First, basic decisions limiting the present number of U.S. strategic missiles were made back in the mid 60's. Former Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara thought that if the Russians were allowed to achieve misstle parity with the U.S. they would stop construction of intercontinental ballistic missiles. 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


