Funeral services for David Campos Sanchez, 49, were held at 4 p.m. Wednesday in First Baptist Church. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Newby Funeral Home. Pastor of the church, the Rev. Harry Morris, officiated at the services, assisted by the Rev. Joe Trevino of the Wingate Baptist Mission and the Rev. Charles Farris of San Angelo. 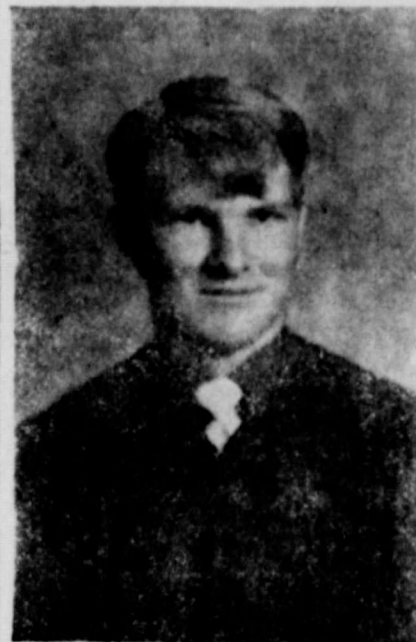
Marvin Thompson Called As Pastor

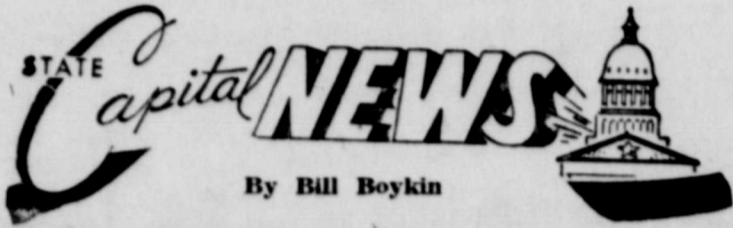

Austin — The Parks and Wildlife Commission handed one controversial issue back to the Attorney General and was handed another one by the Legislature.

PWC voted four to two to ask Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin to review and reconsider a May 26 ruling that a 1970 contract to purchase 3,965 acres of Mustang Island property for park development is a "binding obligation."

Martin's opinion, according to PWC Chairman Jack Stone of Wells, is expected in about a

week. The Mustang Island battle has raged from Austin to Washington and back and through the federal courts and has figured in battles over Senate confirmation of PWC members.

Legislators, in special session, thwarted long standing plans of the State Highway Department to build a 10 story, \$20 million headquarters building on a block near the capitol and governor's mansion.

Instead, the Legislature decreed, the Parks and Wildlife Department would purchase with \$1.5 million from its cigarette tax the barren, dusty block in downtown Austin and convert it into a park.

The highway department was directed to consider placing its plush new building elsewhere.

Neither agency, conceded legislative leaders, was deliriously happy with the arrangement.

Under the circumstances, however, neither seemed to have much choice.

GAME LAW FUSS CALMED — Texas game wardens will no longer enforce state game and fish laws near the mouth and jetties of the Sabine River, an area of disputed ownership with Louisiana.

Louisiana last month threatened to appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court Texas officers' attempts at enforcement in the area. Attorney General Martin informed Louisiana Atty. Gen. William J. Guste Jr. Texas will keep its commitments in the disputed areas of the Gulf south of the Sabine River Mouth.

The area was recently found by a Supreme Court appointed master to belong to Texas, but Louisiana appealed the decision.

INFLATION STILL THREAT

Inflation is still a strong threat though Texas is recovering from economic recession, according to a University of Texas Bureau of Business Research study.

Unemployment remains high, says UT BBR, but estimated personal income rose nine per cent in the last year and bank debits 10 per cent.

The unemployment level, frowned on by the Bureau, was 3.8 per cent in May, which is lower than the 4.1 per cent of a year ago and considerably below the national 5.9 per cent rate.

Consumer spending and residential construction were seen as strong. The rate of the consumer price index rise slowed somewhat after the presidential price freeze, BBR found.

TEXAS BEFF CATTLE LEADER — Texas is the nation's leader in all major categories of the beef cattle industry, Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White states.

The livestock industry in Texas is a \$2 billion industry, accounting for almost half the total agricultural income of the state. There were 12.8 million cattle and calves in Texas in January, more than five million head above second ranked Iowa.

Texas ranks second in the nation in number of slaughter plants, third in cattle and calves slaughtered during 1971, third in sheep and lamb slaughter and 15th in hog slaughter.

DEMOCRATS AT MIAMI BEACH — 130 Texas Democrats — most of them new to the party wars — are busy at Miami Beach this week, helping nominate a candidate for president.

Another 70 alternates were named to the convention.

The Texas delegates, headed by gubernatorial candidate Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde, are closely divide as to supporters of George Wallace, George McGovern and Hubert Humphrey.

FARMWORKER GRANT APPROVED — A \$2 million federal grant will provide classroom instruction and on the job training for migrant farmworkers.

