

* Employment of more auditors to monitor payments by business

firms to the state. * Authority for cities to pursue in the courts collection of sales taxes once they are declared delinquent by the comptroller.

* Requirement that business firms post bond to insure payment of their sales taxes.

The report charged Comptroller Robert S. Calvert has "pursued a policy which encourages sales tax delinquency" and has refused to demand adequate assurance of payment from new and consistently delinquent taxpayers.

The proposed bonding requirement passed the House last week but failed to clear the Senate.

WELFARE BUDGET QUES-TIONED - Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby asked additional data from the Welfare Department to justify its case for major budget increases.

Hobby complained the department is asking for 2,851 new staff, positions at a time when the federal government will take over cost of public assistance payments to some 275,000 aged, blind and disabled. While more Textans may qualify for state Medicaid coverage under the new federal provisions, Hobby said, he is not convinced the number of recipients of the medical care will be doubled as estimated by the Welfare Department.
