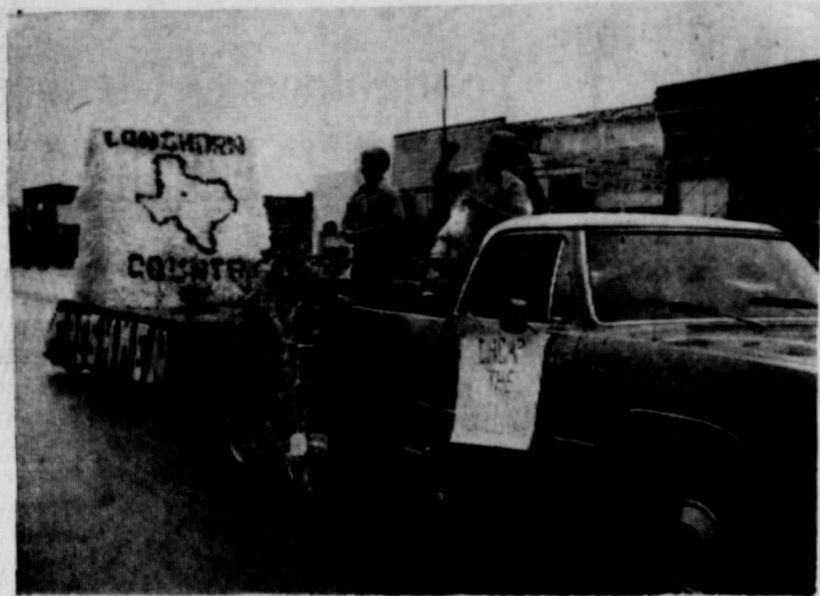

County Goes Republican



Freshman Float in Homecoming Parade

Coke County went Republican in two races in Tuesday's General Election. Voters here gave President Richard M. Nixon better than a 2-1 vote over Sen. George McGovern and Sen. John Tower received a 67 vote margin over Democrat Barefoot Sanders.

So far as this newspaper has been able to determine, this is the first time Coke County ever gave a majority vote to a Republican presidential nominee.

Coke Countians voted more than 2-1 for Dolph Briscoe in his race against Republican Hank Grover. Cong. O. C. Fisher had an easy time outdoing Doug Harlan for U. S. Representative from the 21st District. Renal Rosson of Snyder outran Republican Rich Anderson more than 2-1 for state

representative. Over the entire 63rd District Rosson had 10,729 votes to 9,435 for Anderson.

Close to home, some nine candidates did not have opposition and received a big vote. State Sen. W. E. (Pete) Snelson received 924 votes in Coke; District At-

torney Frank Dickey Jr., 940; County Attorney Roy Ford, 897; Sheriff Melvin Childress, 971; Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs, 1019; Bob Fields, candidate for Commissioner, Precinct 1, 378; Jett Hood, candidate for Commissioner, Precinct 3, 222; Constable Ollie Roe, Precinct 1, 484; Constable Sam Sissom, Precinct 2, 351.

Split Amendments

Coke County split the 14 constitutional amendments which were on the ballot, carrying seven of them and defeating seven of them. The score went like this:

- No. 1: For 407, Against 538.
- No. 2: For 390, Against 372
- No. 3: For 604, Against 302.
- No. 4: For 398, Against 446.

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H D Agent's News Dept.

Pompous and self-satisfied are adjectives frequently attributed to that regal bird, the turkey.

But turkeys have good reason to strut this fall as they're in especially big supply.

Turkey, one of our protein foods, is appearing more and more frequently on the menu. Consumption has risen over the past few years. In 1960, we averaged 6.1 pounds of turkey per person. Last year the average consumption was up to 8.5 pounds.

One of the reasons for the increase might be the many different sizes and forms of turkey we have available. Frozen turkey rolls are becoming increasingly popular. And you no longer have to buy a large bird. You can select the size just right for your family.

With such plentiful supply of turkeys, include this popular meat on the menu frequently.

If you're planning a party, this Turkey Salad Favorite might just be the thing:

2½ quarts (10 cups) cooked turkey—½ inch dice, chilled

2½ quarts (10 cups) celery, ¼

inch dice, chilled
5 cups mayonnaise or salad dressing

2 teaspoons salt

1 teaspoon ground pepper

¼ cup lemon juice

Salad greens

For garnish: toasted almonds, cranberry jelly, sliced eggs or fresh fruit.

