Weather Is Cold

Head Lice Found At Bronte School

Some confirmed cases of head lice in students at Bronte School have been found and probably there are more, Supt. C. B. Barbee said Tuesday morning.

Barbee said a letter was prepared Tuesday morning and a copy was to be sent home by students Tuesday afternoon. The letter suggested, that anyone who suspects infection should consult his family doctor.

However, suggested medication is included in the letter as outlined by Bronte medical personnel. Barbee said the treatments should be repeated until anyone is sure all the lice and eggs have been destroyed.

School officials will conduct a daily inspection until there is no doubt that all the parasites have been destroyed. Barbee said one way to prevent spreading the infection is to isolate infected children, and present plans call for anyone who is infected to be carried home and not allowed back in school until the parasites are cleared up.

The Cranberry Crisis

Thanksgiving is almost here, and you know that means good food, good times, and good-bye good garments if cranberry stains aren't treated right.

Treat the stain as soon as possible.

Many stains can be removed easily when fresh, but they're difficult—or next to impossible—to remove later. Always remove stains before subjecting them to tumble drying or pressing, as heat tends to set or fix stains.

To treat cranberry stain on a washable fabric, soak the fresh stain in cool water, then wash in warm suds and rinse.

If the stain remains, make a solution of two tablespoons of hydrogen peroxide to each gallon of water. Test the solution on hidden section of the garment. Then soak stains one-half hour or longer, if necessary. Rinse twice.

On dry cleanable fabrics, first sponge stain with cool water. Immediately work a liquid laundry detergent into stain. Let stand several hours.

Then test a drop or two of white vinegar on a hidden section of the garment to be sure it won't affect the color.

If no color change occurs, apply a few drops of vinegar and let remain a minute or two. Sponge with cool water.

Cranberry stains are some of the hardest to remove. But if the garment is worth saving, it's worth a little extra time and effort to follow stain removal procedures.

Turkey Left-Overs

After the fabulous Thanksgiving feast is over, there is almost sure to be a lot of leftovers.

Turkey leftovers can be turned into countless dishes—from appetizers to main course, from sandwiches to glamorous dishes.

But first, what's left of the roast turkey must be stored properly.

As soon as the meal is finished, scoop the stuffing out of the neck and body cavities of the turkey. Cool the stuffing quickly by immediate refrigeration. Later, cover the cooled stuffing.

The turkey should be treated much the same way—cool and then wrap loosely to prevent drying.

If desired, the meat can be cut from the bones and stored. Some prefer to wrap the white and dark meat separately.

Plan to use frozen leftover turkey within four to six weeks.

One way of preparing these leftovers is making them into a turkey club sandwich supreme. It's tops for a luncheon, supper or late evening snack.

To make a turkey club sandwich supreme, first cover pump-ernickle rye bread slices with crisp lettuce leaves. Then add layers of sliced swiss cheese, tomato slices and sliced roast turkey—both white and dark meat. Top with crisp bacon and serve with Thousand Island dressing. White bread and American cheese can be used.

For a gourmet style appetizer, try a turkey cube and a piece of dill pickle or preserved watermelon rind on a toothpick. Serve these with a bowl of Russian dressing.

A rich, well seasoned cream sauce containing bite size chunks of turkey is glamorous served over biscuit, split and toasted cornbread, or crisp fried noodles. To make the dish elegant, add pineapple tidbits to the sauce.

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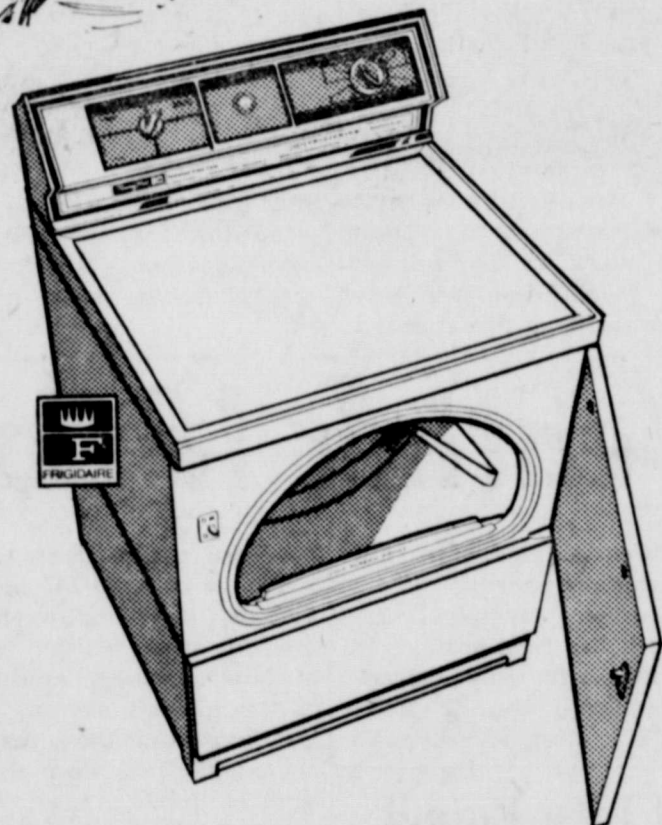

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Horns End Season with Win Over Forsan

The Bronte Longhorns wound up their 1972 football season last Friday night in a blaze of glory, as they defeated their perennial opponents, the Forsan Buffaloes, 14-12. The game was played on a cold and fog-shrouded field in Forsan and the game was a well-matched and thrilling District 3-B football game that has come to characterize athletic contests between the two schools.

