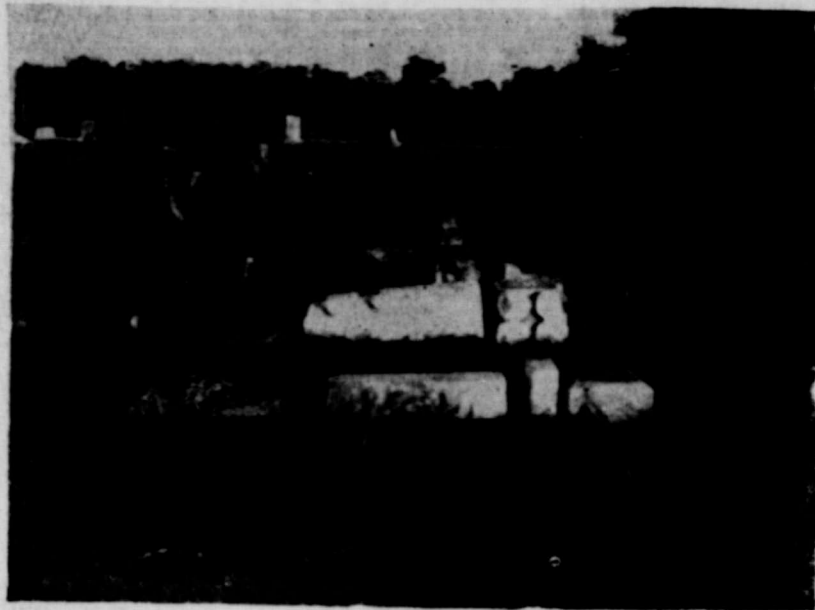

Vandals Hit Old Cemetery



Row of Tombstones Upset by Vandals

The old Fort Chadbourne Cemetery, located adjacent to Highway 277 in the northeastern part of the county was vandalized and desecrated last week. More than 50 tombstones and other markers were turned over and some were broken into pieces. Officers working on the case theorized that it happened last week on Wednesday or Thursday night.

A reward of \$1,000 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the guilty party or parties has been offered by Ed Richards of the Wylie Ranch, on which the cemetery is located. Mr. and Mrs. Richards have done much work on the historic old cemetery in recent years.

Lone Star Wants Gas Rate Raise

Lone Star Gas Co. May 22 asked the City of Bronte to increase local residential and commercial natural gas rates by approximately 5.86 per cent. Company officials said it would enable Lone Star to earn a reasonable rate of return on the fair value of properties used to serve the public.

The application for rate increase listed increased cost of buying gas, higher property and equipment costs, increased costs for employees compensation, higher interest rates on borrowed money and increased taxes as pri-

mary reasons for the income deficiency.

"In addition," stated M. D. Geiser, manager of the San Angelo distribution office, "Lone Star has a commitment to its customers to vigorously compete for supplies of natural gas to keep its reserves in a favorable position. While other sections of the country are experiencing some shortages of natural gas, Lone Star has maintained favorable supplies. The gas cost adjustment portion of the application placed before the City Council," continued Geiser, "will help Lone Star maintain its favorable gas supply position and assure our customers of natural gas service for the future."

Approval of the application for an increase would raise the average monthly residential gas bill by approximately 43 cents, Geiser said. Lone Star serves more than 380 customers in Bronte.

SOME VACANCIES IN DRIVER ED. CLASS

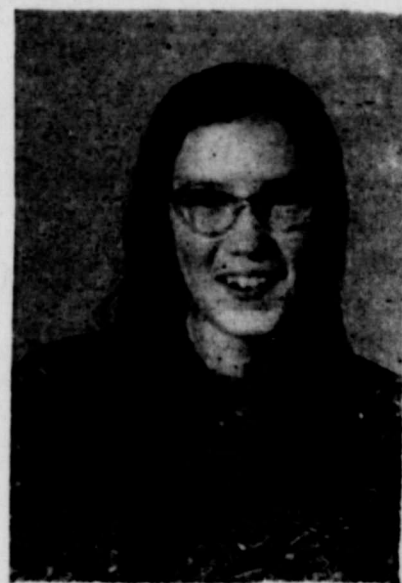
A course in Driver Education will begin Friday, June 2. Bob Shields will be instructor for the class.

The Fort Chadbourne Cemetery was one of three cemeteries in that vicinity before 1877. This one is still in use and contains recent graves as well as those of citizens of the area who were buried there as early as 1878. It holds the grave of the first officer to be buried at Fort Chadbourne.

The Enterprise has heard reports that there may be others who have relatives buried at Fort Chadbourne, who will offer additional reward money for the arrest and conviction of the vandals.

