Republican Kay Bailey Hutchison was the hands-down winner over incumbent Bob Krueger in Saturday's runoff election for US Senate.

Hutchison carried Castro County by a large margin, 602-271, and walked away with the vote statewide as well.

Hutchison will fill the Texas seat vacated by US Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen.

Krueger had been appointed by Gov. Ann Richards to serve as US Senator until the election.

Riley says he will continue to live at Sunnyside and will travel to across the state for one or two weeks per month.

He did graduate work in crop production and plant breeding at Texas Tech and was an instructor of agronomy there before returning to the family farm in the latter part of 1958. He's been farming ever

Riley said his family has farms College Station and other places in Castro, Deaf Smith, Fannin and Lamb Counties and they raise corn, cotton, sugar beets and wheat; have a hybrid forage sorghum seed production; and pasture and feed

As chairman of the State ASCS Committee, Riley said he hopes to streamline ASCS to make it more cost-effective and efficient in its work for Texas producers. He said the committee will be prepared to answer any requests from the Secretary of Agriculture or Congress during organization of the 1995

"I'm looking forward to working with county offices and committees -they're the backbone of ASCS," Riley said.

He said the committee "intends to meet Texas farmers' needs and work with farmers in Texas as partners, delivering services to farmers in a manner which they can use to better their farming opera-

In addition to his hands-on farming experience, Riley has served on several agricultural boards and committees through the years.

He served three terms on the US Cotton Board, earning an initial appointment from Sec. of Agriculture Bergland during the Jimmy Carter Administration. He was reappointed to the board two times under succeeding ag secretaries.

He served as a director of the American Sheep Producers Association for a few years and was president of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. for two terms.

He was one of the founding directors of Texas Corn Growers Association and served as a director until resigning upon his appoint-

Garage sales draw crowds despite cool, damp weather

A drizzly and dreary day didn't dampen the spirits of bargain hunters Saturday as people from all over the area flocked to shop during Dimmitt's City-Wide Garage Sale Day.

"I feel like we had a lot more out of town people than we've ever had before," said Delores Heller, Chamber of Commerce executive director and organizer of the sixth annual event. "Last Thursday and Friday we received more than 30 calls (at Chamber of Commerce office) from out of town people who were checking to make sure the sales would be held Saturday. I know one person from Oklahoma City was in town for the sale.

"I think it's (garage sale day) growing and if people will continue to support it, it'll just keep getting better and better," Heller added.

Approximately \$46,231 was raised at the 83 sale locations in Dimmitt Saturday, according to Heller. The largest reported profit from an individual sale was \$2,100 and the lowest profit reported was \$45. She said the average profit from sales figured at \$557 each.

The sale not only benefitted individuals who had garage sales, but local businesses as well.

One business in town reportedly had to lock its doors during periods Saturday morning because salesmen couldn't keep up with large crowds in the store. That business

City progresses with annexations

Monday night, the Dimmitt City Council gave approval to move forward with two separate annexation proceedings.

All council members present voted approval on the first reading of the annexation ordinance for the land west of Plains Memorial Hospital, where the hospital is expanding its parking area. The ordinance must have another reading, and then 30 days must elapse before the annexation is final.

A first reading of the annexation proposal for property along the west side of Western Circle Drive also was approved by the council. The annexation depends upon provision of sewer service to homes in the area.

James Baker, a homeowner in the affected area, said the property owners are willing to pay half of the estimated cost of \$33,536 for installing a sewer line. It was proposed that the property owners could pay it out in the amount of \$20 per month added to their standard sewer charges.

City Manager Reeford Burrous told the council that the sewer connection could possibly be done for less if a line could be run to connect with the present sewer line on the west end of Western Circle near the apartment building. That line joins into a lift station near the First Baptist Church. Burrous said it has been difficult to survey that route due to trees getting in the

Burrous said that an alternate route also could be done within the \$33,536 cost estimate. He said he had an estimate of about \$59,000 for another route proposed by Mc-Morries & Associates, the city's engineering consultants.

Council member Larry Gonzales asked whether the city would be acquiring any "liabilities" by incorporating the property into the city.

City Attorney Jack Edwards said that the city already furnishes most

of the services the residents of the area are receiving, except for sewer service, which would be included in the installation of the sewer line.