It was a game of opportunities because the Buffaloes converted a pass interception and a fumble

into 12 points, while the Longhorns converted two fumbles, both recoveries by senior tackle, Gary Skelton, into a big 14 points.

It was good defense by both teams, but the Longhorns stayed pretty much on the ground, throwing four times and completing only one for 14 yards, while having two intercepted. Leading ball carrier for Bronte was Alan Barbee with 28 carries for 128 yards and two touchdowns. Danny Carper was second with 14 carries for 46 yards.

Forsan took to the air 14 times, completing four for 71 yards and one touchdown and having one intercepted by halfback Jim Dan Raughton.

First Quarter

Barbee kicked off to David Crooks who returned to the Forsan 37. Forsan had one completion and 4 yards in three tries and punted. On first play Barbee got 10 and had another 15 tacked on for a personal foul penalty for the first of Bronte's 11 1st downs. Carper and Barbee got only 4 in three tries so Barbee punted.

Landan Solés got 1, but got the 1st of Forsan's 10 1st downs, when a Longhorn was accused of face mask violation. Forsan could get only 9 yards in four tries so Bronte took over on the Forsan 49. Barbee got 8, Carper 4, Barbee another 3, then Nelson Coulter hit senior split end Randy Gibbs with a beautiful pass that carried to the 20. The opportunity looked golden, but Barbee and Mark Duncan could get only 9 in four carries so the Buffs took over on their own 11.

When Forsan couldn't move and punted out to the 37, Bronte started moving with Barbee getting 8, Carper 11, Duncan 12, and Coulter 4. But the Horns wound up shy and Forsan took over on the 4 as the 1st quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Forsan ran two plays, lost 2 yards and fumbled, and Skelton recovered for the Longhorns. Three tries were necessary before Barbee punched it across. Barbee ran the conversion for 2 and the score was Bronte 8, Forsan 0.

After Barbee's kickoff Robert

Wash got a 1st and two plays later Raughton intercepted Mike Murphy's pass intended for Rudy Holquin. Barbee got 4, Duncan 4, Barbee 4, Carper 3, and then it happened. James Chadwell intercepted Coulter's pass intended for Duncan on the Forsan 27.

The Buffaloes picked up two 1st downs before Murphy hit Holquin with a 41 yarder good for 6 points. Conversion try, a Murphy-to-Solés pass, was broken up by Barbee. Score: Bronte 8, Forsan 6.

After the Forsan kickoff, Bronte couldn't move the ball and a bad punt almost put the Longhorns in trouble. A bright spot before the first half ended was when Gibbs got through to throw Murphy for a 10 yard loss.

Third Quarter

The Longhorns kicked off to the Buffs and on the first play from scrimmage Martinez and Barbee teamed to put the squeeze on the ball carrier and recover the ensuing fumble. The Horns ran two plays and fumbled the ball back to the Buffaloes on the Forsan 20.

One successful series, then the Buffaloes punted to the Bronte 17. Bronte ran two plays and gave the ball back to Forsan via a fumble at the Bronte 30.

Forsan pushed up two 1st downs and Murphy carried the last 3 yards on a 4th down play for a counter which put the Buffs ahead of the Longhorns 12-8. The ball carrier was smothered on the conversion attempt and the score remained, Bronte 8, Forsan 12.

Following the Forsan kickoff, Bobby Reyes, Carper and Barbee moved the ball to the Forsan 18 before Wash intercepted another Longhorn pass.

Fourth Quarter

Forsan couldn't go and punted to the Bronte 44. Barbee carried for 8, 15, 6 and 6, but a holding penalty and a miscue slowed progress. Barbee got 20 and 3 before a 4th down reverse lost 10 and the ball.

A determined defense and two illegal motion penalties rocked the Buffaloes back to their own 20 where Skelton recovered a 3rd down fumble.

Opportunity doesn't knock on the door all evening; in fact there was only 1½ minutes left when the Longhorns took over after Skelton's recovery. Sophomore tailback Barbee got the call to carry and he ground out 2, 6 and

a big 12 which also meant he made an even bigger 6 points, to put the Longhorns out front 14-12. Barbee tried a run for 2 extras but it failed but Bronte was still leading by a big 14-12.

