Phone Rate Raise Asked

An application for increased local telephone rates will be filed officially by General Telephone Co. of the Southwest with Bronte Bronte City Council on Dec. 7, it was announced today by Jack Goss, San Angelo division manager.

Information concerning the application has been presented to city officials prior to the council meeting, according to Goss.

The last rate increase in Bronte was May 16, 1969. The rate of return on invested capital on present telephone rates is 5.26 per cent, while the proposed rates would raise the earnings to 6.70 per cent.

"Steadily increasing operating expenses and taxes along with increased investment in new facilities have made the rate increase necessary," Goss said.

"We have been able to absorb most of the inflationary cost of doing business for the last 3 1/2 years by technological improvements and greater operating efficiencies. However, in order to attract new investors, a fair and adequate return on the capital already invested must be secured."

"Without adequate telephone rates, expansion and improvement of telephone service is impossible," the division manager stated. "Good earnings and good service are inseparable. No business can succeed in meeting the expanding needs of its customers without good earnings to finance its ability to meet those expanded needs."

Also included in the application are increases in rates for PBX and key system services.

"It is our sincere desire to continue to provide Bronte with the most modern and dependable telephone service available," Goss said, "and with adequate return, the goal is attainable."

Goss said the criteria an increase must meet include: that it is cost justified and does not reflect future inflationary expectations; it is the minimum required to assure continued, adequate and safe service; and it will achieve the minimum rate of return needed to attract capital at reasonable costs and not impair the credit of the utility.

Lubbock Funeral For Roy Wilkins

Funeral services for Roy Davis Wilkins, 39, former Bronte resident, were held Tuesday afternoon in Memorial Baptist Church in Lubbock. Burial was in Lubbock Resthaven Memorial Park. The Rev. B. H. Harris of Memorial Baptist Church officiated, assisted by the Rev. Charles Williams, pastor of Hobbs, N. M., First United Methodist Church.

Mr. Wilkins died at 4:37 p.m. Sunday at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. He was stricken at his home in Lubbock before being carried to the hospital.

He was official court reporter for U. S. District Judge Herbert O. Woodward's court based in Lubbock at the time of his death. He had lived in Lubbock about four and a half years.

Mr. Wilkins was born Dec. 31, 1932, and moved with his parents to Bronte in 1948. He was a 1950 graduate of Bronte High School. Upon completion of high school, he studied court reporting at Stenograph Institute in Abilene.
