Questionnaires were mailed out to Coke County citizens this week to determine their wishes on how federal revenue sharing funds should be used. The county has received approximately \$60,000 in federal funds this year and is supposed to receive the same amount for five years.

Items listed on the card included a county wide water program, recreation centers, livestock show barn, library services and new fire trucks. Also a blank was left for any additional ideas anyone has on the matter.

Coke County commissioners' court has received requests from various groups to spend the money for different things, so the commissioners decided to take a poll and try to determine the wishes of the people.

Some stations and cafes will remain open. First National Bank will take a holiday and the post office will be closed. City hall also will be closed, as will county offices in Robert Lee.


Readers of the Enterprise are urged to shop and take care of business matters early, so the closing of businesses and offices will not be an inconvenience.

We have all come to realize what this school, the faculty, and our fellow students mean to us. We feel Bronte School has given us many useful and unforgettable experiences.

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


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Last Will and Testament Of '73 Graduating Class

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Pecan Trees Need Spraying

The pecan nut casebearer is hatching and entering the small nuts. I found one to two day old larva in three of six locations checked Tuesday, May 22.

The following chemicals may be used to control the casebearer: Malathion, Toxaphene or Sevin.

Add zinc sulfate to your spray to control rosette.

Two applications, five to seven days apart may be advisable this year. Indications point to an elongated egg hatch period this year.

The second generation of casebearer should come 28 to 32 days later in case you wish to spray the next go round.

Anyone who has a question is invited to call the Coke County Extension Service office.
