Defensive Driving Course Planned

A course in Defensive Driving will be held at Bronte School early next month in two four-hour sessions, on Monday, March 5, and Friday, March 9, from 6 till 10 p.m. Instructor for the course will be from the Region XV Media Center in San Angelo.


Persons who complete the course will be allowed a 10 per cent discount on their liability and medical payments and collision insurance. The discount does not include comprehensive coverage.

Cost of the course is \$10, and the first 35 persons to apply will be accepted. Anyone who is interested in taking the course may register in the office of the school superintendent.

Only the principal driver of a car is required to take the course in order to be eligible for the cheaper insurance rate. However, if a family has more than one vehicle, the principal driver of each of them must take the course in order to be eligible.

OIL OUTPUT WIDE OPEN AGAIN - The Railroad Commis sion ordered wide open, 100 per cent market demand oil production for the 12th straight month. In making the announcement, Commission Chairman Jim Lang don offered "some good news and some bad news." He said there were no "tremendously serious" shortages during the crucial winter months in spite of heating oil stock declines.

However, Langdon warned, the peak gasoline consuming season is just around the corner, and gasoline stocks are 19.2 million barrels below 1972 in the nation. Further, crude and products stock in the U.S. are 70.2 million barrels off last year.

"The petroleum industry has managed to get out of the frying pan but now is in the fire," said Langdon.
