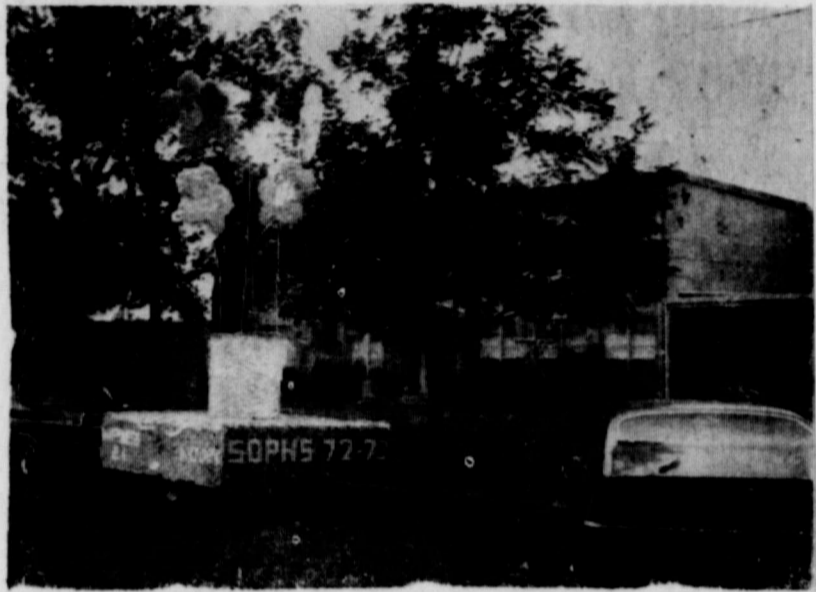

Lots of Rain; Sun Shines Thursday

A couple of new things greeted Bronte area residents when they awakened Thursday morning. The sun was shining and the first frost of the season had painted everything white.

The sunshine was a pleasant change from the cloudy, rainy weather which has covered the area for about a week. Up to 6 inches of rain have fallen in parts of the area since last Wednesday night. This amount was reported by the Wylie Ranch northeast of Bronte.

Dave Seibold recorded 2.7 inches here in Bronte this week. His records show 7.7 inches for October and a big 27 inches for the first 10 months of 1972.

