HIGHWAY FUNDS SHORT Demand for better highways unning ahead of state ability pay for them, Highway Commission Chairman DeWitt C, Greer says.
Highway work pending ranges in need "from immediate to desperate," according to Greer, and here is no money in sight.
An adequate program fod next ear, with maintenance and oprational costs, would carry a price tag of $\$ 1.2$ billion, Greer esimates.
Highway Department net income for the next 12 months is
estimated at about $\$ 482$ million. Greer cites these factors in the nancial squeeze

- Release of money from the federal highway trust fund has been spasmodic for several ycars
