Mrs. Linda Eddy Granzin was employed as an English and math teacher for Bronte Schools when the board of trustees met Thursday night of last week. Mrs. Granzin, an English and math major, received a bachelor's degree from Sam Houston State University at Huntsville and is completing work this spring on a master's degree from Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

Mr. and Mrs. Granzin live on the Sayner place near Tennyson. She has taught three years at John Glenn Junior High School in San Angelo and one year at Estacado in Lubbock.

In other action, Mrs. Jimmy (Carolyn Sue) Lee was employed as a librarian aide to replace Mrs. Willie Mae Glenn, who has resigned. Originally from Crane, Mrs. Lee and her husband have four children. They are building a new home east of town. Mr. Lee is employed by the Standard Times.

The Democratic Primary is Saturday, and hot races have developed in both county and state contests.

Drawing the most interest locally are the two commissioner races in Precincts 1 and 3, where seven men are seeking the two commissioner posts. The contests developed after long time Commissioners Fern Havins and Floyd Harmon announced they would not seek reelection.

No contests developed in the east side of the county.

On the ballot as candidates in Precinct 3 are Fred McCabe Jr., Jett Hood and Elmo Bell. McCabe is a rancher; Hood is a heavy equipment operator and Bell is in the auto repair and parts business.

Four men are seeking the commissioner job in Precinct 1. They are Albert N. (Bob) Fields, Wilson Bryan, Roy Casey and Larry Jameson.

Fields has operated a butane business in the county for many years; Bryan, who recently completed his second term as mayor of Robert Lee, has been in the sand, gravel and construction business; Casey has farmed, ranched and been employed on road construction; Jameson is employed by Clendenen Welding Service at Silver.

Unopposed county candidates are Sheriff Melvin Childress; Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs; County Attorney Roy Ford and Constables Ollie Roe of Precinct 1 and Sam Sissom of Precinct 2. The polls will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. A list of polling places and election judges is shown in a box accompanying this article.

Statewide Races

A number of statewide races have taken on large proportions, with the governor's race the most hotly contested. There are seven Democrats and seven Republicans seeking the governor's seat.

Precinct Conventions To Be Held Saturday

Precinct conventions are also somewhat changed by new election laws in Texas.

Precinct conventions in Coke County will be held at 7:15 p.m. Saturday, May 6, at or near the Democratic polling place. Each precinct chairman is in charge of calling the convention to order. In the past it has been customary to hold conventions in each precinct in the county but in the past two years they have been held only in Robert Lee and Bronte.

The precinct election is the only chance every voter has to participate in the selection of the Democratic candidate for president. The precinct convention elects delegates to the district or county convention; the delegates there elect delegates to the state convention and the state convention elects delegates to the national convention. There the candidates for president and vice president are chosen.

The precinct convention elects delegates to the county conven-

tion on the basis of one delegate and one alternate for each 25 votes cast in the precinct for the Democratic candidate for governor in the preceding general election.

In order to participate, persons must vote in the Democratic Primary May 6 and attend the convention that evening. Each voter gets a signed statement at the time he votes from the primary election judge. These voters also become eligible to become a delegate or alternate.

In contrast to former conventions, there is now no unit rule and there are no instructed delegates. Precinct and county conventions are preliminary to the state convention to be held in San Antonio June 13.

For time and place for local conventions, contact the chairman in the precinct in which you vote. Precinct chairmen are also election judges in all the Coke County precincts and are listed elsewhere in this newspaper.

Three Charged With Burglary

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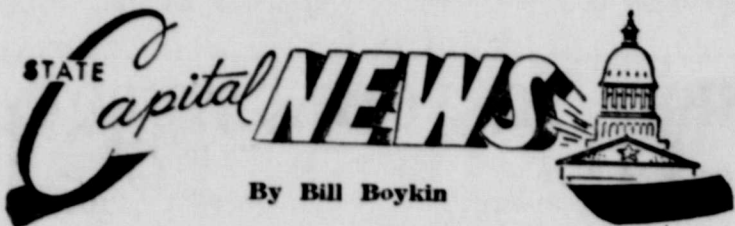

Austin — An estimated 1.85 million Texas Democrats are about to decide one of the most significant primary elections in years. Another 100,000 or more will vote in the Republican Primary Saturday, May 6.

gubernatorial primaries in both parties, little attention has been devoted to the conventions beyond a prolonged Democratic scrap of new procedural rules.

Democrats almost certainly will go into June 3 runoffs for both governor and lieutenant governor — and perhaps other statewide elections.

Gov. Preston Smith, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde and State Rep. Frances (Sissy) Farenthold of Corpus Christi are major contenders for the Democratic gubernatorial runoff spots.

The lieutenant governor's field is also closely bunched in the stretch drive with State Sens. Wayne Connally of Floresville, Ralph Hall of Rockwall and Joe Christie of El Paso and Houston newspaper executive William P. Hobby the top contenders.

Former Sen. Ralph W. Yarborough is favored to win the Democratic U. S. Senate nomination over Barefoot Sanders and face GOP Sen. John Tower in November.