Combine turkey, celery and mayonnaise or salad dressing. Season to taste with salt, pepper and lemon juice. Serve ½ cup salad on salad greens on chilled plate or in individual glass salad bowl. Garnish as desired. Makes 20 to 25 servings.

Hash-Wiches

Hash-Wiches are open face sandwiches with built-in flavor appeal.

½ cup minced onion

2 tablespoons butter

1 can undiluted cream of celery soup

2 cups diced turkey

¼ cup milk

Cook onion in butter until tender. Blend in soup with milk. Add diced turkey and season to taste with black pepper. Heat to serving temperature and portion onto hot buttered toast, broiled English muffin halves, hot biscuits or cornbread. Garnish with a colorful cranberry relish.

Turkey Tacos

3 cups diced, cooked turkey

1 small minced onion

Garlic salt

Salt

Pepper

Oregano

½ head shredded lettuce

½ pound diced tomatoes

1 teaspoon lemon juice

2 tablespoons taco sauce

1 dozen corn tortillas

¼ lb. grated Cheddar cheese

Combine turkey, onion, dash of garlic salt, pepper and oregano. In a separate bowl combine lettuce, tomatoes, lemon juice and taco sauce. Warm the corn tortillas, fold in center and stuff with turkey mixture. Fasten with toothpicks. Brown on both sides in hot fat in skillet. Remove toothpicks and fill with seasoned mixture of lettuce and tomatoes. Top the 12 tacos with the cheese. Serve at once with additional taco sauce.

Home Economics Tips

Marinating is used to introduce flavor into a meat dish. At one time, marinades were used for tenderizing purposes, but most cooks today use them for flavoring.

Be sure to check the label on canned, frozen, and dried vegetables. Besides describing contents of the package, the label may tell you the grade, variety, size, and maturity of the vegetables.

As a rule, broken kernels or pieces of shelled nuts are less expensive than whole kernels or halves of the same kind of nuts. The smaller pieces are just as well or better suited for a great many uses, so consider their use before you purchase.

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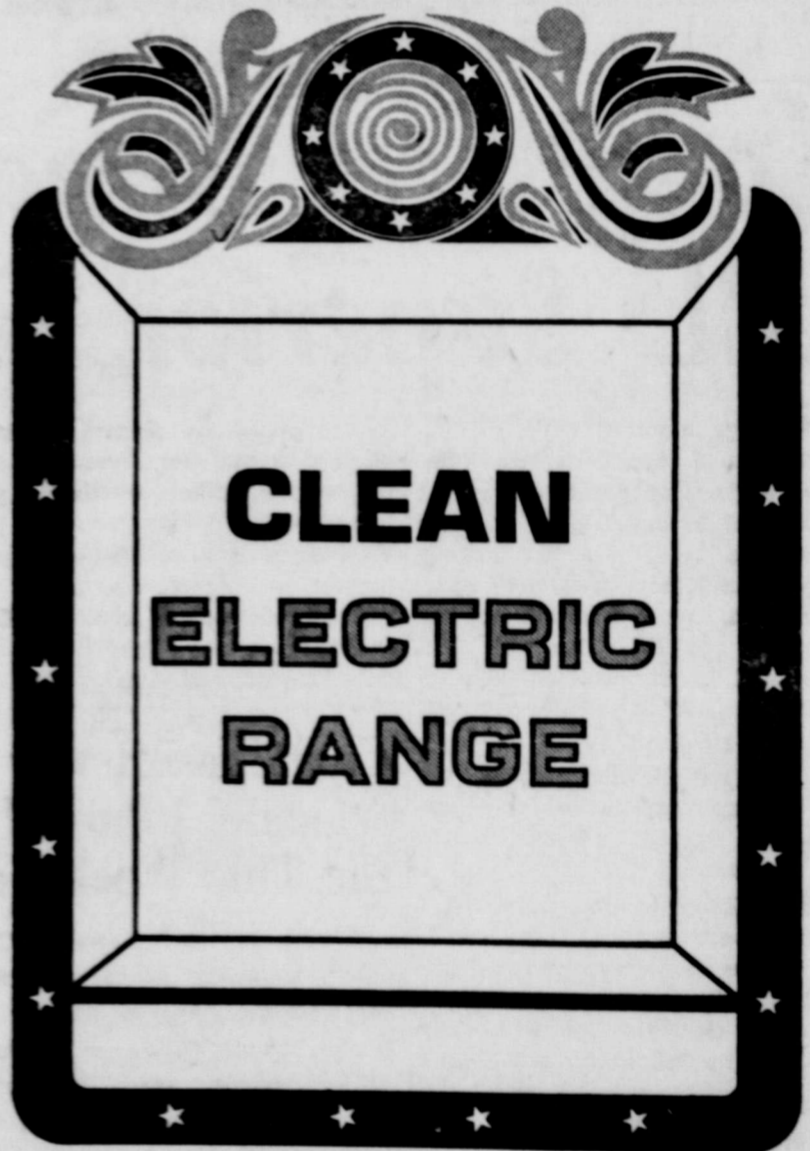

