## Nursing Home Needs Residents

Bronte Nursing Homes needs more residents. The census level is at a dangerous low and will cost taxpayers of Precincts 2 and 4 approximately \$1400 over the present revenue if the patient revenue is not increased.

L. O. Clark, administrator of the home, said this week there are 23 occupants in the home and that the break-even figure is 28, using the minimum staffing requirements as required by the State Department of Health.

Bronte Nursing Home has been using the minimum number of nurses required and in some cases a little below. The law provides that these persons be paid the minimum wage, and this amount will be increased if the proposed rate is made into law. "I am sure," Clark said, "there are many residents in this area

and the state who would be in a nursing home, such as this facility, if they were properly informed of their rights to be admitted and their eligibility to enter. In most cases the care would be paid by the State Medicaid program. Anyone who needs information about rights to enter a nursing home or financial assistance may call or come by the nursing home."

The nursing home of today is a far cry from the home of yesteryears. Requirements for operation under the laws of today are very strict and must be maintained if a home is to stay open. Many inspections have been made by the Departments of Health and Welfare and have failed to reveal any deficiency of operation or building requirement.

Clark continued, "I believe if

Around the area, the Joe McCutchen place west of town received 6 inches and northwest the A. Z. Denmans reported 5.8 inches. The Edward Cumbies north of Bronte had 5.7 inches and the Wyllie Ranch, northeast, recorded 5.3 inches of rainfall.

## Two Burglaries At Oak Creek Lake

Deputy Sheriff Don Thorpe has been busy this week investigating two burglaries at Oak Creek Lake. Nothing was taken from one of the burglarized cabins, but the other, owned by Lynn Jones of Odessa, reportedly had over \$2,000 worth of belongings taken.

The thief entered by cutting the screen on the back porch. No one was occupying the cabin at the time it was robbed, so the time of the robbery is not known. It occurred sometime between Aug. 13 and 15.

D. D. Bius of Oak Creek Lake reported Tuesday night that his boat, a 12 foot flat bottom type, had been stolen.

Thorpe said so far he has not taken anybody into custody.



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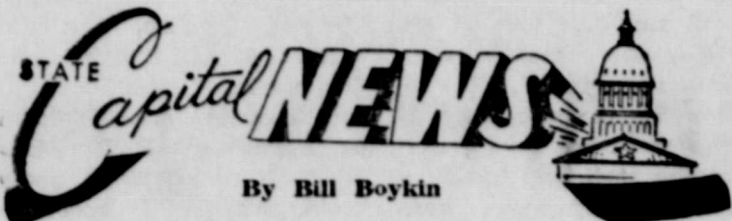

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Austin — Rep. Price Daniel Jr. of Liberty apparently will take over the House of Representatives speakership without opposition next January.

Withdrawal of Rep. Frank Calhoun of Abilene from the speaker's race last week, after concluding that Daniel was too far out front to catch, left the 31 year old attorney from Liberty free of a major challenger.

Rep. James E. Nugent of Kerrville, who had planned to enter the contest earlier, endorsed Daniel.

Before Calhoun's withdrawal, Daniel claimed more than 100 commitments from House members or nonmembers.

"So many of the old and new members had committed to my opponent before I got into the race, that my continuance in the campaign would place a burden on my supporters that I do not feel justified in causing," said Calhoun.

Daniel, son of former Gov. Price Daniel, came from a long way back to emerge as the shoo-in candidate for speaker.

When Rep. Rayford Price of Palestine won the post in special session last spring after resignation of former Speaker Gus Mutscher, he was considered a cinch to keep the job during the 63rd Legislature.

But Price was defeated for reelection to his House seat in the June 3 Democratic runoff primary by Rep. Fred Head of Troup.

Daniel, meanwhile, had been busy rounding up commitments from incumbent lawmakers and new nominees. He tries to dodge being labeled a liberal and prefers the term "progressive." He has emphasized need for legislative reform and is pledged to hold the speakership only one term.

SAFETY COURSE OFFERED — Texans who complete a new defensive driving course after Sept. 1 can become eligible for a 10 per cent reduction in their annual auto insurance policies.

Texas Safety Association has accepted responsibility for coordinating the National Safety Council course.

The course will cost about \$10

or less per person, and the resulting credit is good for three years. Individual savings over the three year period are estimated at about \$45 — or \$43 million statewide. Duplications are not allowed for the new course in addition to the driver training course.

In families with two or more cars, the principal drivers of each car will have to take the course to qualify for credit on all vehicles.

PARTIES CERTIFIED — Two new political parties, La Raza Unida and the Social Workers Party, have been certified for places on the Nov. 7 general election ballot in Texas.

Secretary of State Bob Bullock said it was his duty to certify the parties since they filed more than the required number of 22,365 signatures necessary for ballot position.

