> Strengthening the lobby registration act and adoption of a new code of ethics, early creation of a constitutional revision commission, penial code revision, laws to curb "fences" of stolen property and give courts power to deny bail to dangerous offenders, requiring convicts to serve more of their sentences before becoming eligible for parole, more emphasis on vocational education and a requirement that spending bills be accomplanied with long range estimates.

SENATE RULES ADOPTED Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby easily won his first big test of authority in the Senate when rules he favored were adopted 24-6.

One of the most significant rules for Hobby restored his power to appoint all Senate committees. A change adopted last September fixed appointments on the lieutenant governor authority only to fill vacancies.

Another alteration in which newspaper executive Hobby had a strong interest will require Senators to vote in open meeting on confirmation of appointments by the governor. They will still debate qualifications and character of appointees in closed sessions unles two-thirds of Senators vote otherwise.

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

(4) Through the Holy Spirit we are guided into all truth and shown things to come and given power to overcome (John 16:13).



Mrs. Sweet Goes to Alaska

Mrs. Elna Sweet has returned from a Christmas visit with her children and their families, Mr. and Mrs. Gene Cole and Joe in Dallas and Mr. and Mrs. Walter Sweet, Kyle, Kerry and Kody of Kenjai, Allaskia.

She was greatly impressed with the beauty and grandeur of Alaska. Its deep rivers and rugged mountains, she found, were very excitting, and it was truly a white Christmas, with the entire countryside covered with snow and fresh snow falls every few days. The sun rises at 10:30 and sets at 3:30. Temperatures are usually zero and below except when it warms up to snow, she said.

People there go about their business with no regard to the darkness and they dress warmly for out-of-doors.

She went snowmobilling with her grandsons and partying with her son and his wife.

Most of the people she met were young couples connected with the oil industry. She met very few people her age, and said at times she felt like Grandmia Moses. But, she said, a grandmia is so unique up there and she was treated like

She attended a party hosted by the Soldadna Hospital, as her son is on the administrative board. She was interested in the varied types of personnel among the hospital employees and board mem-

She said conversation was informative and stimulating with very little of it political. The affairs of the "outside," as the other states are called, seemed very

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
