### Billy Graham Film Coming Sept. 16

The latest Billy Graham film, "Lost Generation," features special appearances by Art Linkletter and "Dragnet" star Jack Webb.

Linkletter, whose daughter Diane died as the result of the use of drugs, discusses drug usage in America, and points to what is being done voluntarily by many teenagers to combat the problem. Webb states his views on the role of the police officer and his relationship to the laws of our society.

"Lost Generation," filmed in Eastmancolor by World Wide Pictures, is a probing documentary which takes a close look at the attitudes and morals of the nation. Location filming was done in Alaska, the Southern states, on the farms and in the small towns of mid-America, and in the dying Haight-Ashbury hippie district of San Francisco.

"Lost Generation" will be shown Thursday, Sept. 16, at the First Baptist Church in Bronte. There will be no admission charge for the 8:30 p.m. showing. The Rev. Harry Morris, pastor of the church, extends a cordial invitation to the public.

### Texas Hunting Not Too Good

Topsy-turvy weather conditions have thrown a curve at the Texas hunter this year.

Texas Park and Wildlife Department officials say overall hunting prospects this fall appear only "fair" for the major game species—deer, turkey, quail and squirrel.

And early reports from the field indicate the North Zone mourning dove season which opened this week also has been less than spectacular.

The weather, which always is a key factor in wildlife production, played some nasty tricks in 1971. A bone dry winter and early spring was followed by rains and even flooding in many areas by mid-summer.

This pattern of extremes had mixed effect on wildlife, department officials pointed out. Reproduction of both furred and feathered game was down in virtually the entire state, with turkeys and quail suffering the heaviest losses from the weather.

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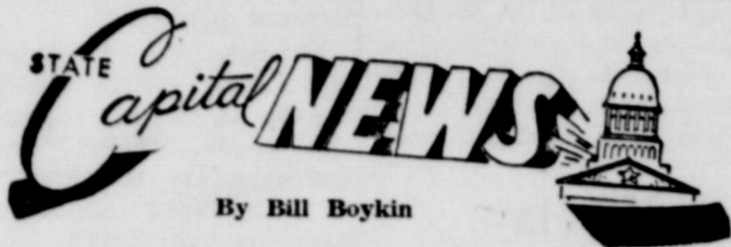

Austin — Gov. Preston Smith sprang one surprise after another in announcing appointments to key state positions.

One of the biggest was selection of his longtime legal aide and top political campaign worker, Robert D. (Bob) Bullock, formerly of Hillsboro, as Secretary of State, succeeding Martin Dies Jr.

A few days earlier, he selected another staff assistant, V. Larry Teaver of Lubbock, to the State Board of Insurance. Surprise here was that Teaver did not replace Durwood Manford, veteran member of the board.

Manford got a new six year term and Charles D. Mathews, a Dallas trucking executive and

attorney until two years ago, was moved from the board to an Austin district judgeship.

Teaver replaces Mathews when the freshman board member became judge of the new 200th Travis County district court.

Smith stirred some controversy by naming a successor to Brig. Gen. James M. Rose as assistant general of Texas for air. On recommendation of Maj. Gen. Ross Ayers, state adjutant general, he picked Lt. Col. Belisario D. J. Flores of San Antonio for the Air National Guard command.

**REDISTRICTING MOVES ON** — A two way legislative redistricting fight moved toward a Supreme Court decision last week.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin filed briefs in appeal from the Aug. 2 district court ruling that the House of Representatives reapportionment this year is unconstitutional because it improperly violates county lines. Martin said the one-man-one-vote rule of federal courts eliminates state constitutional provision safeguarding county lines.

At the same time, 53rd District Judge Herman Jones refused to prevent the Texas Legislative Redistricting Board from reapportioning the State Senate and said the Board may also do preliminary House realignment. Time for attack on board's work, concluded Jones, is when it finishes.

Rep. Fred Head of Henderson brought suit in Jones' court to prevent the Board from redistricting House and Senate. He contended new census data is not complete and that reapportionment should be left until 1973. Head indicated efforts will be

made to get his suit before the Supreme Court at the same time as the attack on House reapportionment of the regular session.

**TAX STUDY LAUNCHED** — New Legislative Property Tax Committee began a four year study of how property taxation can be made "fair, viable and efficient."

Sen. Jim Bates of Edinburg was named chairman of the group and Jack Hart of Midland, staff director.

Hart noted a recent decision of the California Supreme Court may make the Texas committees' job more difficult. California court held reliance on property taxes alone to finance public schools is unconstitutional.

Committee's work is being financed by a charge of \$1 per delinquent tax receipt authorized by the Legislature this year. Among goals is computerization of ad valorem tax records on a statewide basis.