Baker said that the properties are not included in the flood plain designation which lies just west of

"I don't see any extraordinary liability," Mayor Wayne Collins

In other business, Burrous told the council that the city is a little tight in the area of cash reserves due to the recent settlement of a lawsuit against the city. He recommended that the city consider a pay-out plan on the purchase of a new fire truck for the Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Dept., rather than making an out-right purchase as earlier planned.

The purchase price would be divided into five payments, with the First State Bank of Dimmitt carrying the note at 6% interest.

Council member Carole Dyer asked if the city could pay it off all at once without penalty if money became available later. Burrous said it could be paid off at any

The council voted to table the matter until a later meeting to give First Bank of Muleshoe time to set up business here and have a chance to make an offer. Burrous said the first payment on the fire truck is not due until August.

In another matter, the council authorized Burrous to look into the lease arrangements on the cityowned land south of town. It is currently leased by Eddie Waggoner, who requested that the lease be extended for a three-year period, rather than the yearly period now in effect. Gonzales suggested putting the lease up for bids. The council agreed to put the matter on the agenda for the next meeting of the

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





The Big Garage Sale

Dimmitt's annual City-Wide Garage Sale is getting to be quite a tradition—not just for local residents but for people all over the region.

It's estimated that almost \$50,000 changed hands in Dimmitt Saturday — despite the unfavorable weather conditions—as 142 families conducted garage sales at 83 locations.

You could say that Dimmitt has become the garage-sale capital of the Panhandle.

Our City-Wide Garage Sale got its start six years ago when Lawrence Green clipped an item from the Rosebud News. That city had held a similar event, and Green wondered if the idea might work in Dimmitt.

It has worked admirably here, because Dimmitt has the people to make it work.

Green delivered the item to the Chamber of Commerce office, and Executive Director Delores Heller turned it over to

the Retail Merchants Committee. The committee and the Chamber staff obviously did a great job of planning, because the City-Wide Garage Sale has been a huge success since its very first year.

The main two tricks to making this unique project work are to get everyone to cooperate, and to get the word out.

Getting the word out costs money. This year's expenses were approximately \$1,000 for printing, advertising and postage. To defray these expenses, those participating are asked to register their sales and pay a \$10 registration fee. In return, they receive yard signs denoting their sales, and their names, locations and general description of items for sale are listed on an 11x17 sale bill that also includes a city map.

This year's event was advertised in store windows and restaurants throughout the area (via posters and table-cards delivered by members of the Retail Merchants Committee), in 12 regional cities through the West Texas Country Trader, and through community and metropolitan newspapers, radio stations and TV cable channels.

"It seemed to me that we had more out-of-town people here than ever before," Heller said.

We hope this well-organized event will continue to grow and become even more successful, and we salute all those who participated and helped.

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





I must say the food was outstanding, and the people who took the time and care in preparing the meal did a tremendous job.



"Loss of Section 22 will destroy all of the price and supply management features of the dairy, peanut, sugar and cotton provisions of the present farm programs. This will open the door for imports to the US in ever increasing quantities and does not require adequate country of origin import standards, it is very likely that imported foods may have chemical identification by labeling or other means," Rankin continued.

When asked if NAFTA does, in fact, create free trade among the United States, Mexico and Canada, Rankin responded "No. While it reduces and/or eliminates tariffs and changes trade regulations on specified products, commodities and services, it does not provide for free or fair trade, nor does enable US firms to establish new agricultural enterprises and to acquire it necessarily provide for full market access among these countries.

"Another primary concern to our family farmers and ranchers is the fact treatment in most cases as domestic companies in either country. that producers in all three countries will not be required to meet the same health and safety standards. For example, there are a variety of pesticides and other chemicals which are banned in the United States, but are allowed food products which enter the US So, even with import standards, it is very likely that imported foods may have chemical residues which would otherwise be prohibited in the United States," Rankin said.

Texas Farmers Union has addressed the following points of NAFTA. What is NAFTA? NAFTA is a set of proposed trade agreements that have been negotiated by the executive branches of the governments of the

United States, Canada and Mexico.