The American Party and the New Party, which did not file enough signatures, seek to get on the ballot anyway by federal court action.

La Raza Unida is waging an aggressive campaign for governor, with Ramsey Muniz of San Antonio as its candidate. Both parties also have candidates for U. S. senator, lieutenant governor and most other major statewide offices.

SPECIAL SESSION COOLING? — Gov. Preston Smith may be cooling a little on the idea of a September special session on insurance reform, but he insists the idea is still alive.

"I'm pretty flexible," said Smith. "If anybody can bring me in some facts that would show me there would be no purpose served in calling a session, I would not even pretend to be in a mood to waste \$33,000 a day (estimated session cost) of the taxpayers' money."

On the other hand, Smith said, if he could be shown that legislation to reduce insurance rates could be passed, he would not hesitate to summon lawmakers back to work.

Main business of the session, he indicated, would be a proposal for competitive insurance rates, which he said are in effect in 49 states. He seemed to be backing off his proposal to abolish the present insurance regulatory board.

DDT BANNED — DDT registration in Texas will be cancelled Aug. 31 with few exceptions, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White announced.

White had banned DDT registration for household use earlier under Pesticide Advisory Committee recommendations. The Committee said the action would have little impact on Texas agriculture.

Exceptions will permit registration for DDT to use on stored sweet potatoes, disease control programs by public health officials, in prescription drugs; and by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the military in health quarantine programs.

Short Snorts

The Governor has requested the federal pay board to approve a pay raise for state employees Sept. 1.

A state regulation requiring catfish to be at least 11 inches long has been scrapped in the northeast regulatory district.

Texas Rehabilitation Commission reported 2,998 Texans with mental health problems and 2,668 who are mentally retarded received rehabilitation services during the last year.

House and Senate members spent \$1.9 million in expense funds allocated to them during the last fiscal year, according to a new state auditor's report.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 2 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 31) General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 6 of Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby, amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 6. On the effective date of this Amendment, the Lamar County Hospital District is abolished. The Commissioners Court of Lamar County may provide for the transfer or for the disposition of the assets of the Lamar County Hospital

District." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the provision for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional Amendment abolishing the Lamar County Hospital District."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 14 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 57) General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 6b, to read as follows:

"Section 6b. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 6, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, any county, acting through the commissioners court, may reduce the county permanent school fund of that county and may distribute the amount of the reduction to the independent and common school districts of the county on a per scholastic basis to be used solely for the purpose of reducing bonded indebtedness of those districts or for making permanent improvements. The commissioners court shall, however, retain a sufficient amount of the cor-

pus of the county permanent school fund to pay ad valorem taxes on school lands or royalty interests owned at the time of the distribution. Nothing in this Section affects financial aid to any school district by the state."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to allow a county to reduce its county permanent school fund and distribute the money to independent and common school districts on a per scholastic basis."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 5 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 35) General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2. (a) All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a State or National organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property mentioned in this Section shall be null and void.

(b) The Legislature may, by general law, exempt property owned by a disabled veteran or by the surviving spouse and surviving minor children of a disabled veteran. A disabled veteran is a veteran of the armed services of the United States who is classified as disabled by the Veterans Administration or by a successor to that agency; or the military service in which he served. A veteran who is certified as having a disability of less than 10 percent is not entitled to an exemption. A veteran having a disability rating of not less than 10 percent nor more than 30 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$1,500. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 30 percent but not more than 50 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,000. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 50 percent but not more than 70 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. A veteran who has a disability rating of more than 70 percent, or a veteran who has a disability rating of not less than 10 percent and has attained the age of 65, or a disabled veteran whose disability consists of the loss or loss of use of one or more limbs, total blindness in one or both eyes, or paraplegia, may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$3,000. The spouse and children of any member of the United States Armed Forces who loses his life while on active duty will be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. A deceased disabled veteran's surviving spouse and children may be granted an exemption which in the aggregate is equal to the exemption to which the decedent was entitled at the time he died."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment allowing certain tax exemptions to disabled veterans, their surviving spouses and surviving minor children, and the surviving spouses and surviving minor children of members of the armed forces who lose their life while on active duty."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 10 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 68) General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature, at any regular session, or at any special session when the matter is included within the purposes for which the session is convened, may propose amendments revising the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for statewide offices and propositions, as defined in the Constitution and statutes of this State. The date of the elections shall be specified by the Legislature. The proposal for submission must be approved by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, entered by yeas and nays on the journals.

