Glenn, Gallaway Elected Directors

In extremely light voting Tuesday, D. K. Glenn was reelected and Louis Gallaway was elected as directors for the Coke County Kickapoo Water Control and Improvement District No. 1.

There were 18 votes cast, all for Glenn and Gallaway. Gallaway replaces Norman Kiker, whose term expired this year and did not run for reelection.

Votes were canvassed Thursday morning and directors made their annual inspection tour of the flood control dams on the Kickapoo Creeks north of Bronte.

Holdover directors who have another year to serve are Preston Davis, Royce Fancher and Carroll Robbins.

Jr. Stockmen Have Good Show

Another successful Coke County Livestock Show was unreeled Monday in Robert Lee with a total of 147 animals in competition. There were 98 pigs, 42 sheep and seven cattle shown.

The young stockmen had a beautiful day to show their animals, which was quite different from stock show day on several occasions during recent years.

Sixty of the animals sold at the sale following the show for \$2325 and about \$600 in prize money was awarded. In the open bidding the six champions sold for \$705. The floor price on lambs, by Simpson Brothers, was \$30 per hundredweight, and \$23 on pigs by the Coke County Livestock Association.

C. B. Barbee Named to Committees To Study Financing Texas Schools

Supt. C. B. Barbee has been named to two statewide committees to study school financing for Texas. Urgency of coming up with a new plan for providing money to finance public education was brought into sharp focus recently when a three man panel of federal judges ruled the present ad valorem tax system unconstitutional. The trip allowed the state two years to do some changing.

Barbee, who is state president of the Texas Small Schools Association, has been named to an 11 member committee of Texas State Teachers Association and also to the Lieutenant Governor's Committee.

He is sitting in distinguished company with the other 10 members, including Dr. W. A. Miller, superintendent at Crane; Dr. Dana Williams, superintendent at Corpus Christi; Dr. Dale Douglas, assistant superintendent at Richardson; Dr. Charles Matthews, superintendent at Longview; W. P. Wright, school board member from Abilene; Sam Amberson, superintendent at Big Spring;

Earl F. Glenn, chairman of the board and president of the bank, said this week that deposits on the date of a call by the Comptroller of the Currency, on Dec. 31, stood at an all time high of \$3,593,803.23.

At the same time he announced the promotions as voted by stockholders in a meeting this week.

Snead New Executive VP

B. D. Snead, longtime vice president and cashier, was promoted to executive vice president, to head the list of promotions.

Mrs. Charlie (Virginia) Boecking was promoted from assistant cashier to vice president of the bank. Taking a new job as cashier is Mrs. Jerry (Wanda) Parker. Mrs. Stanley (Kay) Daulong is advancing to the position of assistant cashier.

Fancher New Director

At the stockholders meeting, Royce Fancher was elected a director of the bank. Fancher is a well known rancher and civic leader of the community.

Glenn said deposits might have been higher at some date than they were on Dec. 31, 1971, but they were higher at that time than ever before on a date for a report to the Comptroller of the Currency.

The deposits of \$3,593,803.23 on the last day of 1971 exceeded the \$3,233,034.89 on deposit Dec. 31, 1970, by \$360,768.34. The end of the year figure also exceeded the June 30, 1971, figure of \$3,241,807.97 by \$351,995.26. It exceeded the Sept. 30, 1971, figure of \$3,508,061.57 by \$85,741.66.

Loans have also increased during the past year. Out on loan on Dec. 31, 1971, was \$1,909,783.70, compared to \$1,468,770.79 on Dec. 31, 1970, an increase of \$441,012.91. This figure, when compared with the loans on June 30, 1971, of \$1,615,948.29, shows an increase of \$293,835.41. When compared with the Sept. 30, 1971, figure of \$1,663,898.20, an increase of \$245,885.50 is shown.

