Free, Reduced Price Lunches Now Available

Bronte School officials announced this week the free and reduced price lunch policy for school children unable to pay the full price.

Local school officials adopted a standard family size and income scale table to assist them in determining eligibility.

Families falling within limits of the scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances are urged to apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children.

Application forms have been sent home with students along with a letter to parents and additional copies are available in the offices of the elementary and high school principals. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form requests information needed to determine economic need based on income and number of persons in the family, as well as other unusual circumstances which affect the family's ability to pay for lunches. All information will be treated as confidential.

Elementary Prin. James M. Raughton and High School Prin. James L. Golson will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling he may appeal the decision to Supt. Barbee.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each of the principals' offices and in the superintendent's office and may be reviewed by any interested person.

Mrs. Roe To Receive HD Award

Mrs. Fay Roe, Coke County home demonstration agent, has been named to receive the highest award given by the National Association of Extension Home Economists — the Distinguished Service Award for 1971.

One of five Texans selected for the award, she will be honored during the annual meeting of the association Sept. 25-Oct. 1 in Miami, Fla.

The Coke County home demonstration agent was nominated by the County Home Demonstration Agents' Association of Texas, and approved by the national group, according to Miss Pauline McWilliams, Midland County home demonstration agent and chairman of the state association's Distinguished Service Awards committee.

Winners of the top award have shown their abilities as leaders, organizers and educators both in 4-H and adult Extension work. Miss McWilliams said.

Mrs. Roe has more than 19 years Extension work to her credit, having served as home demonstration agent in Smith County for one year before moving to Coke County where she has been agent for over 18 years. She received her B. S. degree in home demonstration work from Texas Woman's University and has done additional work at Texas A&M University.

She carries on a well rounded 4-H program in Coke County working in all areas of Home Economics. Her interest in 4-H and Extension is an outgrowth

A new law is now in effect that requires all children entering Texas elementary or secondary schools to have been immunized against six diseases: diphtheria, tetanus, polio, measles, rubella and smallpox. The law also states that the State Department of Health shall provide the required immunizations in areas where no local provision exists to provide these services.

Firms to Close For Labor Day

Most Bronte businesses will be closed Monday in observance of Labor Day.

First National Bank will be closed, as Labor Day is one of the holidays to be observed under a new law effective Sept. 1 which sets up bank holidays.

The Bronte post office, city hall and county offices in both Bronte and Robert Lee will be closed. Bronte Schools will not have a holiday and buses will run and classes will meet as usual.

Businesses reporting that they will be closed include Sims Food Store, White Auto Store, Margaret's Flowers, Cumbie & Mackey and The Bronte Enterprise. There probably are others.

For those who do not take the long weekend out of town, a community picnic is planned in the Bronte County Park.

Community Picnic Set for Monday

There will be a community picnic at 6:30 p.m. in the park on Labor Day, next Monday. Everyone is invited to attend. No program is planned and it will be an opportunity for visiting.

Each family is asked to bring food, drinks and dishes enough for their own and it will be spread picnic style.

The event is sponsored informally by the churches of the community.

Bronte Supt. C. B. Barbee said that next Tuesday, Sept. 7, is the date for the first immunizations in Bronte Schools. He said that unless students can produce certified evidence that they have had the immunizations, they will be required to take them.

After the first immunizations next Tuesday, two succeeding dates will be set for the follow-ups, one date in October and one in November. These dates will be announced later. Kindergarten students are also required to have the complete immunizations.

Records will be kept by the school concerning the immunization status of all students.

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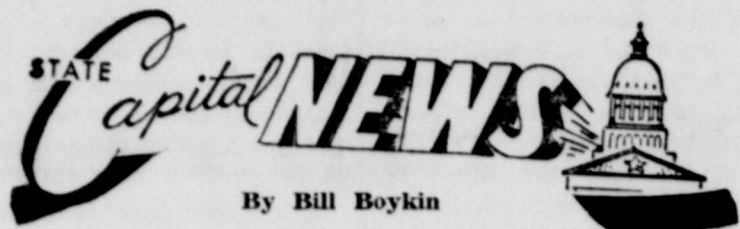

Austin — The Legislative Redistricting Board, its hands tied by a court order, has called for a staff research toward reapportionment of both the Texas House and Senate.