With a little over a minute on the clock Forsan put on a drive from their 34 to the Bronte 23. They tried a field goal but it was busted by the Longhorn defense. Fifteen seconds and one play later the ball game was over. Final score: Bronte 14, Forsan 12.

Games notes show that all the boys playing out their last year of eligibility did a great job. Brad Reed did a fine defensive job, particularly in the last crucial four

minutes. Sophomores Kit Carlton and Davy Chapman made their consistent good contributions. Freshmen Mark Lee and Kerwin Denton provided good back up play for the team. In fact, all the Longhorns contributed mightily, or they would not have enjoyed this big win.

Bronte was 6-4 for the season and 4-2 for district. The Horns tied with Roby and Forsan for second place in District 3-B. Jay-ton won the district crown with a perfect 6-0 record which included an earlier 14-6 victory over the Longhorns.

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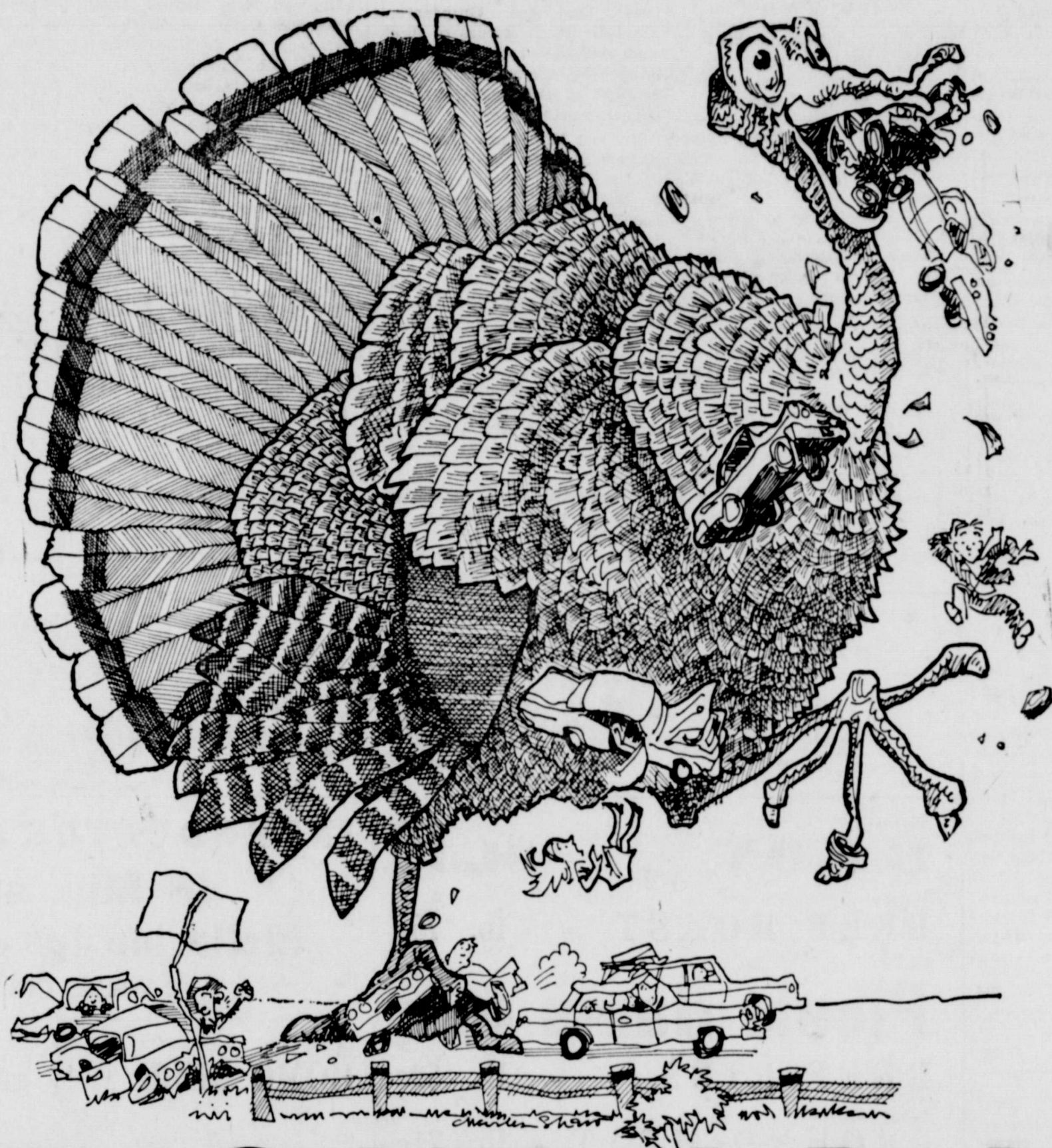