"A brief explanatory statement of the nature of a proposed amendment, together with the date of the election and the wording of the proposition as it is to appear on the ballot, shall be published twice in each newspaper in the State which meets requirements set by the Legislature for the publication of official notices of officers and departments of the state government. The explanatory statement shall be prepared by the Secretary of State and shall be approved by the Attorney General. The Secretary of State shall send a full and complete copy of the proposed amendment or amendments to each county clerk who shall post the same in a public place in the

courthouse at least 30 days prior to the election on said amendment. The first notice shall be published not more than 60 days nor less than 50 days before the date of the election, and the second notice shall be published on the same day in the succeeding week. The Legislature shall fix the standards for the rate of charge for the publication, which may not be higher than the newspaper's published national rate for advertising per column inch.

"The election shall be held in accordance with procedures prescribed by the Legislature, and the returning officer in each county shall make returns to the Secretary of State of the number of legal votes cast at the election for and against each amendment. If it appears from the returns that a majority of the votes cast have been cast in favor of an amendment, it shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation thereof shall be made by the Governor."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment revising provisions on the time and method of proposing amendments to the state constitution and the time and method of publishing notice of proposed amendments."

We again encourage every operator to continue mailing in samples for identification. The sterile fly drops are limited now, but those that are made will be made in areas where the officials receive the greatest number of reports from. Also, this is the only way the program administrators can stay abreast of what is happening over the state.

There has been some publicity regarding a producers fund drive. This may occur in order that funds will be available for mass sterile fly prouction by next spring. But to date we have nothing official regarding a fund drive.

Back to the screwworm situation in Coke County: 17 cases were confirmed last week. The latest cases came from Bob Cox, Conrad Millican, Finnell and Eula Smith (4), Paul Burns (2), C. A. Counts, Larry Jameson, Curtis Walker (2), Monroe Arrott (3), George Neill and J. B. Robertson.

NUMBER 1 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 58)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall receive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This amendment shall be self-enacting and appropriations heretofore made in the general appropriations bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1973, for the salaries of the Members of the Senate and House of Representatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation."  
"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide annual salaries of \$8,400 for members of the Senate and House of Representatives."

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**Proposed PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
NUMBER 11 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 95)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Article IV, Section 17 of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refuse to serve, or be removed from office, or be unable to serve; or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, in like manner, administer the Government until he shall be superseded by a Governor or Lieutenant Governor. During the time the Lieutenant Governor administers the Government, as Governor, he shall receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office, and no more. The President, for the time being, of the Senate, shall, during the time he administers the Government, receive in like manner the same compensation, which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office."  
Sec. 2. That Article III of the Texas Constitution, be amended to add a new Section 24a to read as follows:  
"Section 24a. The Lieutenant Governor, while he acts as President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the public treasury an annual salary of \$22,500."  
Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 7, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide a salary of \$22,500 for the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives."

**Proposed PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
NUMBER 9 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 20)  
General Election, November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, nor to Directors of Soil and Water Conservation Districts. A member of the Legislature shall not be eligible to serve as a Director of a Soil and Water Conservation District. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a nonselective State officer or employee may hold other nonselective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office or position for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States."  
Sec. 2. That Section 40, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time, more than one Civil Office of emolument, except that of Director of a Soil and Water Conservation District, Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit a Director of a Soil and Water Conservation District, an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States, or retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, from holding in conjunction with such office any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any Election, General, Special or Primary, in this State when otherwise qualified."  
Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide that directors of soil and water conservation districts are not disqualified from holding or being compensated for more than one office."

## School to Employ New Tax Assessor

Bronte School board will take applications for the position of tax assessor-collector between now and their September meeting date. The new employee will replace B. D. Snead who plans to retire from the job Jan. 1, 1973.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said the school board agreed at its Aug. 10 meeting that the job would pay \$5,400 per year and that 10 cents per mile be allowed for field work. The board also agreed on the following guidelines and procedures for operation of the tax office:

\*The office will be open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. until 12 noon and from 1 to 4 p.m. at a location yet to be announced.

\* The tax assessor will receive a two weeks paid vacation each year, plus nine holidays and five days sick leave.

\* Wednesday afternoons will be spent doing field work, and additional time will be so spent when necessary.

\* It will be the duty of the tax assessor-collector to acquaint himself with all school tax laws; to meet with the board when requested; to provide written reports and information when requested; to assess all property and collect all taxes in accordance with proper taxing procedures; to cooperate with the school's board of equalization; to keep records accurately; to belong to proper professional organizations; to be able to type and operate office equipment sufficiently well to carry on his duties.

Barbee said only written applications would be accepted and that each applicant would be interviewed by the board. Tentative date of employment is Sept. 14. The new tax man will be directly responsible to the superintendent.

# Farmcast

A Weekly Report Of Agri-Business News

**Farm Prices Show Increase . . .**  
**Sheep on Feed Increase . . .**  
**Changes Announced in Screw-**  
**worm Control . . . Cotton Stalk**

**DDT to be Cancelled.**

Calf prices are above 100 per cent of parity, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes. Average price for calves received by Texas farmers as of July 15 was \$45.30 per hundred-weight. Effective parity is \$44.20 per hundredweight.