Deer Season Will Open November 18

Deer and turkey season opens Saturday, Nov. 18, and extends to Jan. 1, 1973.

Again this year Coke County is in an area where antlerless deer may be taken. Limit on deer and turkey is two of either sex. Persons who take antlerless deer must have a special tag from the land owner. Archery season for deer was over Oct. 31.

Turkey season also opens Nov. 18 and extends through Jan. 1. Quail season opens Dec. 1 and extends to Feb. 15.

Hunting time is 30 minutes before sunrise until 30 minutes past sunset.

Landowners who lease hunting rights must have a shooting preserve license and record book. They may be obtained at the county clerk's office.

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Longhorns Drop Crucial Game to Jayton, 14-6

The Bronte Longhorns didn't look too good in the first half of their contest against the Jayton Jaybirds last Friday night, but came back in the second half to play some good football and score. Final score was Jayton 14, Bronte 6. Bronte's lone tally came on a 1 yard plunge by tailback, Alan Barbee.

The Longhorns could well have won the game, as they had a touchdown called back and lacked 1 yard making a 1st and had to give up the ball on the Jaybird 8 yard line.

The narrow loss left Jayton and Forsan in the driver's seat in District 3-B, with Bronte in 3rd place.

First Quarter

Jayton's big quarterback, Brad Dibrell, kicked off to get things in motion. It went to Gary Skelton who was stopped on the 25. Bobby Reyes made 1, and Barbee made 11 on two carries for a 1st on the 37. A penalty made it 1st and 5 and Barbee picked up 3. A long pass from Nelson Coulter to Randy Gibbs was good for 27 yards and a 1st on the Jayton 27. Barbee added 5, but Johnson intercepted a 3rd down pass and Jayton had the ball on their 12.

The Kidd brothers, Steve and Parker, were the potent ball movers for the Jays. They mov-

ed to the 24 for a 1st, and a pass to Mark Fincher made a 1st on the Bronte 47. Next series bogged down and Dibrell punted out on the Bronte 15.

Barbee made 8 and Danny Carper made it a 1st on the 25. That was about it and, on 4th down Barbee punted to Cave who was stopped on the Jayton 41. A pass to Parker made a 1st on the Bronte 49 and another pass to S. Kidd was good for 7 on the 42 as the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

P. Kidd went for the 1st on the 35 and S. Kidd made another on the 16. P. Kidd added 5 more and Dibrell kept for a 1st on the 1. Dibrell then went in for the TD and later kicked the EP to make the score 7-0.

Skelton took Dibrell's kickoff back to the 45, but three downs didn't make it and Barbee punted out on the Jayton 32. The Jaybirds couldn't move either and Dibrell got off a boomer to the Bronte 9 yard line.

was penalized on the next series for holding and the Birds were unable to make their 1st down. Dibrell punted out on the Bronte 16.

Coulter lost a yard and Duncan lost 3 more, so Barbee quick kicked on 3rd down to the Bronte 42.

A pass to Parker made 6 and P. Kidd made the 1st on the Bronte 29. P. Kidd picked up 3 and a pass to Cave was good for the counter which covered 20 yards. Dibrell's kick was okay and the score was 14-0.

