AD-LIB-BEN

The years are passing more swiftly. We crowd ever more ideas and events into them. Change and controversy are multiplied. They seem, on occasion, to border on revolution. This ferment is disquieting but unavoidable. Almost everywhere man's condition is being sharply altered. And more is in the offing.

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the second group to be released after the so-called cessation of the war.

Colonel Jayroe is married to the former Ann Adams who used to live at Bronte and attended Bronte High School. She is a granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Rogers of Bronte, and lived with them when she attended school here.

Mrs. Jayroe has kept their family together during the six years her husband was a prisoner of war and has lived in Dallas for the last few years.

Colonel Jayroe said in interviews after his release that stories of atrocities and mistreatment are all true. He told of one occasion when he was forced to sit for 17 days on a stool, his legs manacled and his hands tied behind his back. He was allowed no sleep, was given little food and was harassed constantly by his captors, who wanted him to sign a statement.

"It was ironic," he said. "What they wanted me to sign was a paper stating that I was not being mistreated."

He finally signed. The colonel's hometown is Georgetown, S. C., and citizens staged a gala welcome party for him when he returned in early April. In addition to being reunited with his wife and their three children, Colonel Jayroe had a reunion with his 80 year old mother and nine brothers and sisters.

Having family members serve their country and sacrifice for it is nothing new for Mr. and Mrs. Rogers. They had two sons and two sons-in-law who served in World War II. One of their sons was killed in action. Then during the Vietnam War they had three

grandsons who served in Southeast Asia, and one of them was killed with only 27 days remaining before he was scheduled to come home.

All this and Jay Jayroe's sacrifice of six years of his life.

Entertain at Tea

One of the nicest ways to visit with old friends or to introduce a new neighbor is still an old style tea or coffee "kitch." For refreshments, offer a choice. Bake or buy your favorite fruit and nut bread and feature one special cake. This sponge cake, filled with jelly and dusted with confectioners sugar, is a typical English tea cake.

English Tea Cake

- 1 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup corn starch
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs, separated
- 1/2 cup corn oil
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/4 cup jam or jelly
- Confectioners sugar

Grease 2 (8 x 1 1/4-inch) layer cake pans; line with waxed paper. Sift together into a mixing bowl, flour, sugar, corn starch, baking powder and salt. In another bowl, beat together lightly with a fork, egg yolks, corn oil and water. Stir into dry ingredients. Beat egg whites until stiff peaks form when beater is raised. Fold into flour mixture. Pour into prepared pans. Bake in 375°F. oven 25 to 30 minutes or until top springs back when lightly touched with finger. Remove from pans. Cool. Sandwich layers together with jam or jelly and dust with confectioners sugar.

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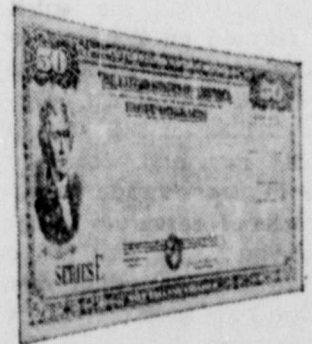

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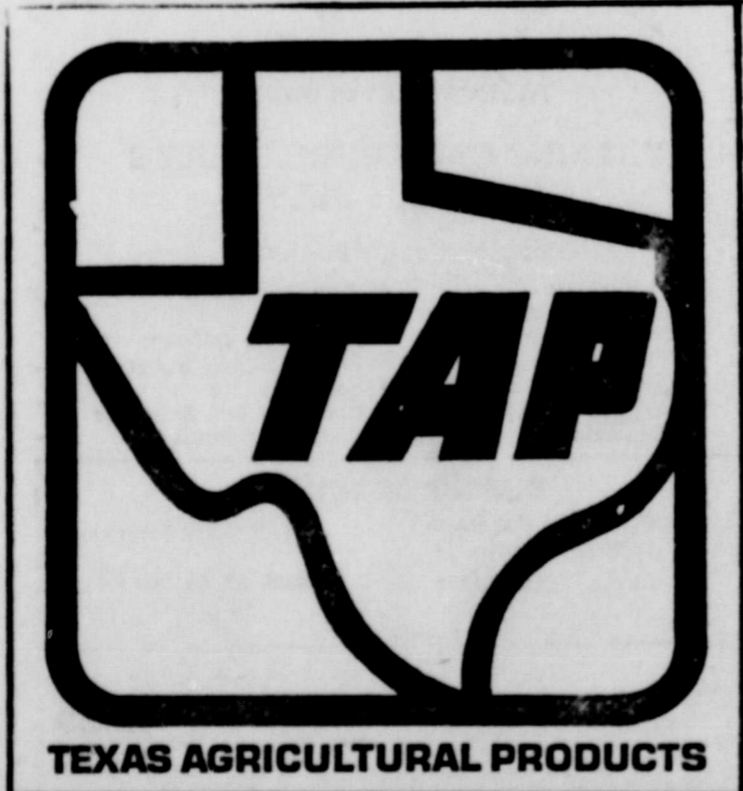