Trainees from 19 counties will benefit under the one year contracts with five project sponsors.

Short Snorts

Former U. S. Ambassador to Australia Ed Clark, a prominent Democrat, will head Republican U. S. Senator John Tower's campaign organization in Texas.

Southwest Airlines, serving Dallas, Houston and San Antonio, announced it is raising its one way fare from \$20 to \$26 between the points served.

A new Veterans Administration drug treatment program is planned for Dallas.

Crop Prospects Good... Slaughter Increases... Hog Numbers Show Decline... Tangelos and Lemons?

Statewide, crop production prospects range from good to excellent, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service concludes.

Grain sorghum harvest is just beginning with prospects for good yields in most sections of the state. Cotton generally is making good progress with insect infestations increasing in the Blacklands and Low Plains. Corn is making good to excellent progress in most areas. Soybeans are making good to excellent growth.

Vegetable and fruit prospects are also good. In North Texas, watermelons and cantaloupes continue to make good growth; in East Texas, tomato harvest continues. Peach harvest continues with a wide range of yield and

quality reported. Pecan trees show good crop potentials in most areas. Citrus trees are in good condition.

Cattle slaughtered in Texas during May totaled 311,000 head, 26,000 above the number slaughtered last month and 1,000 more than May a year ago.

Calves killed during May totaled 13,200, or 400 below last month and 8,600 below a year ago.

Hogs slaughtered in May totaled 160,000 which is 3,000 above last month but 15,000 less than in May 1971. Sheep and lambs killed totaled 118,000, or 5,000 less than last year.

Hogs on all Texas farms as of June 1 totaled 1,132,000 head, down 24 per cent from 1971. Hogs kept for breeding purposes numbered 175,000 which is 24 per cent less than last year. Hog farmers intend to farrow 120,000 sows in Texas now through November,

which is 19 per cent less than farrowings for this period last year.

Nationwide, the farrowings now through November will be down four per cent from 1971.

Tangelos and lemons in Texas? You bet, and there's also avocados and apricots as well as plums, pears, apples, figs, blackberries, dewberries and tangerines.

A tangelo, incidentally, is a cross between a tangerine and grapefruit. The Citrus Tree Census of the Texas Citrus Mutual estimates there are about 60,000 tangerine trees in the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

A small acreage of less than 100 acres of lemons is also grown in the Valley. Avocado is also a Valley crop.

Apples are grown throughout the state with Comanche, Montague and Gillespie being the leading counties. Apricot production is centered in east and north Texas.

Plums are scattered over wide areas of the state; pears are produced in north central, central and east Texas.

Central and East Texas are the principal areas where dewberries are grown. Blackberries are statewide with Smith County in East Texas the leading county. Figs are grown in many areas with Galveston County the leading county with about 300 acres for commercial production.

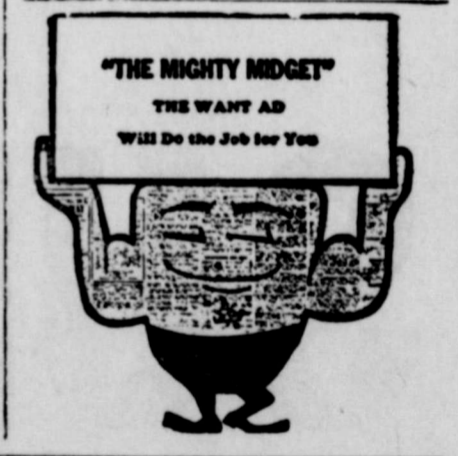

"As it looks from here"

Washington — The Federal government has money to burn — really it does!

Oftentimes visitors to Washington are shown a small spiral of whitish smoke coming from a small stack in the center of the Bureau of Printing and Engraving. They are told that it comes from the burning of old worn out bills. Actually, old currency is burned at each of the 12 Federal Reserve Banks and not returned to its source of printing for destruction as is usually supposed.

Since the country has become so environmentally conscious, other methods of doing away with unusable paper money are being investigated.

Federal Reserve Banks are now beginning to grind up cash since the cities where they are located have anti-burning laws and, where enforced, are causing problems. Treasury officials say that grinding is the only way they know to dispose of old dollars. This, however, has its problems also. It is simply that to do with the fine light green fluff after it is pulverized.

One idea is to recycle it into stationery. This has been ruled out because of secret service regulations. They say someone might get the idea that because the special type of paper is fortified with the tiniest of filament it could possibly be used to reconstruct bills for the benefit of counterfeiters.

The Federal Reserve Bank in Dallas is reported to have come up with a customer for ground up greenbacks for a price of \$10 a ton. In that form, of course, it would make no difference whether it was a George Washington \$1 bill or a Grover Cleveland

\$1,000 bill — the intrinsic value would be the same.

Thus far one sales outlet has been developed to buy the finely chopped up cash. This customer is a well drilling company in Kansas.