Skelton returned the kickoff 10 yards to the 32. The next three downs were not good and Barbee punted to the Jayton 41. Jayton wound up with the ball on the Bronte 44 as the first half ended.

Third Quarter

Barbee kicked off to start the second half. It went to Cave who was stopped on the 31. The Birds picked up 1st downs on their 42, the Bronte 46 and 31 before they were stopped. Bronte took over on downs at their 34. Barbee made 3 and a pass to Duncan was good for a big 15 yards and a 1st on the Jaybird 49. Barbee went for 4 and then 3 to the 42. Coulter threw a 3rd down pass to Barbee for a 1st on the 28—real nice. Barbee made 3, and a pass to Jim Dan Raughton was good for the needed distance, but a flag was down and it was called back as the Horns were fined 15 yards for a clip. The loss stopped the drive and the ball wound up on the Jayton 29 after Barbee's kick.

Fourth Quarter

Barbee got off a good kick, almost to the goal line and the Jays were stopped on their 16. They made a 1st on the 26, but couldn't duplicate the effort and Dibrell's short kick gave the Horns the ball on the 41 of Jayton.

Barbee made 5 and Duncan added 1. A time out was called and Duncan was stationed on the side for a hideout play. The pass was good for a 1st on the 15, but could have carried for a TD. The stubborn Jaybirds would allow only 7 yards on four plays and they took over on the 8.

The also stubborn Longhorns allowed the Jays only 2 yards on three plays and they punted to Skelton who was racked up on the 40. After three unsuccessful tries, the Longhorns went into punt formation. Instead of punting, Barbee passed but it was incomplete and the Jays took over on the Bronte 45. Jayton moved for 1st downs on the 33, 22 and 11 and had one more play before the clock ran out. On the final play of the game Bobby Reyes broke through and dropped P. Kidd for a big loss. Final score: Jayton 14, Bronte 6.

The Horns let things get a little out of hand in the first half but they came back loud and clear

in the second half, making their only TD in the 4th quarter and holding the Jaybirds in crucial situations.

As usual Louis Martinez did a fine job on defense, along with the help of Reyes, Duncan, Brad Reed, Carper, Raughton, Barbee, Kit Carlton, Skelton, and Gibbs.

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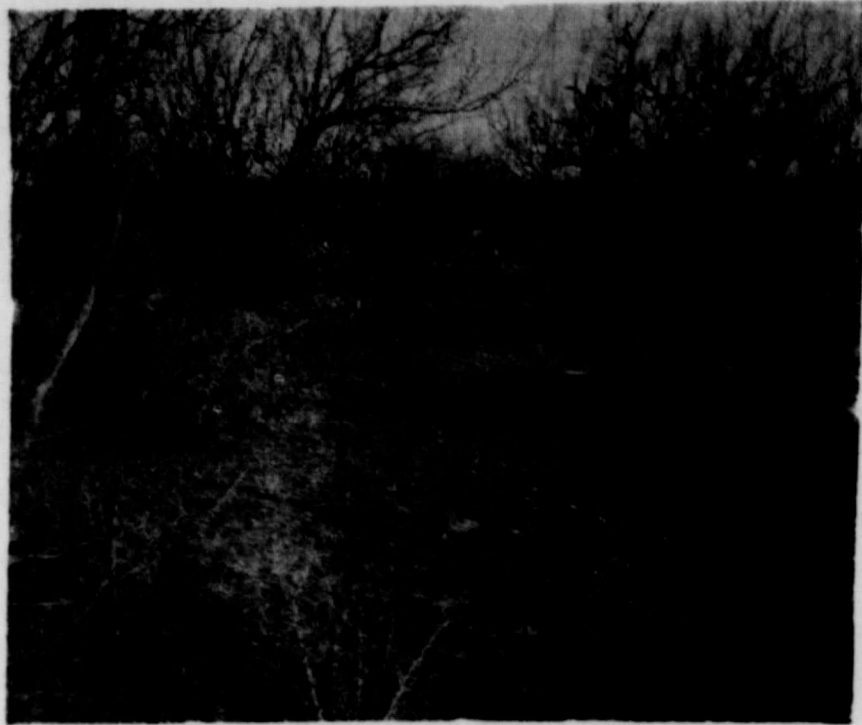

Mesquite Eradication Work on the John Dyess Place Mesquite Eradication Important Here

By Rex Brand
SCS Range Conservationist

Mesquite is a water robber. It takes three or four times as much water to produce a pound of mesquite than is required for a pound of grass. Mesquite is an invader. One tree can gradually infest an entire pasture over a period of years.

