Rosson cosponsored the bil which allows the Parks and Wild life Commission to license aerial hunters of predatory animals in the western part of the state. Thi was a bill considered vital to the sheep, goat and cattle raisers of the western half of Texas. 0 He cosponsored two bills to improve fiscal accounting and responsibility on the part of state agencies, one providing that each agency operate on a quarter to quarter budget to assure even spending of funds without a temptation to overspend in any one period, and the other directing the Legislative Budget Board to study and priority allocation of funds. He was cosponsor of the bill adopting Title $I I$ of the Family
Code. Rosson was joined by Rep. Joe Hanno of Breckenridge and Rep. recognition of the role of the Railroad Commission local energy needs, sponsoring
House Concurrent Resolution 103 Tirecting the Railroad Commi sion to hold hearings on the Big pring area probiem of LPG dr version to pipeline carmiers from
former dock customers. He was also sponsor of a sim le resolution to extend the life of an existing Legislative study ommittee investigating the wioe ariations in extended coverage insurance retes in certain zones of West Texas.