If the Board were permanently enjoined from action, the thorny reapportionment chore may be handed back to the Legislature in a special session this fall. The Board was created in 1948 to redistrict where a legislature fails to do so in its first regular session after a decennial census.

Day before the five-member panel was to meet and begin work on Senate realignment (a task left undone by the Legislature this year), an Austin judge entered a temporary restraining order. At the same time, Judge Herman Jones set a hearing for Sept. 2 on a petition for an injunction.

Rep. Fred Head of Henderson filed the suit to stop Board action, contending 1970 census figures are not yet all in, and that reapportionment should wait until the 1973 Legislature.

On Aug. 2 Judge Jones declared the House version of reapportionment by the Legislature this year unconstitutional. Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has promised an appeal to the Texas Supreme Court.

Meanwhile, Martin who was named temporary chairman of the redistricting board in absentia, left a message expressing hope that the panel will begin work "at the earliest possible date" on House reapportionment

in event the High Court rules that is its duty.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, another member of the Board, also called for early staff attention to a House redistricting bill, although both he and Martin agreed Senate reapportionment is the first objective.

Board has 20 separate plans already submitted for recarving the Senate's 31 districts in line with the 1970 census and federal court rulings of substantially equal population for each.

"FREEZE" BRINGS SUMMER CHILL — The President's wage-price freeze continued to be the closest watched and fastest changing news event at the state capitol.

Gov. Preston Smith's proclamation to state agencies to disregard the presidential order and place pay raises for state employees in effect Sept. 1 was quickly held invalid by Attorney General Martin.

Martin then went to Washington to plead for exceptions for state workers and school teachers who had been assured raises by legislative action and (in the cases of teachers) valid contract well before the freeze order date, Aug. 15.

Meanwhile, Texas State Employees Association filed a formal petition for exemption of 60,000 state employees from the order and hinted at court action if refused.

Teachers kept close watch on Washington announcements to see if subsequent federal agency

rulings would permit their raises covered by contracts signed prior to Aug. 15 to be granted Sept. 1.

INFO OFFICES OPENED — Internal Revenue Service announced opening of nine offices in southern Texas to answer questions, study complaints and investigate alleged violations of the wage-price freeze.

Offices are located at IRS headquarters in Austin, Beaumont, Waco, Corpus Christi, El Paso, San Antonio, Houston, Harlingen and McAllen.

Questions on new import duty surcharge will be referred to the Office of Customs in Houston.

LABOR DAY TOLL PREDICTED — Fifty-two may lose their lives in traffic accidents during the long Labor Day weekend, predicts the Department of Public Safety.

If Texans can't drive more safely than that, Governor Smith told his traffic Safety Committee, serious consideration may have to be given to declaring a state of emergency on three day holidays and calling out the National Guard to supplement police activities.

Smith's committee reviewed plans for an intensive Labor Day Safety campaign.

DPS Director Col. Wilson E. Speir urged motorists to refrain from drinking while driving, to avoid fatigue and to modify driving speed in accord with heavy traffic conditions.

All uniformed officers of DPS will be on highways Friday through Monday to enforce traffic laws. Maximum use will be made of radar and breath testing devices. DPS special reports on fatal accidents will continue.

AG OPINIONS — Public junior colleges may charge tuition in amounts greater than rates specified by the Legislature and may authorize additional fees, Attorney General Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

* Provision that an owner may record and use more than one brand or mark to identify his livestock remains in effect.

* State employees can travel first class on airlines if no tourist class seats are available — and are entitled to out of state travel expenses up to \$35 a day.

* Legislation relating to eminent domain proceedings does not violate constitutional requirements of deposit of money. Bill aimed to provide condemnors "full benefits at any stage of litigation process short of final adjudication."