In actuality, NAFTA is three separate agreements regulating trade between and among the United States, Canada and Mexico. One agreement Mexico would immediately end its import licensing requirement and is a joint agreement among all three countries. Another is a bilateral agreement between Mexico and the United States. The third is another bilateral agreement between Canada and Mexico. (A separate Free Trade

Does NAFTA create free trade among the three countries? No. While it reduces and/or eliminates tariffs and changes trade regulations on specified products, commodities and services, it does not provide for free trade, nor does it necessarily provide for full market access among the

How does NAFTA affect agricultural trade? In terms of agriculture, NAFTA is primarily a bilateral agreement between the United States and Mexico. There are also separate bilateral provisions between Mexico and Canada. There are also provisions affecting all three countries. (Canada would not negotiate on certain commodities for which they have domestic supply-management programs including dairy, poultry and eggs.)

When will NAFTA take effect? If NAFTA is approved by the legislative bodies of all three countries, it would become effective January

What is the procedure for Congress to consider NAFTA? The President must prepare and submit implementing legislation to Congress. Once the legislation is submitted, Congress will have 90 session days to vote on the agreement under the "fast-track" procedure authorized by previous trade legislation. Both the House of Representatives and the Senate must approve the legislation in order for the agreement to take

Can Congress Amend NAFTA? No. Under the "fast-track" procedures, Congress must either vote "yes" or "no" on the entire package without any

Can other countries join NAFTA? Yes. Under the agreement, any other country may become a participant in NAFTA if that country would agree to the terms of NAFTA and the current participants agree to allow that country to join.

Would it be limited to countries in North America? No. Any country may apply to join NAFTA without regard to its geographical location. Countries in Central and South America have been suggested as possible future participants, as well as Australia and New Zealand.

Other countries joining NAFTA, especially those with agricultural exports, could dramatically alter the economic projections and estimates made by USDA on the winners and losers within the US agricultural community. This would be especially true in supply management sensitive commodities such as sugar, dairy and beef.

What are NAFTA's basic provisions on agricultural commodities? In the agreement between the United States and Mexico, specified tariffs would be reduced and/or eliminated, while specified quotas would be increased and/or eliminated. Import licenses and other trade barriers would also be reduced and/or eliminated. About one-half of the specified tariffs included in the agreement on

agricultural products traded between the United States and Mexico would be eliminated immediately. The others would be reduced and/or phased out during a five to 15 year period, depending on the commodity. Similar arrangements would occur between Canada and Mexico, except

that they would cover fewer commodities. (Agricultrual trade between Canada and the United States was previously negotiated under a separate Free Trade Agreement which took effect January 1, 1989.)

While the United States has normally been the primary source of wheat imports to Mexico, this past marketing year Canada increased its market share to 76 percent, while US market share dropped to 23 percent.

Barley Mexico would establish an initial tariff-free quota for barley and malt of 120,000 metric tons. It would increase the quota five percent per year for ten years. The quota tariff would be set at 128 percent for barley (175% for malt) and then be phased out over ten years, being reduced by 24 percent

anually for the first six years and then reduced by five percent annually for barley (8% for malt) for the remaining four years. Livestock (Beef) The United States would exempt Mexico from the US Meat Import Law and grant immediate tariff free access to most livestock and livestock products, including the elimination of the one cent per pound tariff on

feeder cattle imports from Mexico. Mexico would grant immediate tariff free access for cattle and some products, including selected hides and skins. Mexico's 20 percent tariff on edible offal imports would be phased out over 10 years. Tariffs on imports of other beef products would also be phased out over a 10-year period.

During the first six years under NAFTA, the US import allocation for Mexican sugar, currently at 7,258 tons, would be increased to 25,000 tons, or an amount by which Mexico becomes a net sugar exporter, whichever is

Starting in the seventh year, Mexico's allocation of the US sugar quota would be increased to 150,000 tons, and then increased by 10 percent annually during the remaining eight years. The quota would be waived entirely if Mexico is a net sugar exporter for two consecutive years.

During the first six years, the above quota tariff for Mexican sugar imports would be reduced from 16 cents per pound to 13.6 cents per pound (15 percent) and then be reduced on a straight line to zero over the next

Mexico currently has a variable levy system on imports to provide a domestic price support at a target price of 18.7 cents a pound. Beginning in the seventh year of the agreement, Mexico would reduce its tariffs on a straight line to zero by the end of year 15.

