

On Some '73 Cars

Persons who have purchased certain models of new 1973 automobiles may be able to have their collision insurance lowered as much as 20 per cent, provided the cars meet specifications which have been set up.

The new ruling has to do with cars which have bumpers that will stand an impact with no resulting damage.

A 20 per cent reduction will apply on 1973 passenger cars which have been certified by the manufacturer to be able to be crashed into a standard S.A.E. test barrier, at a speed of five miles per hour, both front and rear, without sustaining any dammage. A 15 per cent reduction will apply when the front can be crashed at five miles per hour and the rear can be crashed at 21/2 miles per hour.

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
