Home Needs Employee Applications

(Editor's note: The following lem at Bronte Nursing Home since by L. O. Clark, administrator of Bronte Nursing Home, with the hope it will encourage local residents to submit applications for employment at the home.)

Bronte Nursing Home and health facilities in the immediate area are in constant need of dedicated employees who are willing to work. State regulatory agencies which license these facilities to operate as hospitals and nursing homes require a certain numiber of ficensed nurses, maintenance, dietary, housekeeping and laundry personnel to perform the work necessary to maintain the operation.

It must be understood that without the required staff they cannot be issued licenses to sustain operation. Administrators of these health care facilities plead for applications from dedicated people to administer to the sick.

When applications are not available the only recourse to be taken and deprive citizens of a small supper will be served.

Theme of the convention was "Living with Change." Clark stated his primary reasons for attendance was to be present for the work shops on inservice training and the address of Dr. James H. Cavanaugh, President Nixon's staff assistant for health affairs.

It also provided an opportunity to hear Dr. Marie Callender, special assistant for nursing home affairs to the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, who told of the President's plans to upgrade the quality of care in nursing

The exhibit show had the latest in supplies and equipment available to the health care field. Clark said he felt he received valuable training and information which will help him keep up with the continued requirement that will enable Bronte Nursing Home to achieve its ultimate objective of providing excellence in health care for its patients.

Clark also had the pleasure of ttending the opening session of the convention with his son, the Rev. Ron Clark, Chaplain of the Amarillo Hospital district. Rev. Clark was elected vice president of the Texas Association of Protestant Chaplains for Texas Hospitals at the meeting.

Quality grading is not mandatory, but meat inspection is. Both the inspection and grading services are provided by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

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
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



If hypoallergenic surgical adhesive is used to attach the lashes (they're glued directly to one's own eyelashes, eliminating the eyelid band), there shouldn't be any problem. Sometimes, however, epoxy glue is used because it holds better - and epoxy glue is too strong and dangerous for the eye area. The danger is that it can easily get onto the surrounding skin, and even into the eye.

Nor are the lashes as permanent as the manufacturers want you to believe. In fact, they shouldn't be expected to last more than two or three weeks. And each time they fall out, they have to be replaced, at additional cost. Also, they may be stiffer or longer than natural lashes and will cause even more irritation if they fall into the eye. If you wear contact lens, the new lashes are definitely not recommended.

Menstrual cramps . . . Aspirin, or other simple painkillers, and normal activity are the best treatments for teenagers suffering from menstrual cramps, says the American Academy of Pediatrics. Warning against excessive restriction of activity, the Academy says it's unhealthy and "can actually make the pain worse."

Menstrual pain occurs only after ovulation (if ovulation does not take place during a cycle, the next period will be painless). If the pain is incapacitating, hormone therapy can be used to suppress ovulaton. But this treatment is not recommended for every case and should only be used after consulting with a gynecologist experienced in caring for adolescents.

"Menstrual cramps are common in teenagers," says the Academy. They are not a sign of ill health or disease of the reproductive organs.



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