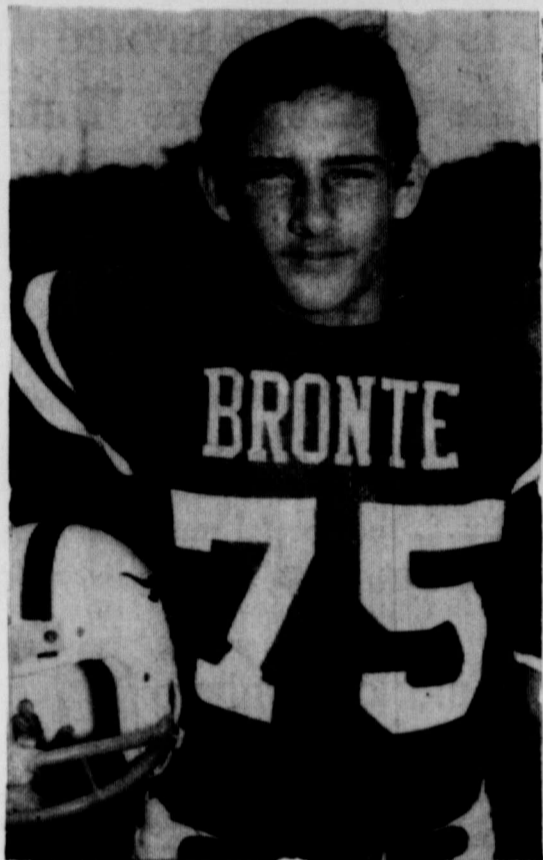

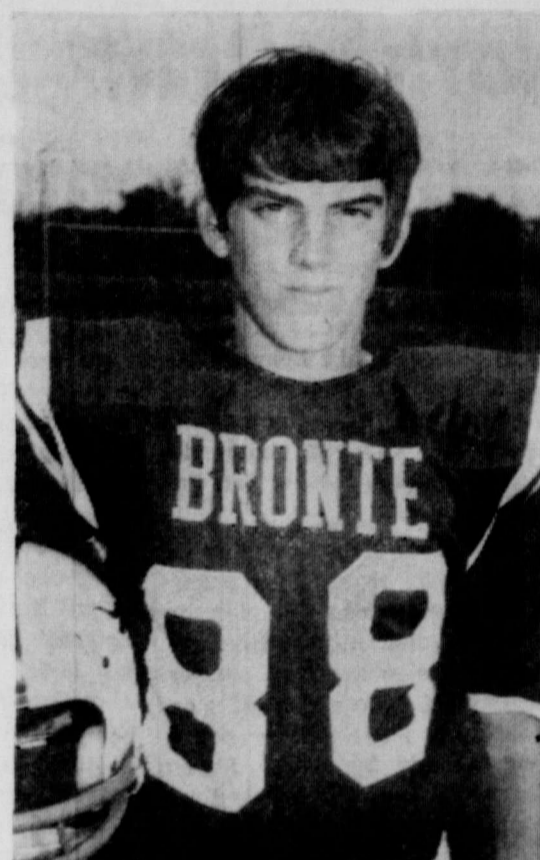

Horns Rout Loraine In Homecoming Tilt

The Bronte Longhorns proved to be real crowd pleasers last Saturday night when they performed before a big homecoming crowd and won the contest 54-24. The game was with the Loraine Bulldogs and adds another victory to the Horns' string for this season.

Alan Barbee was the star of the show as he scored four touchdowns. The Nelson Coulter to Jim Dan Raughton passing combination was also a crowd pleaser as they scored a couple of TDs on pass and run plays. Other counters were made by Bobby Reyes and Danny Carper. Carper's four extra points were frosting on the cake. It was a fine ball game, especially for a homecoming crowd.

First Quarter

Barbee kicked off to the Bulldogs and after three unsuccessful pass tries they punted. Barbee made 6 on two runs and a 3rd down pass gave the Horns a 1st on the Loraine 11. Carper made 1 and Coulter kept for 6. Next play Barbee swept right end for the counter and the Longhorns led 6-0.

Barbee's kickoff went to Robert Alvarez who returned to the 34. A pass from QB Eddy Merket to Mike Jones was good for a 1st on the 46. The Bulldogs pushed as Trinidad Chavez went for another 1st on the Bronte 45 and Sylvester Rose caught a pass for another at the 35. A pass interference call against Bronte was good for another 1st on the

22. Next play was a fumble which was recovered by Bronte on the 20 yard line.

Duncan made 7 and Barbee went for the 1st at the 31. After short gains a pass from Barbee to Raughton put the ball on the Loraine 44 with a 1st. Barbee made 7 to the 36 and Carper made the 1st on the 30. Next play was a big one with a pass from Coulter to Raughton for a TD. Carper made the extras and the score was 14-0.

Loraine took the kickoff and wound up with the ball on the 28 after a clip was called. A pass to Jones was good for a 1st on the Loraine 45 and another of the same moved the ball to the 22 for a 1st. Then Merket passed to Jones for the TD. Another Merket to Jones pass was good for 2 and the score was 14-8.

Barbee took the kickoff near the goal line and returned to the 28. A pass from Coulter to Randy Gibbs made a 1st on the Bronte 47—20 yards. Short gains brought the quarter to a close.

Second Quarter

After one play the Horns punted and the ball was placed on the Loraine 39. A pass interference call gave the Dogs a 1st on the Bronte 46. Jones went for another at the Bronte 32. The defense held and four plays later Bronte took over on their 23. Barbee ran 12 yards for a 1st on the 35. He made 2. Carper added 5 and Duncan made 5 for a 1st on the 45. Another 1st was completed with a pass to Gibbs on the Loraine 42. Gary Skelton led interference for a 1st by Barbee on the 25. Barbee went through the middle for a 1st on the 10. The Horns' next series bogged down as Loraine held and took over on the 1 yard line.

Jones went for 5 and a pass interference call against Bronte made it a 1st on the Loraine 14. Dogs couldn't go and a punt went to Skelton who took it at the 50 and went all the way, but a flag was thrown and the ball was brought back to the Bronte 47. Barbee then made a big gain to the Loraine 33 yard line. Carper added 2 and a beautiful play gave the Horns a 1st as Raughton caught a pass and went to the 5 yard line. A Coulter to Raughton pass made the counter and the score was 20-8. EP try failed.