There are several different methods of controlling mesquite. Below are listed the methods that Coke County farmers and ranchers are using.

1. Rootplowing
2. Treedozing
3. Chemical, either by aerial spraying or basal application.
4. Chaining in conjunction with aerial spraying.

Management following brush control is very important. To have a good growth of grass the area should not be grazed during the growing season following

treatment. Following deferments of grazing, the pasture should be grazed so at least half of the forage grasses remain at the end of the growing season. Vigorous grass growth will help keep down sprouts.

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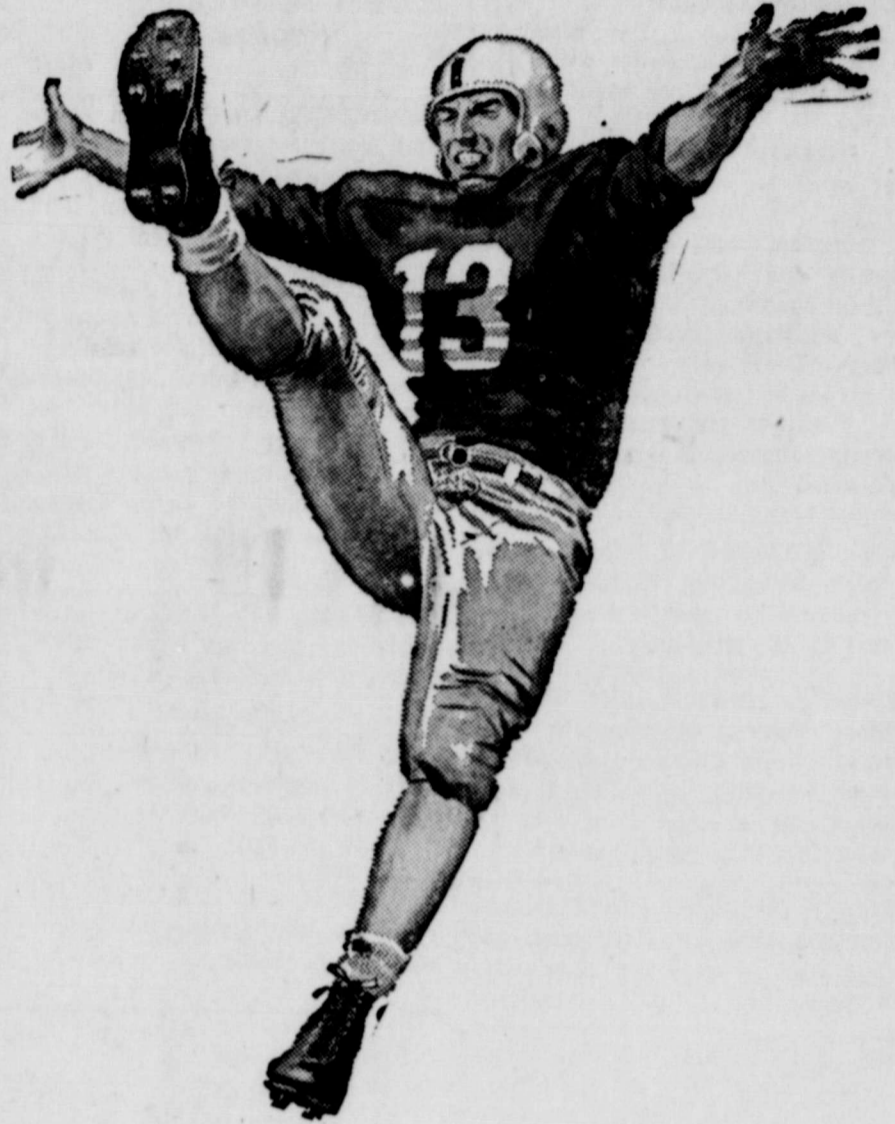
