

A resolution to create this citizens' commission will be introduced in the 63rd Legislature, and the 36 appointees will be selected by a committee of the elected leaders of state government.

This committee will probably include the Governor, Lt. Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and Presiding Judge of the Criminal Appeals Court.

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





He attended Park College, Parkville, Mo., where he met and married Lavina May Jenner Feb. 2, 1930. In 1931 they moved to Cedar Rapids, Icwa, where he attended Coe College. He received his medical education and M. D. degree at University of