**AG OPINIONS** — A justice of the peace who is not an attorney must have served a minimum of two terms of four years each to be exempt from attending a 40 hour course of instruction for non-lawyers.

Martin said governor's veto of funds for payment of court costs will handicap his office in prosecution and defense of state cases.

**WATER PLAN ALIVE** — Master \$10 billion water plan to move surplus Mississippi River water to Texas Plains farms is still alive, according to Harry Burleigh, executive director of the Texas Water Development Board.

Burleigh urged campaign to win congressional support of plan in 1973, when federal agency water conservation report is due.

Although Texans rejected \$3.5 billion bond issue to finance the state's share of giant project, it is believed much of the money can now be obtained from the federal government, Burleigh indicated. Two groups, West Texas Chamber of Commerce and Water, Inc., are spearheading the new drive for financing.

**WELFARE CUT DELAYED** — Start of new fiscal year Sept. 1 did not bring reduced aid to fatherless welfare families, even though Texans refused to raise \$80 million a year categorical benefit ceiling last spring.

Cuts are expected in a few months, however, State Welfare Department reports. Average of \$118.53 per month assistance for families with dependent children is expected to remain through January.

New program for paying medicine bills of welfare recipients through separate program helped postpone reduction, Welfare Department said.

**Short Snorts**  
Texas motor vehicle registrations topped 7.5 million mark for first time during registration year which ended March 31. Figure was 7,515,053, plus 120,295 exempt registrations.

New Texas Film Commission launched last week to get more movie production companies to work in state.

Top government and business leaders will brief Texas industrialists on economic and manufacturing developments at governor's conference here Oct. 13-14.

Texans spent \$283 million on new autos from 1,700 franchised dealers last year. All new car dealers after Dec. 1 must have special license from new Texas Motor Vehicle Commission.

Leaving keys in a car is a misdemeanor under new state law. Overcrowding a car is also prohibited, as is failure to set brakes.

U. S. Attorney General intends to hold busing to "absolute minimum" in school integration, a state Republican official reported.

and a faith in the future. A great nation without self-confidence is as unlikely to continue its greatness as a businessman who is without determination.

It has been said in this space before, likely government has promised too much to too many. When these expectations failed to materialize in a short time, many people seem to lack the maturity to deal with adversity.

Black leaders castigate the whole system of government as racist because inequalities and prejudices persist. The fact that comparative gains have been made is overlooked.

Civil libertarians characterize our government as "repressive." They ignore all evidence that never in history has there been a freer age than this.

Many of the young disparage society as "unresponsive." The fact is, never has a society been more oriented towards child welfare and the young than today.

In short, there seems to be missing in our society that sense of proportion upon which all good and healthy conditions depend.

Our rivals on the world scene — the Russians and Red Chinese — are able, determined, thrusting, and are evidently endowed with a strong sense of purpose, of destiny, and, yes, patriotism. They have their problems, no doubt about that, but their national and international goals and ambitions appear to be intact, uneaten by the cancer of disbelief.

No suggestion or even inference is being made that we should blindly trust all the cliches and slogans which constantly bombard us — it is our inherent right, duty and responsibility to seek truth on which to base our trust. In fact, the acceptance of "everyone knows" such and such may be contributing to our disturbance. A recent development may be a good example. Since Rachel Carson's book, "Silent Spring," "everyone has known" that DDT is an awful thing. Now Dr. Philip Handler, president of the prestigious National Academy of Sciences, says that no harm to humans has been proved and "the tales of damage to fish and wildlife appear to have been woefully exaggerated." A dozen or so top ranking scientists support this opinion. In this instance "what everyone knows" is wrong. The application can doubtless be made in many other correct situations.

Ben Jonson once observed that "next to truth, a confirmed error does well."

Back to our doubts, fears and distrust, just maybe we need to recapture what seems to be our last innocence. Putting it another way, maybe our sophistication has run away with us.

Referring to us as a nation, Emerson said, "We should have reached a maturity to prove that we are capable of listening, not only to what the hours tell us, but what centuries whisper."

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**S. B. No. 249  
AN ACT**

relating to the recording and re-recording of livestock brands and marks; and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

(d) Immediately upon the taking effect of this Act the county clerk of the county shall have this Act published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of thirty days. The publication shall be paid for by the county out of the general county fund.

Sec. 2. All clerks in re-regis-

tering brands shall comply with Articles 6890 through 6899, inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, and with Section 1, Chapter 273, Acts of the 41st Legislature, 1929, as amended (Article 6899a, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes), and shall also be aware of and comply with Articles 1484, 1485, and 1486 of the Penal Code of Texas, 1925.

