

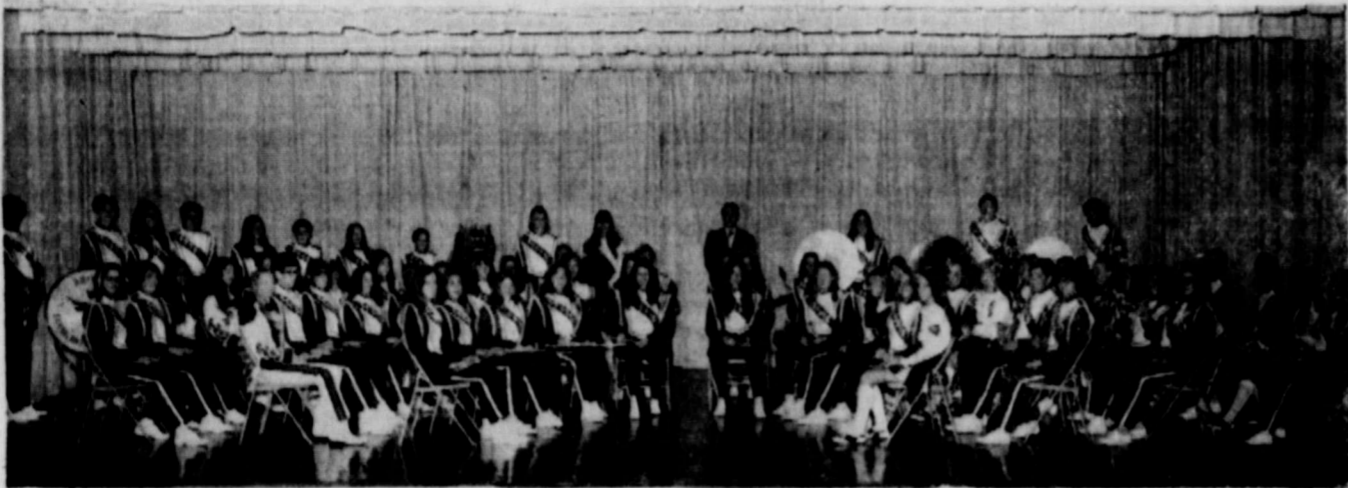

A Christmas concert and style show will be presented in Bronte School auditorium Sunday, beginning at 3 p.m. The program will be under the direction of Mrs. Royce Fancher, homemaking teacher, and Louis Thornton, band director.

The style show will be first on the program, with 22 girls in the H.E. I class and 13 girls in the H.E. II class modeling their creations.

Both class and home projects will be among the garments to be modeled. Dresses, jump suits, pants suits, hot pants and other

clothing will be shown.

Following the style show, the "Swingers," school stage band, will present several numbers, including: "Put on a Happy Face," "Peter Gunn Theme," "Autumn Leaves," "Cotton Candy," "25 or 6 to 4," "Beer Barrel Polka" and several Christmas carols.

Next will be an intermission when punch and cookies will be served by the Band Booster Club.

The Longhorn Concert Band will conclude the program with the following numbers:

Cold Weather, Ice Cover Bronte Area

Cold weather has continued this week, but had moderated somewhat by Wednesday.

Worst part of the wintry blast occurred Monday afternoon and night when a fine mist combined with sub-freezing temperatures to cover every exposed surface with a slick glaze of ice. Any kind of movement was hazardous early Tuesday morning. However a bright sun rose and the ice cover was quickly melted.

Wednesday morning's temperature was near 20 degrees and a cloud cover Thursday kept the thermometer a little above freezing.

Coke County received \$30,171 in its first check from the federal revenue sharing program, it was announced Tuesday by County Judge W. W. Thetford.

The judge said the county will get another \$30,000 later. The City of Robert Lee received \$1,635 and the City of Bronte got \$1,746 of the federal money.

Judge Thetford said the money

can be used for various county needs as they arise. The county money, he said has been deposited in a special account until commissioners have time to make a study of needs.

Members of the Commissioners' Court have been contacted by several persons on the possibility of piping treated water into the rural areas of the county. They have checked with the Farmers Home Administration, as well as land owners in the area. FHA informed them that in order to get any help from the federal government, the project would have to be county wide.

It was brought out that such a project would be beneficial to the area, since so much water is unfit for home use in many rural areas. Many rural families have moved to town in order to have good water and a good supply. Many ranches do not have enough water to stock the land as heavily as it would otherwise support.

Mayor Martin Lee said this week that Bronte City Council will have no trouble finding a need for the \$1746 received. He said the matter will have to be studied. One project under consideration is construction of an equipment shed at the water filtering plant in the north part of town. The mayor said a shelter is badly needed as much of the city's equipment has to sit out in the weather.