POOR DISTRICTS TO GET AID — School districts with the most children from low income families will get \$822,456 in additional federal aid under new grant allotments announced last week.

A total of 641 districts are eligible for aid to finance teacher hire, materials purchase and medical services. Allocations range from \$69,995 for Houston to \$31 for Hamby district, Taylor County.

Motorists no longer can stop and then pass a school bus loading or unloading children under a law effective Aug. 30.

A 214 acre tract in Collin County has been donated for a state park.

Bowhunters will get a special chance at deer, javelina and wild hogs during Aransas National Wildlife Refuge archery season Sept. 17-30.

State (in San Antonio North Expressway case) is testing a federal court ruling that it cannot build a highway with its own money if application for federal assistance is rejected.

Thirty-seven applications to sell \$33.3 million in securities were filed with State Securities Board last week.

Perfumes, Fabrics Don't Mix

Fashion separates are made to mix and match. But the same isn't true for perfumes and fabrics.

Perfume or cologne applied directly to clothing may result in dye rings, color removal and permanent stains. And upon aging, a disagreeable odor may result.

Garments and fabrics may also be stained by perfumed grooming aids, such as hair spray and deodorants.

For washable garments and fabrics, remove the perfume stain by washing immediately in a detergent and hot water solution, followed with a bleach safe for the fabric.

For a solid perfume stain, first stretch the washable fabric over a bowl and drop warm alcohol over the spot, then rinse. Follow by laundering in a solution of detergent and warm water.

If a garment is not washable, immediately take it to a reputable dry cleaner. Be sure to identify the stain for the most satisfactory results.

Perfumes and colognes should be applied behind the ears or at the wrists, to avoid contact with clothing.

Botulism Dangerous in Food

A harmful bacteria sometimes found in perishable picnic foods and improperly canned and smoked foods is the botulin toxin.

Poor food handling practices—lack of sanitation, insufficient cooking and improper storage—may allow bacteria in food to increase to dangerous levels.

And, the hot summer months are especially conducive to bac-

teria growth, as perishable foods are carried on picnics and cook-outs without proper refrigeration. During this time, outbreaks of illness from contaminated foods are common.

At the grocery, improperly canned or smoked foods can be contaminated with the botulin toxin. In fact, some canned foods have recently been recalled by the Food and Drug Administration after they were found to contain the toxin.

One way to spot contaminated canned foods is to check for swelling or leaking. But that contamination will not always cause a can or jar lid to swell or leak.

Careless home canning can also cause contamination, so the danger of food poisoning is not limited to commercially packed foods.

Symptoms of botulism, the illness caused by the botulin toxin, usually develop within 12 to 36 hours after eating food containing the toxin. The fatality rate is high—about 65 per cent in the U. S.

To guard against this type of food poisoning, here are some suggestions:

Cook food for home canning at least 30 minutes at 240 degrees F.

Avoid use of food from swollen or leaking cans or jars.

Always wash hands after handling any leaking can or jar.

And, return any swollen or leaking food cans or jars to the store where purchased, not only to get your money back but also to alert the manager to the possible danger of contaminated food.

Consumer Clips

Chilled cranberry juice with a scoop of fruit sherbet makes a great starter for a summer meal. Cranberry juice is in plentiful supply.

You needn't worry if the meat around the bones of some chickens looks reddish brown — even after cooking. It's safe to eat. Broilers-fryers tend to show this effect because they're marketed young, at six to eight weeks. Their bone marrow has not fully hardened and the red blood cells seep into the surrounding meat, causing a deep red or brown color. Broiler-fryers are a good summer barbecue idea.