Republican gubernatorial candidates staging serious campaign include State Sen. Henry Guver of Houston, Dave Reagan of Sherman, Al Fay of Houston and Tom McElroy of Dallas. John A. Hall of Weatherford has also put up a fight.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin is challenged for reelection by John Hill of Houston. Comptroller Robert S. Calvert and Treasurer Jesse James have multiple opposition.

A minimum of 58 — maybe as many as 80 — new state representatives will be elected and at least 11 new state senators.

NO MEDICAID EVICTIONS — No sick poor are going to be thrown out of hospitals before they are well due to new curbs on medicaid, the State Welfare Department pledges.

The new American Physician Union claimed in advertisements that Welfare Department guidelines set a limit on hospital stays for each illness.

A department spokesman said nobody will be thrown out who needs to stay in the hospital and

that the guidelines were meant merely to suggest normal care periods for ailments and age groups. If additional hospitalization is needed, it will be paid for, a department official said.

The medicaid program, which cost \$142 million for the current fiscal year, is paid two-thirds by the federal government and one-third by the state.

TRAFFIC DEATHS INCREASE — Traffic deaths this year have increased two per cent over 1971, the Department of Public Safety reports.

DPS recorded 904 deaths compared with 888 for early 1971.

Deaths on interstate highways actually dropped six per cent, but fatalities in city limits jumped 11 per cent, DPS said.

COURTS SPEAK — The Court of Criminal Appeals held defendants in criminal cases have the right to look at statements of witnesses against them.

Grand Prairie cannot hold a local option liquor election since it is located in two counties, the State Supreme Court held.

The High Court reversed an intermediate court and ordered retrial of a Houston man's suit for damages as the result of a freon can explosion.

A Vietnam war casualty's widow can contest his girl friend for his insurance, the High Court held.

RATLIFF QUILTS — Sen. David Ratliff (whose senatorial district includes Coke County) resigned his post and withdrew as a candidate for a House seat after disclosures that he had several relatives on legislative payrolls.

Ratliff, 60, said his "past mistakes or bad judgment" should not reflect on other members of the Texas Senate.

His immediate resignation will allow time for election of a successor before the June special legislative session, Ratliff stated. Timing of his withdrawal from the House race will follow consultation with local party officials.

Ratliff did not seek reelection to the senate when his district was merged with that of Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon.

MEAT PRICES MAY RISE — This year's spring drought may again cause meat prices to rise, Agriculture Commissioner John White warns.

If the drought continues, said White, cattlemen will have to reduce their herds.

"Meat prices should come down, but this will be only temporary," said White. "After those cattle are sold, there again will be a shortage of livestock which will result again in higher meat prices."

The same thing, according to White, happened last year in a rainless period.

MASS TB SCREENING OUT — Texas State Department of Health announced skin testing has replaced the mass X-ray screening for tuberculosis in Texas.

X-rays are recommended only for those persons testing positive in skin checks and those in high risk groups.

The Health Department will continue to use mobile X-ray units—mainly for followup testing. The Texas case rate for new, active TB is 25.8 per 100,000 population. The national average is 18.3.

Short Snorts Construction flaws have been discovered in the Lyndon Johnson Library at the University of Texas here, one of the state's big tourist attractions.

UT students are pushing for sale of beer in the student union building.

A new \$172,225 federal grant has been approved for the Texas Office of Economic Opportunity. The "Dirty 30" House reform coalition endorsed 41 Democratic and 26 Republican candidates for state representatives.

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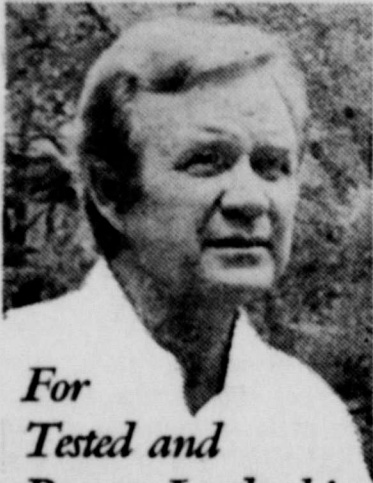

Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Coffin, hooked 58 bass averaging three-quarters of a pound; Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Binker, Midland, 23 crappie averaging a pound; J. E. and Don Mitchell, 50 white bass averaging three-quarters of a pound; R. B. Carr and Walt Pergason, C. J. Brent and Billye Brent, Big Spring, 60 white bass to a pound and a half; and in another fishing day C. J. and Billye Brent, 25 white bass and eight crappie to a pound.

In three days of fishing Harold Adams, Alex Dawes and Gary Castain, Odessa, brought in 300 white bass up to 2½ pounds.

Jim Harpole, Monahans, had 45 white bass and three black bass. Jerry Matejek, John Kiffler and Bill and Buddy Marshall of Big Spring, reported 40 crappie averaging a pound.

Public Invited To Drug Program

A program on Drug Abuse, sponsored by Bronte Boy Scouts, will be held Monday at 7 p.m. in the Home Economics Department at Bronte School.