Corn imports from the United States could be converted to corn sweeteners and displace sugar in the Mexican soft drink industry, freeing up its sugar for export.

NAFTA is written to ensure Mexico an increasing edge in the US sugar market, which would encourage significant investment in the Mexican sugar industry.

Oilseeds

Currently Mexico does not have a tariff on sunflower, rapeseed or canola seed. There is a 10 percent seasonal tariff (Oct. 1 - Dec. 31) on safflower seed and soybeans. This seasonal tariff would be phased out over 10 years.

Mexico also has a 10 percent tariff on most crude oilseed oil and a 20 Other sections of NAFTA dealing with agricultural issues relate to percent tariff on refined oilseed oil. These would also be phased out over

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

Cotton Talks

Announcement of the chairman and members of the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Committee on June 2 was welcome news for High Plains cotton producers.

Selection of Ray Joe Riley of Sunnyside as chairman of the State ASCS Committee bodes well for the future, according to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. of Lubbock.

In a previous announcement, Harold Bob Bennett of Hart was named state executive director of ASCS.

Riley, who grows cotton and a number of other crops on farms in Castro, Deaf Smith and Lamb Counties, has extensive experience in farming. He served for many years as a member of the PCG board of directors and as president of PCG. He also has been involved in a number of other agricultural and civic organizations.

"PCG believes Ray Joe Riley's selection as chairman of the State ASCS Committee will serve the High Plains cotton producers well in the years to come," said PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson. "His prior experience as a member of the State ASCS Committee combined with his knowledge of federal farm programs makes him an excellent choice for this position."

In addition to Riley, four other members of the State ASCS Committee are Ed Lehman of Vernon, Raul Tijerina of Brownsville, Vera Harrington of Sulphur Springs and Gerald Clark of Edna.

Looking for an adjective to describe the start of the 1993 crop isn't easy according to Lubbockbased Plains Cotton Growers.

"Spotted, spotted, spotted" was one description that came out of a bi-weekly meeting of High Plains crop watchers Friday.

The meeting was designed to help provide a comprehensive report on the status of the area's cotton crop and coordinate recommendations to producers.

The general feeling after the meeting was that the biggest need at the moment is a general rain across the area to offset the dry conditions which exist around the

This comes as no surprise to area producers who have planted as much as 85% of the 3.2 million acres expected to go into cotton in

PCG officials note that much of the non-irrigated acreage planted at this time has been put into dry seedbeds in hopes that rain will arrive to bring it up to a stand. Many producers seem to be remembering the 1992 crop when dry conditions which caused many to wait for moisture turned into a deluge which eventually prevented them from planting a cotton crop.

Producers with crop insurance also face reduced coverage levels if their acres are not planted by certain dates.

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TSgt. Sandoval honored for his livesaving efforts

TSgt. Emigdio Sandoval Jr., has vehicle cross our path. We noticed been awarded the Air Force Achievement Medal for heroism after he saved the life of a traffic accident victim on July 30, 1992.

Sandoval's actions at a tragic traffic accident scene near Bakersfield, Calif. were instrumental in saving the life of one of the accident victims, and he was recognized by the Air Force for his immediate response at the accident site, extraordinary care for the surviving passenger and his assistance to highway patrol and emergency medical personnel.

Sandoval, son of Emigdio and Maria Sandoval Sr. of Dimmitt, is assigned to the US Air Force's Thunderbirds. He is a 1979 graduate of Dimmitt High School and holds a degree in business administration from the University of Nevada-Las Vegas. He has been selected for master sergeant, according to a list published on May 21.

Here is Sandoval's account of the accident:

"On July 30, 1992, my friend and I were on our way back to Las Vegas from California at approximately 7 p.m.

"I was playing with my camcorder, taping the traffic because it was so heavy and the sun was starting to set. We were traveling east at about 65 miles per hour when we saw a Red Cross military

"My friend, Brian, suddenly braked to avoid crashing into the Red Cross truck. He was able to stop in time and vecred to the left. I immediately got out of the car and waved my arms to signal traffic behind us to stop.

"We started to render assistance, but noticed that there was fuel pouring from the engine (of the damaged vehicle). People were trying to run to the truck, but we told them to stop because it could blow up. When we made the determination that it was safe, I ran over to

"There were two bodies in the middle of the road on I-15. They were both wearing BDUs and it melted my heart to see two fellow military members lying on the hot asphalt.