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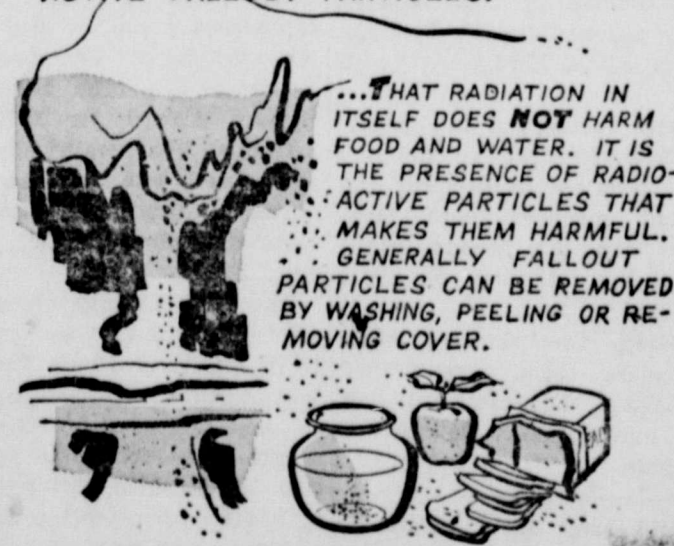

CRMWD Opens Spence Reservoir To Water Skiers

CRMWD opened the E. V. Spence Reservoir for water skiing last weekend, in a limited area near the dam, according to R. A. Schooling, administrative assistant. He said that since the recent catch of water skiing will be permitted in the deep water near the dam, but it will not be permitted in the creek systems or upstream past the bluffs on the north side of the reservoir until further notice.

He said extreme caution must be used in boating and skiing because of floating objects in the lake, caused by the recent rises.

Boat Ramps Open

Two of the proposed boat launching ramps, one in the Wildcat Recreation area and one in the Paint Creek area, both on the south side of the lake, are open for use though they are not completed. The lower extremities are concreted and extend into the water deep enough to accommodate launching any size boat.

Water Safety Rules

Game Warden R. L. Flanagan announced some water safety rules and regulations also this week. He said that Coast Guard approved life preservers are required for every person aboard any boat and that ski belts cannot be accepted. Children 12 years of age and under must wear the preservers at all times while in a boat.

Other requirements include: rear view mirror must be attached to boat when pulling a skier; a certificate of number must be aboard the boat at all times and the number must be displayed on the side of the boat in a color contrasting to that of the hull of the boat; and a fire extinguisher is required in any motor boat which has any enclosed compartments capable of holding gas fumes.

Picnicking and Camping

Schooling said that because of the limited facilities for picnicking and camping at the reservoir, the public is asked to cooperate with the CRMWD in placing all trash in barrels located in public areas around the lake. He reminded that shoreline other than the public areas is privately owned and should not be crossed without the owner's permission.

Persons between the ages of 17-65 must have a recreation permit to fish, ski or boat ride at the lake. Permits are for sale in Robert Lee at most bait stands and filling stations. Permits are not required for picnicking or sightseeing.

Schooling said water in the lower part of the lake is clear and fishing should continue to improve. An additional stock of game fish have been added to the reservoir in recent weeks.

County Ranchmen Have Six Months To Record Brands in Clerk's Office

Coke County ranchmen have six months after Aug. 30 to record their brands in the office of County Clerk Mrs. Winnie Waldrop. Senate Bill No. 249 went into effect the first of this month and every rancher and farmer in the county who uses a brand must record it within this time limit.

The text of the bill is being run in this newspaper, in order that all ranchmen may familiar-

ize themselves with its provisions.

Mrs. Waldrop said there are some provisions in the new law which may need clarification.

For example, she said, ranchmen who have recorded brands since 1943 in the County Clerk's office still have prior rights to that particular brand. She pointed out that brands which were recorded prior to 1943 and have not been recorded since then may be the property of the first person who records them after Aug. 30.

After the expiration of six months from Aug. 30, all records of brands now in existence in the clerk's office will no longer be in effect. This provision of the new law makes it imperative that every ranchman in the county record his brand again during this six months period, if he wishes to continue ownership and use of the brand.

The law provides, further, that all brands must be re-registered every 10 years.

Mrs. Waldrop said the process of looking up brands which have been registered since 1943 will take quite a lot of time. She reminded Coke County ranchers that there is no need to stampede the clerk's office if they are sure they have one recorded since 1943, as they have six months to take care of this matter.