Total assets of the bank gained almost correspondingly to the gain in deposits. On Dec. 31, 1971, total of all accounts amounted to \$4,101,793.60. This figure was \$373,758.71 over the \$3,728,034.89 total of Dec. 31, 1970. It was \$343,485.63 over the June 30, 1971, total and \$67,498.00 above the total of \$4,034,295.60 on Sept. 30, 1971.

A deputy from the office of County Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs will be in Bronte next Thursday and Friday, Jan. 20 and 21, to take voter registration applications.

Jacobs said one of his office deputies will be at First National Bank on those two days for the convenience of voters in this area.

He urged all eligible citizens to register at that time or to come by his office by Jan. 31. Jacobs pointed out that 18 year olds are eligible to register and vote this year. He also said that persons over 65 must register in order to be eligible to vote.

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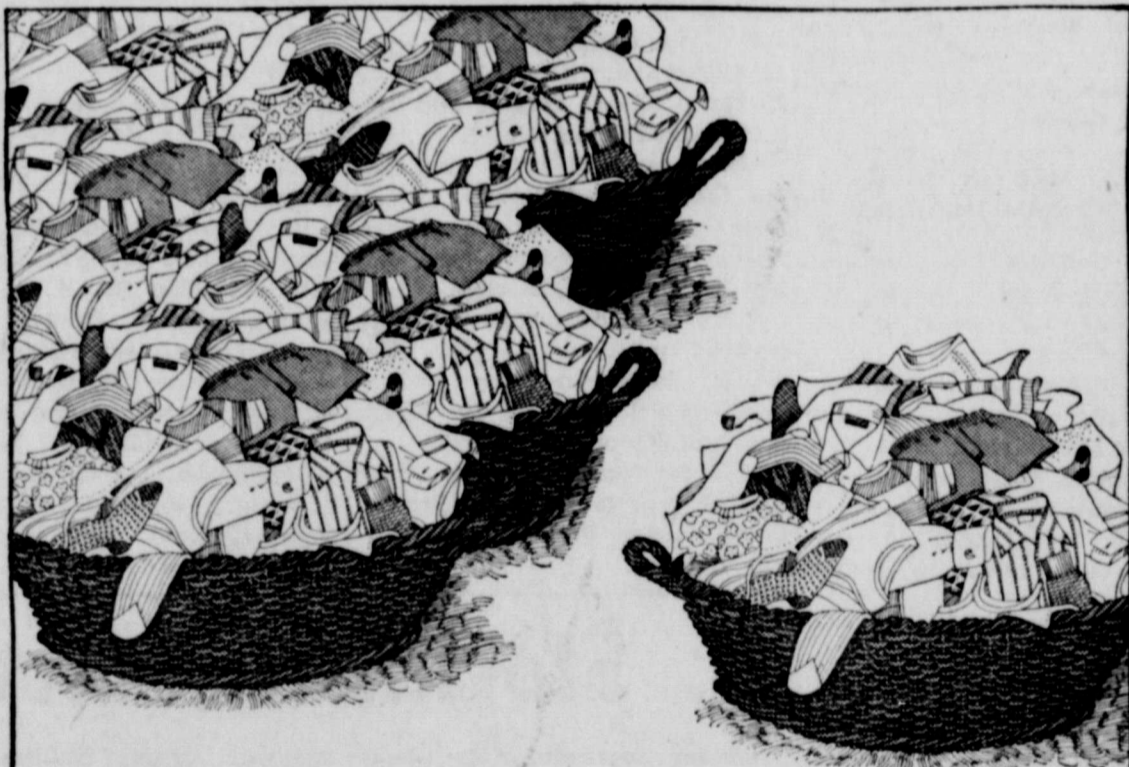

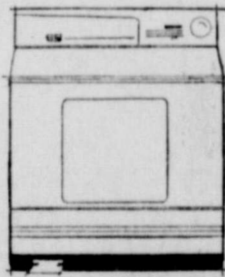