Barbee kicked off and a couple of plays ended the half.

Third Quarter

The second half kickoff went to Barbee who was downed on his 29. Barbee made 5, then took the ball and dashed 66 yards for

a TD. Try for extras failed and the score was 26-8.

Barbee kicked off and after three tries the Bulldogs had to kick. The Horns found themselves in the same spot after three plays and Barbee punted to the 15. Jones went to the 28 for a 1st, then moved to the 42 for another. On 2nd down Barbee intercepted a pass at the 50 and ran it all the way to cross the double stripe. Carper carried for 2 extra points and it was 34-8.

After the kickoff Loraine was shoved way back. Faced with a 4th and 41, they had to punt. It was short and went out on the Bronte 42. Reyes went for a 1st on the 26, then carried for a touchdown. EP try failed and the scoreboard said 40-8.

The Bulldogs ran the kickoff back to their 46. They got a good drive going and moved to the Bronte 10 for a 1st down. Jones swept left end for a Loraine score, then ran 2 points to make the score 40-16. Bronte recovered an onside kick on the Loraine 48. Reyes made a 1st on the 33. Duncan made 3 and Reyes went to the 21 for a 1st to end the quarter.

Fourth Quarter

Duncan carried twice for 13 yards and a 1st at the 8. Carper made 4, then carried again for the touchdown. Conversion failed and the score was 46-16.

Chavez brought Barbee's kickoff back to his 41. A pass interference call gave Loraine a 1st on the Bronte 44 and on 4th down of the next series. Skelton intercepted a pass on the 34. The Bulldogs then intercept a pass on the Bronte 38. Jones and Chavez moved for 1st downs on the 23 and 13, and from there Merket tossed a pass to Jones for a touchdown. Jones took another pass for the extras and the score was 46-24.

Crawford kicked off to Barbee who took it inside his 20. Barbee zigged and zagged, broke tackles and went over 80 yards for another Bronte touchdown. Carper made 2 extras and the score was 54-24.

The remainder of the game saw Loraine run a series, then the Longhorns ran a series, and the Bulldogs got off three plays before the clock ran out. Score: 54-24.

Outstanding defending was done by Martinez, Chapman, Barbee, Skelton, Reyes, Duncan, Reed, Gibbs, Carper and Raughton.