NEW LONG DISTANCE RATES STALLED BY PRICE FREEZE

President Nixon's wage-price freeze will delay inauguration of new long distance telephone rates for calls within Texas.

L. L. Porter, traffic director of General Telephone, said lower rates for customers who dial their own intrastate long distance calls would have gone into effect Sept. 1. But the rate changes were coupled with higher rates for persons placing long distance calls through the operator, causing conflict with the wage-price guidelines.

He said the long distance rate changes would be delayed until termination of the wage-price freeze, and then would have to follow guidelines which become effective at the end of the 90 day freeze.

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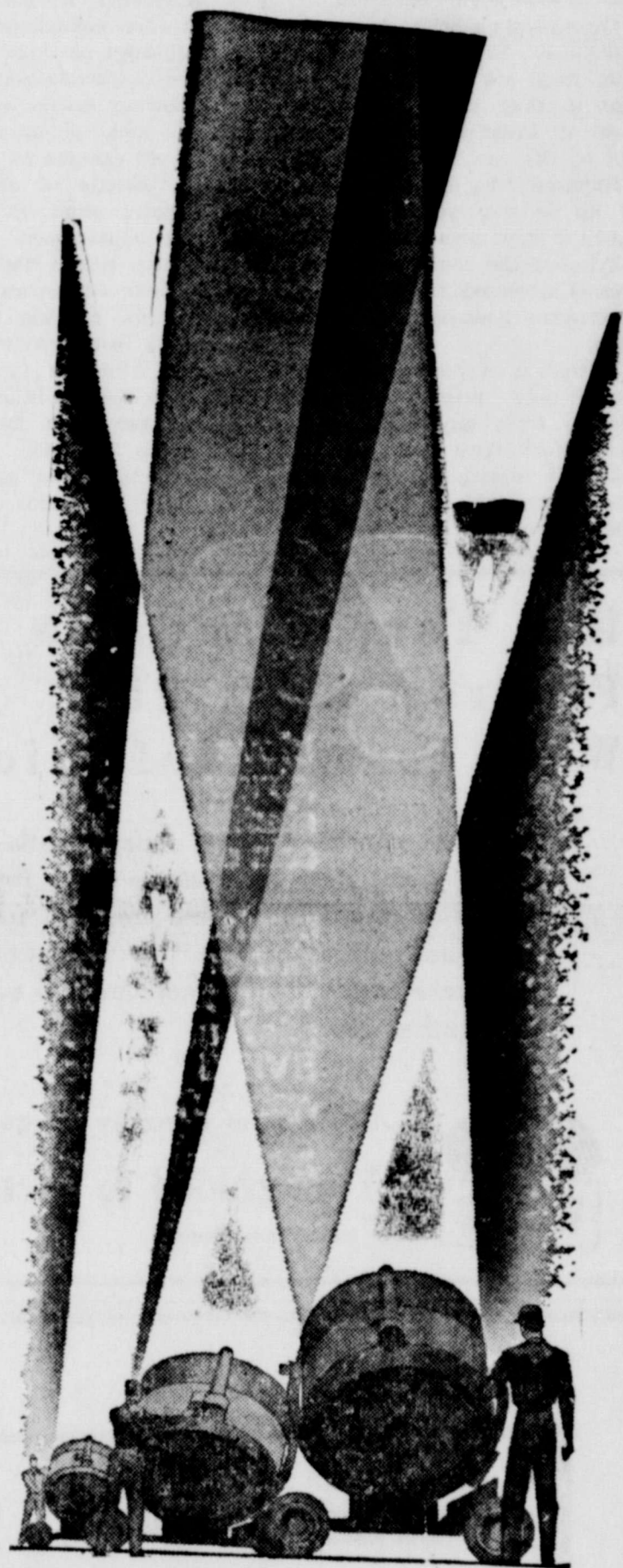

New Auto Laws Effective Monday

Dozens of new state laws, concerning automobiles, went into effect Monday morning, Aug. 30, with probably the most controversial one requiring auto owners to set brakes and remove keys when leaving their cars unattended.

