

To take antlerless deer landowners must have special permits which will be issued at the Courthouse on Oct. 25.

Season for hunting deer with guns is Saturday, Nov. 18, through Jan. 1. Time is 30 minutes before sunrise till 30 minutes past sunset. Archery season for deer hunting is now going on, from Oct. 1 through 31.

A hunter must attach a tag from his hunting license to each deer of either sex which is killed. No special tag is required for the archery season.





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