Sec. 3. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be re-registered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act.

Sec. 4. The importance of this legislation and the crowded condition of the calendars in both Houses create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional Rule requiring bills to be read on three several days in each House be suspended, and this Rule is hereby suspended; and that this Act take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

Among the greatest pleasures of sewing is the opportunity to choose for yourself the combination of color, texture, and silhouette to flatter and express you and to blend in a practical working team. Here's your chance to use fashion sense.

Here, also, is the step where you assemble the materials and tools that will be the real medium for your sewing endeavors. This combination of theoretical and practical knowledge will pave your way toward rave reviews in both artistry and the craftsmanship of fur sewing.

**The Long and Short of Fur**

From your experience with clingy crepes and chunky tweeds, you probably already realize how important it is to understand the interplay between fabric and figure. A smashing fur garment uses the same principles — only more so!

First, know your own physical pros and cons. Then learn what combination of style and fur will play up the assets and minimize the defects. To choose a great pattern and the perfect fur, you'll need some facts — both aesthetic and technical.

The key to designing in fur is this: make sure the weight of the fur and the lines of the pattern complement the shape of you. Different hints apply according to whether the hair is long or short, regardless of whether it's real or fake.

**Long Fur Pointers**

For the furs with hair longer than 3/4 inch, you'll need to use your keen eye for proportion. If an entire garment of long, shaggy fur would overwhelm you, but you love the look of it, start thinking like a designer.

BALANCE the proportion. In a skirt, a long haired fur can make heavy hips and legs look huge, but in a vest it will draw the eye away.

Use ACCESSORIES! Thin legs and arms will look much more so in a big, shaggy garment, but boots and gloves can be perfect visual foils.

Try PARING DOWN the silhouette by using a leather or a leather look for the bodice and trim, or coordinate a fur jacket with a smooth knit fabric for sleeves and pants.

CAMOUFLAGE is a great game to play with long fur. In a coat with just the right proportions, it may be your best figure flatterer. A voluminous cape gives no impression of fitting—and disguises figure faults for both over and under endowed.

men. Choose a double knit fabric of wool, cotton or polyester from the men's selections now available in piece goods departments and shops.

It's important to choose menswear double knits. They have finer yarns and tighter construction, creating light weight fabrics with a crisp hand.

It is recommended to select pocket and band interlining fabrics compatible with the outer fabric. For instance, a washable interlining should accompany a washable outer fabric such as polyester.

Before construction, preshrink all washable fabrics, including the outer fabric as well as inner fabrics and zipper.

Pattern companies are now including more selections for men. Choose slack patterns according to waist measurement. When using double knit, always select styles designed especially for knits as they have less ease, al-

lowing for stretchable qualities of the fabric.

If not currently sewing for your man, consider the idea and find out what's available. And soon, you may have to make time to sew your own fashions.

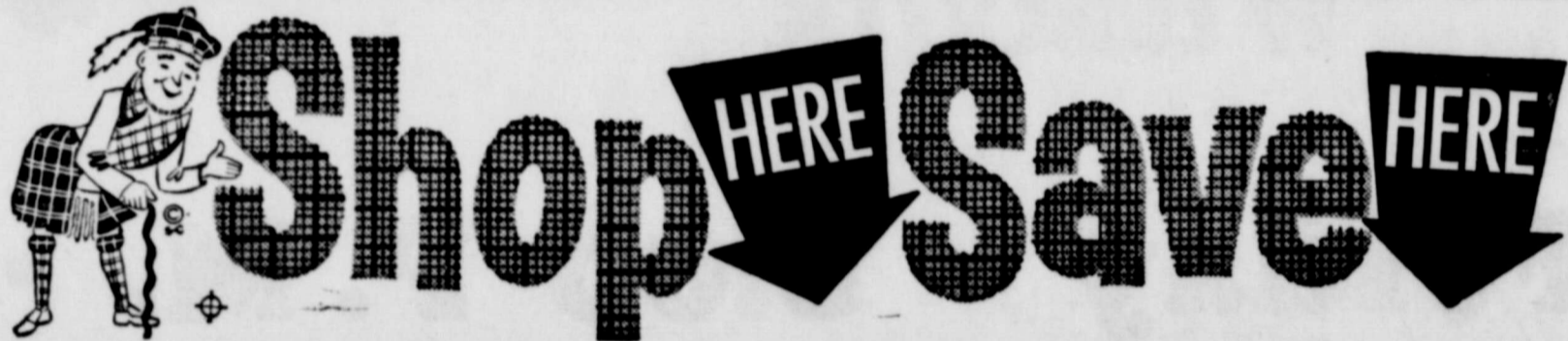