Drivers must now obey a new set of "rules of the road," passed to keep Texas in line with the Federal Uniform Vehicle Code.

A driver is required to set the brake and remove keys before leaving his car unattended. A fine of \$1-\$200 is provided for the misdemeanor violation.

Overcrowding of a car also is prohibited. More than three persons may not occupy the front seat if they block the driver's view or interfere with his control of the car.

Habitual drug users can be jailed up to two years and fined \$1,000 if they even drive a car.

Price of the four year driver's license increased from \$6 to \$7. Specialized licenses will cost \$1 more.

Policemen investigating accidents may remove inspection stickers from any damaged vehicle when they feel the auto will need repairs before meeting safety standards. The vehicle would have to be re-inspected

within 30 days.

Other New Laws

Other news laws taking effect Monday:

* New trespass law, providing a fine up to \$200 for entering land for any purpose where owner has given notice entry is forbidden.

* A misdemeanor providing a \$200 fine against credit rating bureaus that knowingly give out incorrect information about a person's credit worthiness, standing or capacity.

* A heavier penalty for persons bootlegging tapes, or for taping a record for re-sale, or for selling such a tape without permission of the company that manufactured the disc.

* Authorize the state to provide "tuition equalization grants" of up to \$600 per year for needy students at private colleges.

* Allowing college administrators to kick potential troublemakers off campus for four days during "periods of disruption."

* Require employers to rehire National Guardsmen called to active duty within the state.

* Prohibit employers from firing persons because they filed workmen's compensation claims or were witnesses in cases involving on the job injuries.

* Increase fines for littering highway to \$50-\$400.

Plus a number of other lesser laws which went into effect last Monday.

S. B. No. 249

AN ACT

relating to the recording and re-recording of livestock brands and marks; and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

(d) Immediately upon the taking effect of this Act the county clerk of the county shall have this Act published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of thirty days. The publication shall be paid for by the county out of the general county fund.

Sec. 2. All clerks in re-registering brands shall comply with Articles 6890 through 6899, inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, and with Section 1, Chapter 273, Acts of the 41st Legislature, 1929, as amended (Article 6899a, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes), and shall also be aware of and comply with Articles 1484, 1485, and 1486 of the Penal

Code of Texas, 1925.

Sec. 3. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be re-registered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act.

Sec. 4. The importance of this legislation and the crowded condition of the calendars in both Houses create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional Rule requiring bills to be read on three several days in each House be suspended, and this Rule is hereby suspended; and that this Act take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

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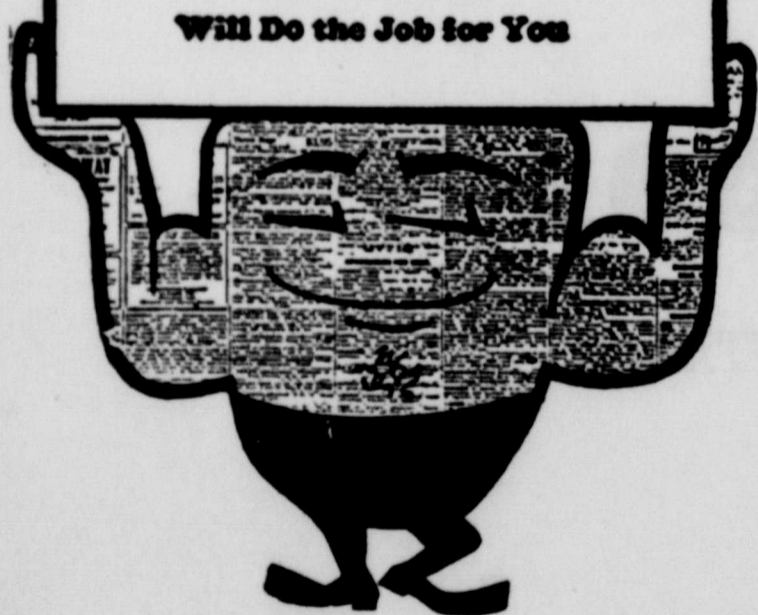