"I immediately assisted in trying to identify the victims. One of the bodies was badly injured and didn't have a pulse nor any sign of life. The other person, a female, was moving around. No one knew what to do, so I started to look at her and by her body movements I knew she couldn't breathe or move her lower extremeties.

"I noticed her neck seemed like it was broken so I lifted her neck and pulled it back. Her windpipe

had been displaced during the accident. I placed my hand on her esophagus and wrested the wind pipe to the center so that she could breathe. She grabbed my hand as she inhaled a big gasp of air into her lungs. I felt her body getting cold and turning pale, which indicated to me she was going into shock.

"I asked for a blanket to keep her warm. She started to cry and told me she didn't want to die.... She told me her hip was hurting. I looked at her leg and noticed her right leg was broken. I assured her help was on the way.

"I counted her breathing rate and pulse. I asked her name and she said it was Sue Biggs and she was from Fort Carson, Colo.

"The vehicle she was in was part of a convoy exercise heading to Fort Irwin.


"... Twenty minutes after the accident occurred, a highway patrolman arrived. He asked what happened and I told him that the military ambulance vehicle had overcorrected and flipped over. It was later determined that the occupants of the vehicle had not been

wearing seat belts. "The patrolman pulled out a neck brace from his car and we proceeded to put it on Sue to mobilize her neck. I told him the other occupant needed attention because we could discover no pulse nor breathing-I had helped the victim that appeared to need the most immediate attention.

"I gave him Sue's name and age, where she was from and her vital signs. He passed on the information to the arriving medical crews. By the time they arrived, I had taken care of and calmed down Sue. The paramedics took over when they arrived. They tried to revive the other occupant, unfortunately, he did not make it....

"Throughout the whole ordeal there was a lot of confusion and people just standing around watching. I was amazed that people didn't bother to help and it made me think that if I hadn't responded as fast as I did, Sue's chances of survival would have been diminished.

"I gave my name to the leader of the convoy who thanked me and gave me a big hug. Brian and I then left the scene and continued home. On the way we couldn't help but sit and think about how important it is to be alive. Since the accident I have called Sue's home base and found out she was treated for a broken hip, leg and neck trauma she received during the accident."

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



long-term (worth a maximum 200 points), for its style (worth a maximum 50 points) and its "Spontaneous" problem solving (worth 100 points).

In the long-term portion, teams must solve a problem over a long period of time, usually three to five months. The problems give specific guidelines and requirements. The problem always comprises the following categories: balsawood structure, vehicle, technical, classics and humanities.

In the Style competition, teams are judged for creative elaborations such as costume, music, skits and lighting which are not needed to solve the long-term problem, but are related to the problem.

The Spontaneous Problem challenges the team's ability to "think on its feet." It requires the team to brainstorm ideas to a problem it has never

In the Long-Term competition the Dimmitt team's structure held 665 pounds while the winning team's (from Birmingham, Mich.) structure held 1,115 pounds. Dimmitt earned 119.29 points for its work in that category.

Dimmitt placed seventh overall in the Spontaneous portion of the competition and that "helped our score a bunch," said Keith. Out of a possible 100 points in Spontaneous, Dimmitt received 78.85.

For its "Style," Dimmitt received 42.75 out of a possible 50 points. An OM trophy with "Dimmitt Middle School" engraved on it has been permanently placed in the National Geographic Building in Washington, D.C., according to Vicki Richards, OM coordinator for Dimmitt schools.



fit community-based organizations, for rent to the homeless, or in some cases, FmHA will rent directly to the individuals, Crozier said. In addition, homes which were recently acquired by FmHA into inventory but have not yet been repaired will also be offered for lease to the homeless.

The families who obtain the housing from the public bodies or nonprofit organizations may apply to buy the house at any time during the lease. These who rent directly from the FmHA will pay rent based on their income and will be given the opportunity to buy the house they rent. Crozier said that many homeless people work and have incomes, and have the potential to become homeowners.

"By helping people find a decent place to live, we also help eliminate the cost to taxpayers of maintaining vacant houses," Crozier said. FmHA officials in Texas are seeking organizations which are interested in providing housing to the homeless and to inadequately housed families.