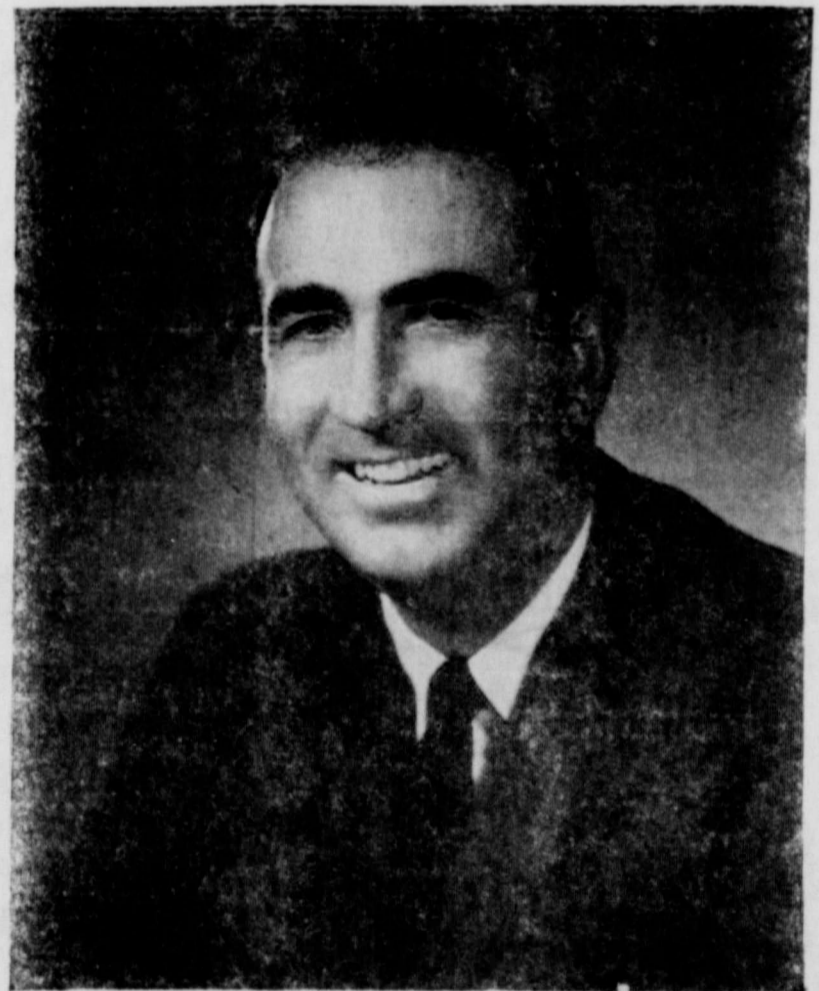

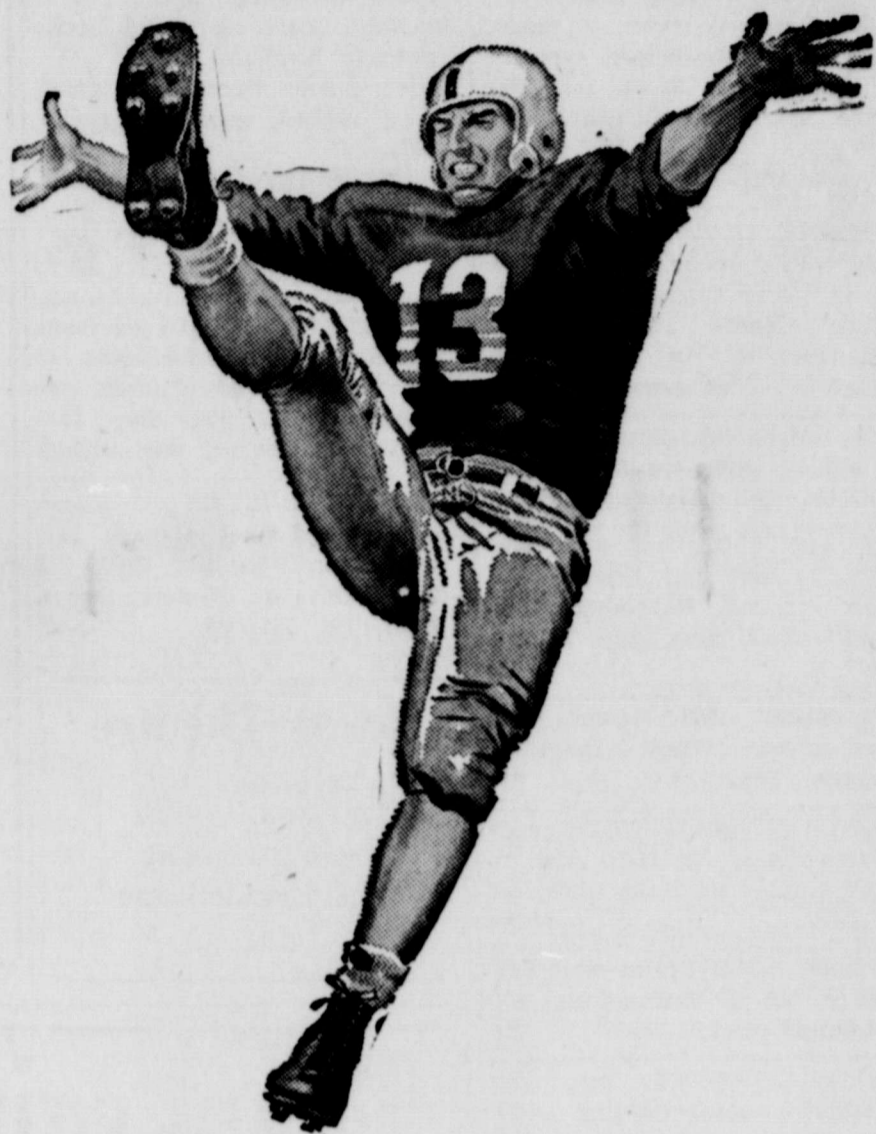