Big Fish Catch

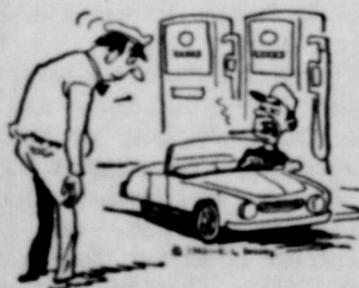

FISHING NEWS

By Ike Pate

Finally, we got a full week of the kind of weather we have needed all year. It's something when you get fine weather and fishing at the same time, but that's what we've had and we hope it continues.

Leo and Danny Osterhaut of Andrews and Charlie Lewis of Mesa, Ariz., caught a fine string of catfish using trotlines—16 channel cat 1 1/4 to 5 1/2 lbs., 17 lb. yellow cat and one 30 plus fish that's still in the lake. It would be better not to say any more than necessary about the last fish mentioned.

Mr. and Mrs. Bud Shivers of Odessa took a dozen of the largest white bass we have seen in a long time. These fish were caught trolling, the largest going 3 1/2 lbs.

Bass fishermen were doing just as well. We talked with at least a dozen that had fish over five lbs. Most of these fish were caught on top water baits which only adds to the fun of catching fish of this size. This kind of fishing is not for people with weak hearts. Take a five or six pound bass that takes a top water bait 10 to 15 feet from your boat and I have found even the best bass fishermen find it difficult to explain just how they feel at that moment.

Fishermen that prefer to fish from the dock, who some say are a little lazy, have found it difficult to get comfortable for very long. The channel cat continue on their biting spree. Several strings of 15 to 25 fish have been caught the past few days. About the only thing that seems to have changed is the fish are biting just as well at night as they have been during the day for some time.

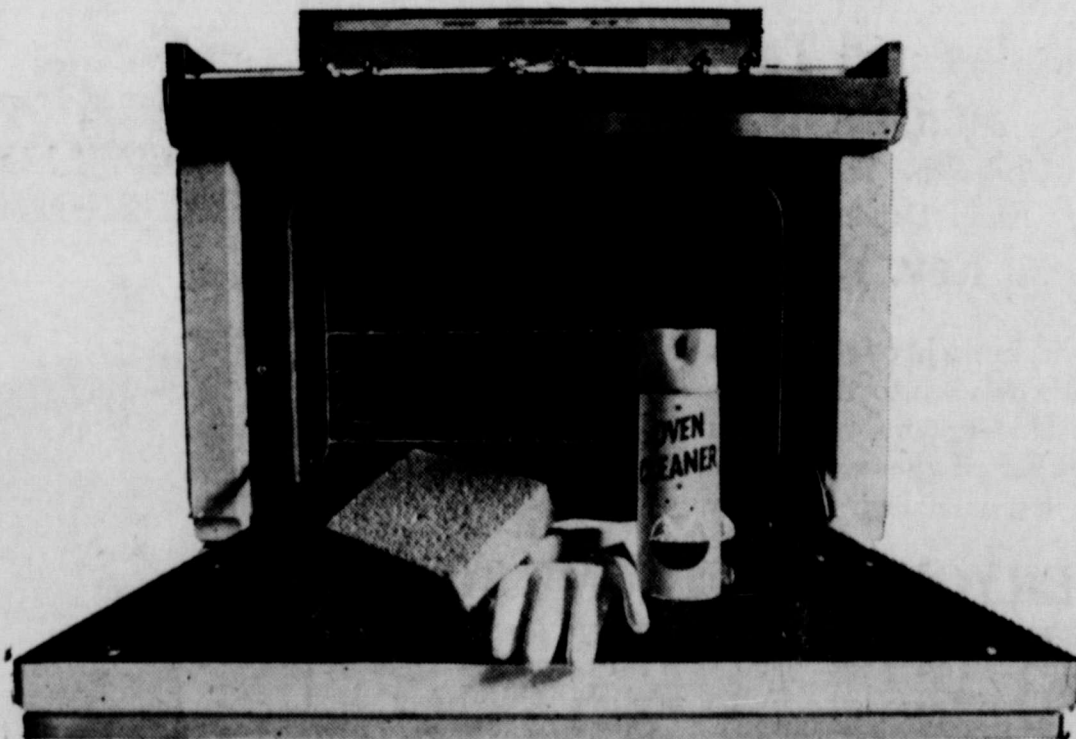
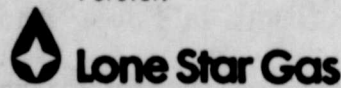