Although it is primarily a Scout meeting, anyone 11 years old or older, and their parents are welcome to attend.

The program is unique in that it will be held in two groups, one group for parents and one group for youngsters. After the separate meetings, the two groups will convene together to discuss the ideas they gained.

According to Scout spokesman, James Lee, the program will be largely a communication program between parents and their children. It will be aimed mostly at drug use prevention, with the idea in mind that all persons will have the opportunity to use drugs. The Democratic Primary ballots to be used Saturday contain a proposition concerning forced busing of school children, designed to get a reading on public sentiment. Voters are warned to use caution when voting because of the wording of the proposition. The forced busing referendum will have no binding effect, but is only seeking public opinion.

The referendum proposition on the ballot reads:

"No public school student shall because of his race, creed or color be assigned to or required to attend a particular school. This referendum applies to the required busing of public school students and provides for equal education for all public school students."

Ballots will be marked "For" or "Against."

Party officials said the proposition was written in such a manner as to permit voters to respond positively rather than negatively, if they oppose forced busing. In other words, a "for" vote means the voter is against busing.

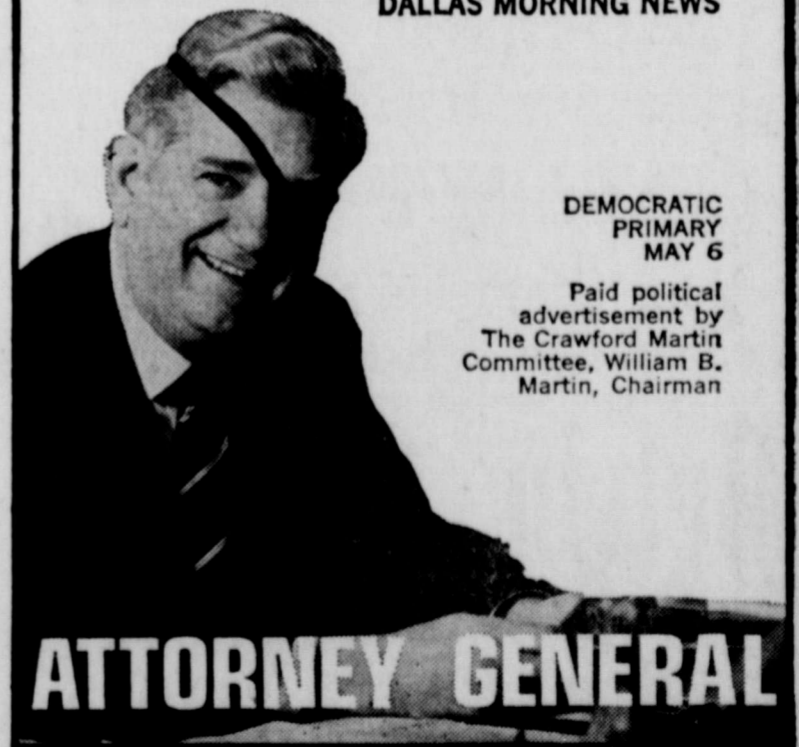

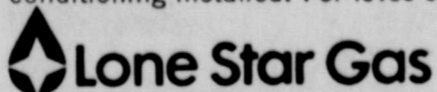

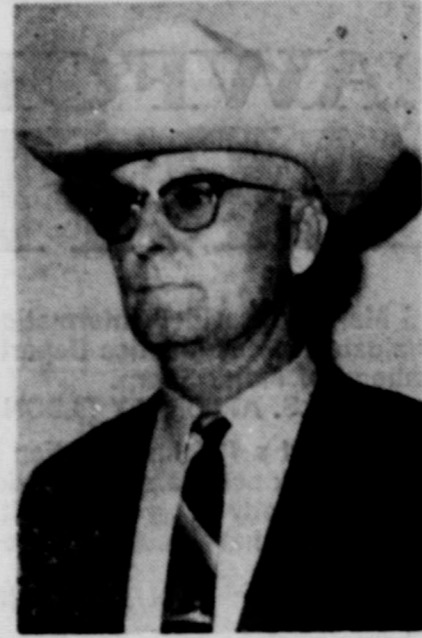

Regulations - - Regulations AND MORE Regulations

Some new regulations have been issued by the U. S. Treasury Department which affect this bank and all of our customers.

First, we are going to have to have some identification numbers for all your accounts.

In case of a business firm this number will be your Taxpayer Identification Number.

On individual accounts, it will be the depositor's Social Security Number.

On joint accounts, it will be the Social Security Number of any individual who has a financial interest in the account.

On all other accounts, the identification number will be the Taxpayer Identification Number.

Another new regulation concerns loans. It provides:

That banks must record and retain certain details of all loans made to customers. The bank must record the customer's name and address, amount of the loan, NATURE or PURPOSE OF THE LOAN, and the date.

We keep records on all the above requirements, except the one which requires we ask you what you are going to do with the money you borrow from us. In the future, we will have to ask you about this.
