Praise for Coke County's First Annual Fair was running rampant this week, after approximately 900 persons attended the exhibition last Friday and Saturday. More than 450 individual exhibits were set up for public viewing in the old gym at Robert Lee School.

Visitors came from Robert Lee, Bronte, Tennyson, Silver, Blackwell, San Angelo, Colorado City, Christoval, Fort Davis, Beaumont, Marfa, San Antonio, Balingier, Mineral Wells, Lawn, Fort Worth, Midland, Lubbock, Waco, Alpine, Medina, Big Spring, Pearsall, Eldorado, Goldthwaite, Dallas, Winters and Wingate in Texas. Lower Insurance On Some '73 Cars

Persons who have purchased certain models of new 1973 automobiles may be able to have their collision insurance lowered as much as 20 per cent, provided the cars meet specifications which have been set up.

The new ruling has to do with cars which have bumpers that will stand an impact with no resulting damage.

A 20 per cent reduction will apply on 1973 passenger cars which have been certified by the manufacturer to be able to be crashed into a standard S.A.E. test barrier, at a speed of five miles per hour, both front and rear, without sustaining any damage. A 15 per cent reduction will apply when the front can be crashed at five miles per hour and the rear can be crashed at 2½ miles per hour.

Humble No. 4 R. F. Butner in the Rawlings multipay field north of Bronte has been recompleted to produce 23 barrels of oil from the Upper Canyon Sand.

Production of the 48.9 gravity oil was through perforations at 4,110-30 feet. The well has formerly produced from the Goen, Strawn and lower Goen formations.

Originally drilled to 5,294 feet it was finaled in 1953. Location is 660 feet from the north and 685 feet from the east lines of 297-1A-H&TC.

The ball game see-sawed back and forth for the rest of the quarter with the Horns making some good plays, but they were unable to capitalize on them. So the game ended 14-6.

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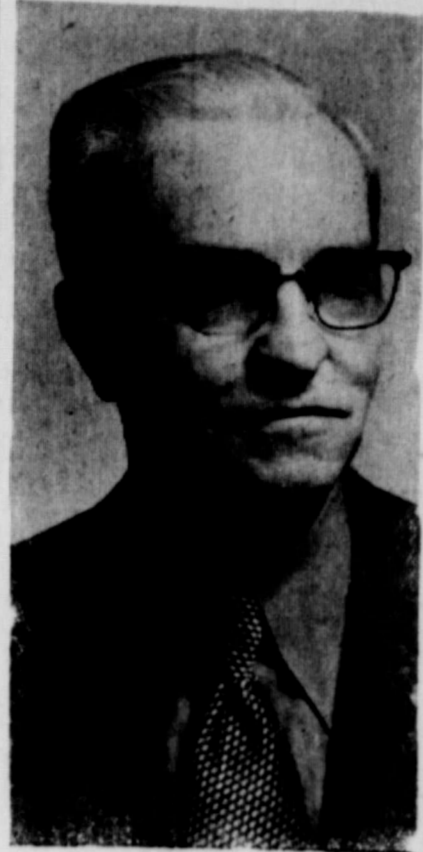