The David Mud and Chemical Company is experimenting with using the ground up currency, turned into a thick slush, as mud in well drilling process.

Another idea not yet tested to the extent of approval, is converting the old greenbacks into a roofing material. Offhand one would suppose that there would not be a supply adequate for commercial use but 2,500 tons a year could cover quite a few roofs and mud-seal quite a few wells. Incidentally, this amount destroyed represents about two billion federal reserve notes with a face value of about \$12 billion. This statistic doesn't particularly mean anything except that, to make a pun — it could become quite a slush fund and go quite a way to putting money on the roof for overhead protection.

There seem to be other problems connected with the disposal of old bills such as trying to get the ink out which affects other proposed uses. In the first place, it seems it is about impossible to wash it out and the color for whatever use remains money green. There have been experiments in making ceramics. If this purpose were proved to be successful, the color might add to the value of the product.

The Dallas Federal Reserve Bank is the only one of 12 Reserve Banks now grinding but in the next few months the banks at Cincinnati, Philadelphia, Cleveland and Minneapolis will shift from burning to this method of disposal.

If our government continues to crank out money, there will probably be more to dispose of as time goes on. At most, the individual's worn out bills are replaced by new bills printed at the Bureau of Engraving and Printing here in Washington located at 14th and Independence Ave. and on down the street at 12th and Constitution Ave. is the Internal Revenue Service. An old joke still stands—"They issue it here and take it away down there."

Women, Protect Yourself
Women living alone are often prey to trouble.

Keeping out of trouble is not enough. One has to bar trouble.

If you live alone, list only your last name and initials in the phone directory and on the mailbox. And after moving into a new house or apartment, change door locks. Previous tenants or former employees may still have keys.

Pin tumbler or square bolt locks are best for replacement. It is suggested to install and use chain locks or a peephole.

When alone, never open a door to strangers without having the chain in place. Police officers will show credentials whenever asked. Always demand that salesmen and repairmen show identification.

Protect your neighbors as well as yourself. Never mention to strangers that a neighbor lives alone or is at home alone.

When a stranger asks to use the telephone, don't permit him inside. Offer to summon emergency assistance or make the call for him.

Should you receive a wrong number, never reveal your name or address, nor admit that you are alone. Don't give your telephone number but ask what number he's calling. Don't prolong the conversation; hang up and notify the police if the caller is obscene.

Keep windows secured or install window locks if left open for ventilation. Window locks can limit openings enough to prevent entry.

Draw window shades after dark and leave lights on in two or more rooms to camouflage your being alone.

Don't enter an apartment elevator with strange men. It's wiser to stay in the lobby for a few minutes. And never stay in a laundry alone.

A gun for protection is hazardous. Discuss the details of possessing a gun with officers at your local station.

If the criminal has a chance, he'll take the gun from you. Your best defense is prolonged loud screaming.

A good protective device is an electric buzzer which you can have installed to alert neighbors in case of an emergency.

If a door or window has been forced open or broken while you are gone, don't enter or call out;

someone may still be inside. Instead use a neighbor's phone to call police. Then wait outside until they arrive.

Never assume that suspicious persons, occurrences or vehicles have been reported to the police, but call them yourself at once. Post the police department's number by your telephone and call whenever danger threatens.

In Bronte call Deputy Don Thorpe at 473-2901; Constable Sam Sissom at 473-3081, or Hiway Patrolman Bobby Hart at 473-2751.

These men are either elected or employed to protect you and enforce the law in Coke County.

They will be both sympathetic and friendly about any problems you have. You don't need to be, but it's better to be embarrassed because of a false alarm than to risk being killed or injured.

Coke County lawmen won't make you feel that you have imposed on them if you have any basis at all for thinking you need help.

The screwworm situation has eased some in the area and county but the threat still exists. Coke County produced five cases last week, bringing the year's total to 31 confirmed cases.

The new cases confirmed were from the middle and northwestern portions of the county. In the Silver area, M. C. Hendry submitted a sample from his place two miles southwest of Silver. Dwain Walker reported one case from one mile east of Silver.

In the Robert Lee area, the Simpson Brothers had one case from their place six miles north of Robert Lee, while Edwin Lindsey submitted a sample from six miles northeast of Robert Lee.

Statewide, the screwworm situation is still alarming. Everyone is encouraged to continue watching all livestock and to submit samples of all worm cases found.

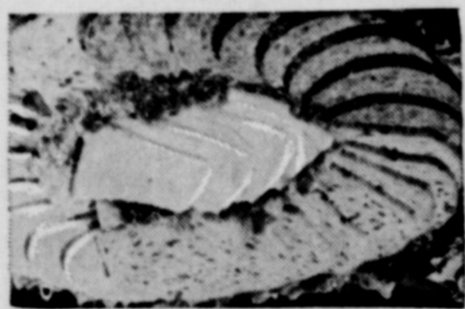