Christmas Is In the Air

Christmas is in the air in Bronte with bright lights burning every night and many of the town's business windows gaily decorated. Many homes over the city also have beautiful decorations to add to the holiday spirit.

Christmas holidays for Bronte School kids will begin at 2:30 next Wednesday and classes will resume Jan. 2. Supt. C. B. Barbee said the school was able to stay on its original holiday schedule because classes were not dismissed Monday or Tuesday, as was the case with many area schools. He said apparently the cold weather had little or no effect on attendance.

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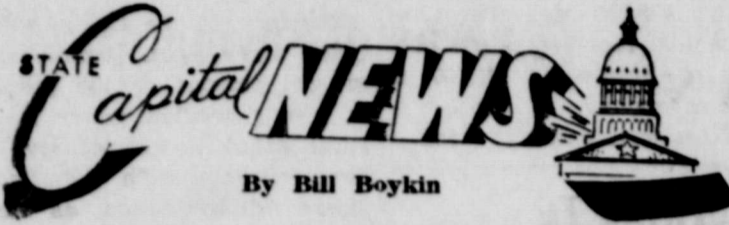


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Austin — Proposals for major "reform" statutes and changes in the House and Senate rules have been drawn by Texas legislative leaders.

Rep. Price Daniel Jr., Liberty, slated to be the next Speaker of the House of Representatives, has announced a nine point "reform" program.

Several Senate members and Lt. Gov.-elect Bill Hobby, Houston, have discussed proposals to change some of the "reform" rules adopted by the fourth called session of the 62nd Legislature.

Speaking to a seminar sponsored by the Texas Society of Association Executives, Daniel listed these proposed changes in state statutes—which he feels are necessary because of a "mandate" of Texas voters this year:

1. A one term limit for the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
 2. Elimination of the pledge card system for election of the House Speaker — where pledges are exchanged for support of legislation.
 3. Disclosure by the Speaker of contributions to support his campaign for that office.
 4. A limit on the number of conferences on tax bills.
 5. A new "open records" law which would provide more access to public documents—with certain guidelines and safeguards.
 6. Improvement of campaign contribution laws.
 7. Tightening of the laws governing lobbyist registration.
 8. An ethics code for legislators.
 9. Changes in the state's "Open Meetings" law to provide the public with more information about actions of governmental bodies.
- Daniel said these proposed "reform" measures should not be tagged with liberal or conservative labels.
- "Liberal and conservative labels are unfair to the 77 new members

of the Legislature. They have not yet cast a vote. The new members will be more independent and reform minded, because that's what the voters demanded in the primary, run-off and general elections this year," he added.

I don't believe we should overreact to the problems of the past," he said when he discussed major changes in House rules which will be introduced.

CITIZEN'S CONSTITUTIONAL COMMISSION WILL BE SELECTED — Elected leaders of the three branches of state government — executive, legislative and judicial — will be appointing 36 Texans to a citizens' commission to study needed constitutional changes and report its recommendations next November.

A resolution to create this citizens' commission will be introduced in the 63rd Legislature, and the 36 appointees will be selected by a committee of the elected leaders of state government.

This committee will probably include the Governor, Lt. Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and Presiding Judge of the Criminal Appeals Court.

At a recent meeting of leaders in the drive for constitutional reform, the addition of the Attorney General to that committee was supported.

LAWMAKERS LOOK AT BUDGET — Key lawmakers who make up the Legislative Budget Board met here this week to take a look at multi-billion-dollar state spending plans the legislature must pass on soon.

Other signs of preparation for a vital and stormy 63rd legislative session are apparent.

Lt. Gov.-elect Hobby has moved into temporary offices and has assembled a staff.

Both the incoming Lieutenant Governor and Speaker are working on their assignments to key committees which process legislation, although they prefer not to talk publicly about this important chore.

The Legislature, under new leadership and with a near record crop of freshman members, faces a staggering array of tasks.

In addition to the usual problems of making spending fit income, lawmakers have assigned themselves a monumental task of furthering legislative reform.

A hangover from the 1971 session is House of Representative redistricting which must be redone or left to a federal court for boundary realignment.

Big decisions will also be necessary in the education field if the U. S. Supreme Court upholds a December 1971 decision invalidating the present Texas system of financing public school education.

"SHIELD LAW" BACKED — Speaker-to-be Daniel has informed newspapers, radio and television stations he will back a bill in the Legislature next year to protect confidentiality of news sources.

Daniel's bill provides that no newsman may be required to disclose information or sources of information obtained in confidence in the course of news gathering and distribution. The privilege conferred would not extend to actions for libel, slander or invasion of privacy.

