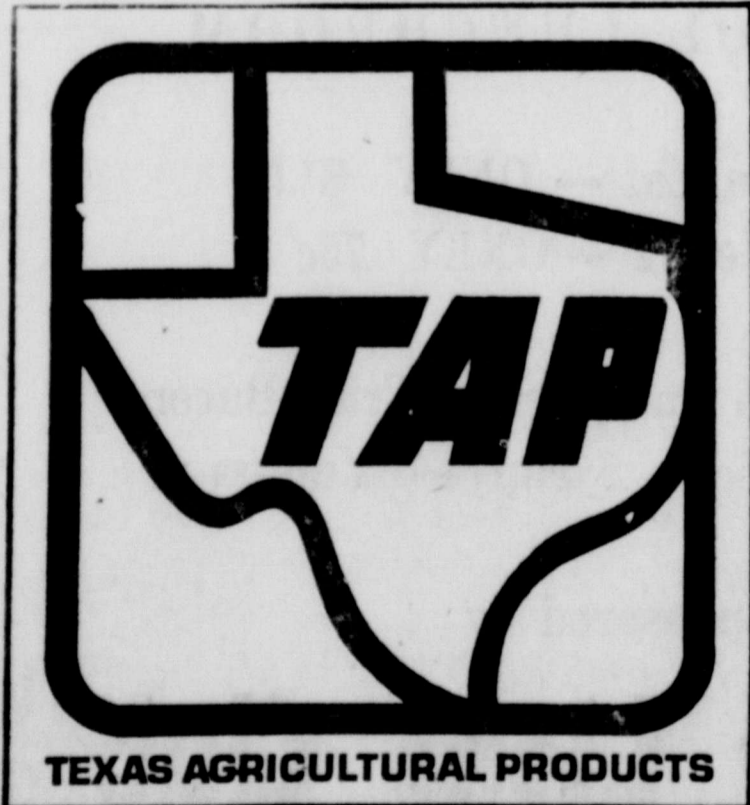

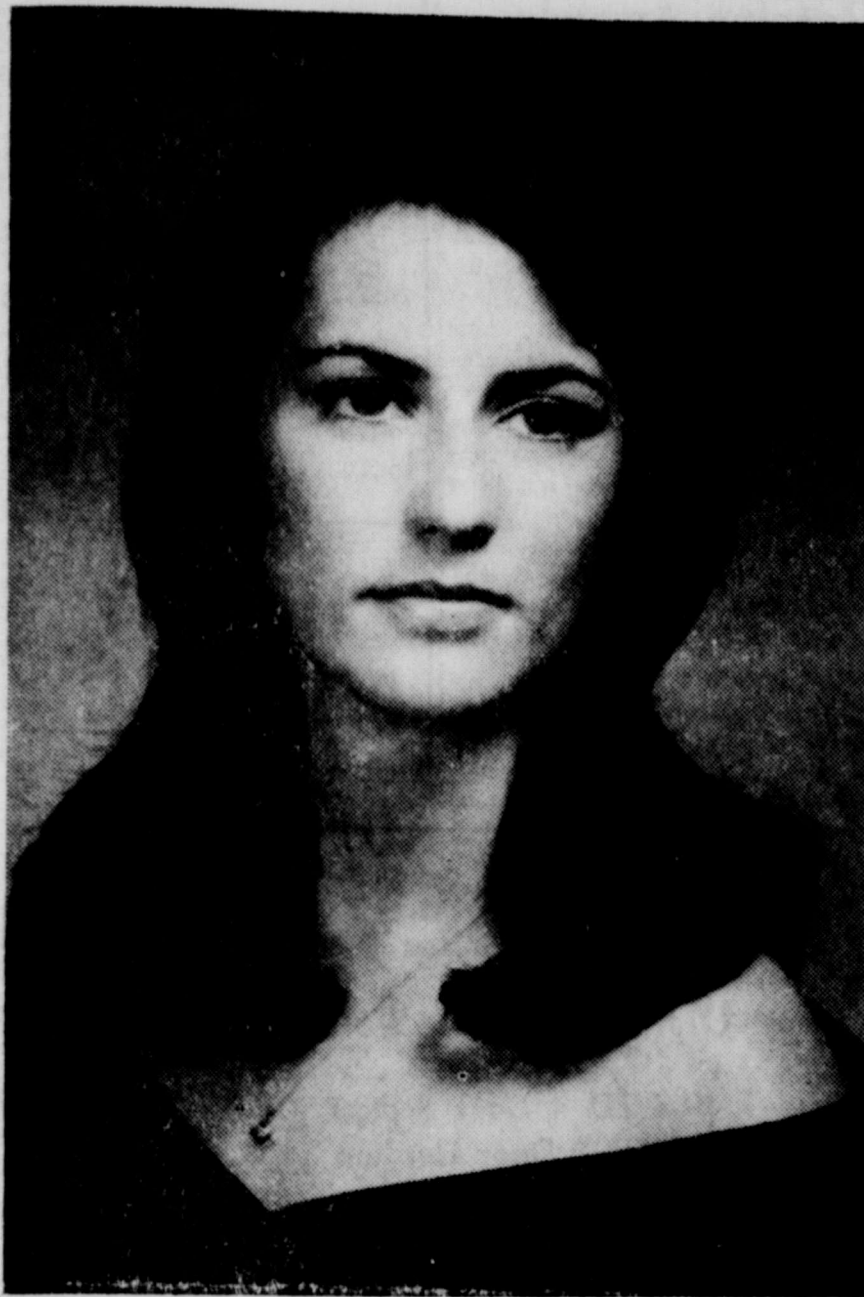

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**Coke Oil Adds To State Total**

Production of Texas crude oil last year again hit an all time high while additions to reserves continued to lag, according to the latest compilation of the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

The state's oil fields produced 1.2 billion barrels of crude, bringing the total for the past 81 years of recorded production to 34.1 billion barrels.

"Economic benefits from the production were felt throughout Texas," said Kenneth E. Montague, association president, "as 205 of the state's 254 counties had producing oil wells. It is unfortunate that more oil was produced than was found in Texas — pulling our reserves down for the third straight year."

Coke County, which has had recorded production since 1942, had a total crude oil output of 158,926,450 barrels up to the beginning of 1971. Coke County production in 1970 was 5,271,940 barrels at the rate of 14,444 barrels daily.

Fifteen counties produced more than 25 million barrels with Andrews topping the list with 71,684,656 barrels followed by Ector with 68,562,247 and Scurry with 58,085,376.

Gregg remained the all-time champion with a cumulative production of 2.2 billion barrels. Ector is second with 1.7 billion barrels.

**Dove Season Will Open Sept. 1**

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has set dates for the state's dove seasons.

There were no changes in bag or possession limits from last year, and each season for 1971-72 will be the same number of days as the previous year's seasons.

The open season on mourning doves in the North Zone will be Sept. 1 through Oct. 30, from 12 noon to sunset. In the South Zone, the dates are Sept. 25 through Nov. 23, except for the counties which have a season for white winged doves. In these counties, the mourning dove season ends Nov. 19. However, mourning doves may be taken in these counties during the white wing season, Sept. 4-5 and 11-12. Shooting hours statewide are 12 noon to sunset.

The daily bag and possession limit is unchanged from last year, at 10 and 20 birds for both species.