Overall, the all farm products index shows prices received by Texas farmers and ranchers were at 356 per cent of the 1910-14 base. This is an increase of 20 per cent above a year ago.

Calf prices are the only commodity above effective parity price. Cotton, for example, was at 28.5 cents per pound while the effective parity is 55.16 cents per pound.

Hogs were at \$27.20 in Texas on the average; effective parity is \$30.60.

Beef cattle prices averaged \$35.60; effective parity is \$36.80. Grain sorghum averaged \$2.01, while effective parity is \$3.33.

Parity — that measuring stick to compare farm income with non-farm income — is now at 77 per cent.

So even though farm prices have been increasing, total farm income is still about one-fourth below the rest of the economy.

Farm income now is estimated at \$18 billion this year. But at full parity, farm income would be about \$22 billion.

**SHEEP** on feed in Texas shows a six per cent increase in the number on feed a month earlier. This, however, is four per cent below a year ago.

Dry lot sheep feeders with a lot capacity of 2,000 head or more had 143,000 head of sheep and lambs on feed for slaughter as of Aug. 1.

Current intentions to market the 143,000 head are: August, 53,000; September, 56,000; and October, 34,000. September and October intentions are incomplete at this time because additional lambs could still be placed on feed and marketed during the period.

**CANCELLATION OF DDT** registration will take effect Aug. 31, except for a few limited uses. The Pesticide Advisory Committee of Texas, which makes recommendations to the Texas Department of Agriculture relating to the use of pesticides, said cancellation should have little impact on agriculture production in the state.

**SCREWORM** regulations relating to dipping or spraying of livestock have been changed. Livestock are no longer required to be dipped or sprayed before shipment from one screwworm infested state to another. However, all livestock shipped from or through areas where screwworms are a recurring problem must still be inspected, any wounds treated, and shipment certified free of screwworms.

**PINK BOLLWORM** stalk destruction deadline is Aug. 31 for Cameron and Willacy and certain portions of Starr and Hidalgo counties.

Early stalk destruction throughout the state is urged. Extensive insect damage has been reported this year in many parts of the state. Early stalk destruction can reduce insect infestation for the 1973 cotton crop.

"As it looks from here"

Washington — Now that Hop Sing (of the Ponderosa) has recovered from the shotgun wound received in the recent West Coast plane hijacking, he says he will not make another trip by air unless he is assured of security from hijackers. The trouble is there is thus far no such thing. Real efforts are being made by both government and the airlines, but there is nothing yet to give guaranteed certainty against airplane holdups.

Consider some of the basic facts involved. In the United States alone there are approximately 14,000 scheduled flights a day, carrying an average of 500,000 daily passengers and countless millions of pieces of luggage and baggage.

More than 500 airports receive regularly scheduled air flights. Though 25 airports account for 70 per cent of all passengers, many of the smaller ports are served by modern jets and become targets for hijackers and extortionists. Air travel and air freight are constantly expanding and the predictions are that during the 70's travel will increase by at least 10 per cent a year.

Efforts are underway to provide carrier protection against this type of robbery. A real test is shaping up within the next few months. There seems to be new determination on the part of government and airlines to halt these air crimes.

It is a frustrating business and an expensive one. Detection systems cost money and there is already an argument between the government and the airlines as to who will foot the bill. The biggest problem, however, is how to exercise the greatest possible precaution and at the same time avoid delay and inconvenience. Human frailties being what they are, airlines will receive all sorts of complaints by their passengers if they are greatly inconvenienced.

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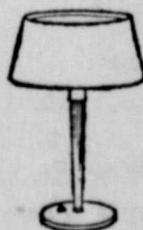


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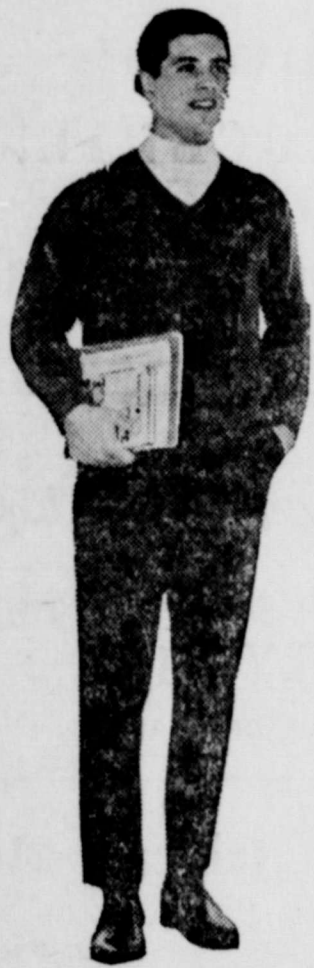