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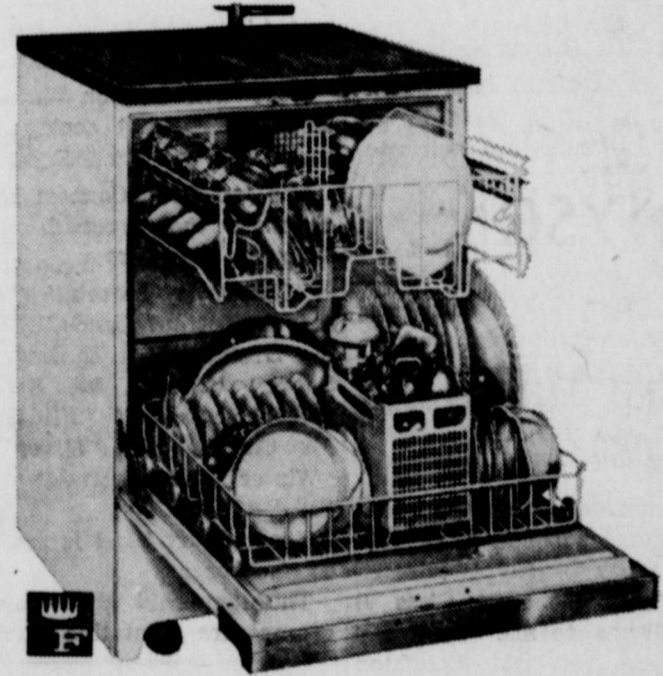
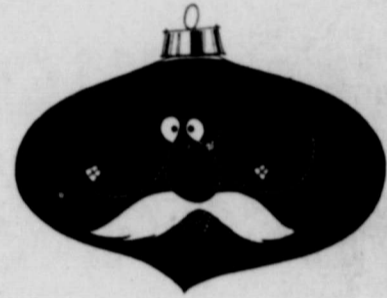
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CHRIST IS BORN IN A MANGER

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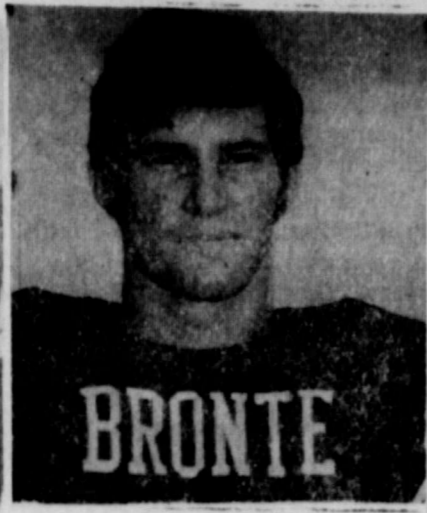

FUNERAL SERVICES THURSDAY FOR DR. JOHN D. McDANIEL, 64

Funeral services for Dr. John Duncan McDaniel, 64, were held at 2:30 p.m. Thursday in Robert Lee School auditorium. The Rev. A. A. Kendall, pastor of First United Methodist Church, and the Rev. Joe Cooper, pastor of St. Mark's Presbyterian Church of San Angelo, officiated. Burial was in Lawnhaven Memorial Gardens in San Angelo, directed by Newby Funeral Home.

Dr. McDaniel was found dead at his home about 8 p.m. Tuesday. Dr. W. J. Swann of Sterling City was called and established time of death at about 7:30 p.m., apparently from a heart attack.

Dr. McDaniel was born Nov. 2, 1908, in Nakon Si Thammarik, Siam (Thailand), the son of missionary parents, Dr. and Mrs. E. B. McDaniel. His parents were commissioned by the Presbyterian Mission Board to serve as medical missionaries in Siam. He lived in Siam most of his life until he was 14. He attended Park College, Parkville, Mo., where he met and married Lavina May Jenner Feb. 2, 1930. In 1931 they moved to Cedar Rapids, Iowa, where he attended Coe College. He received his medical education and M. D. degree at University of Iowa Medical School.

He carried on private practice for two years and entered the Army in 1942. He was stationed at Fort Clark, Bracketville, and served four years in the Pacific during World War II. He returned to private practice in 1946 for a brief time, then accepted an appointment in 1947 to serve as a medical missionary. He returned to Thailand and established an orphanage in Bangkok and started a hospital before returning to the States in 1949.

Dr. McDaniel moved his family to Robert Lee in October 1949. Coke County Memorial Hospital began construction soon after he came to Robert Lee. Later the hospital was enlarged and the name changed to West Coke County Hospital. Another addition later also placed West Coke County Nursing Home under his care.

Dr. McDaniel was a Presbyterian.
