Bank Announces Higher Interest Rate on Savings

First National Bank in Bronte announced this week that the firm will pay a higher interest rate to owners of savings accounts and certificates of deposit.

The higher interest rate was announced by the board of governors of the Federal Reserve System after they met July 5. The increase is retroactive to July 1, and E. F. Glenn, president of the local bank, said they would pay the higher rate beginning on July 1.

Glenn said, "We have always

Church of Christ Adding Annex

Beer Election Called at R-Lee

Coke County Commissioners Court called a beer election in Justice Precinct 1 of Coke County when they met Monday. The commissioners were presented a petition signed by 160 qualified voters of the precinct. Eight persons had signed the petition who were not eligible, but sufficient qualified signers had written their names to require the election, since only 148 signers were needed.

The election will be held Saturday, Aug. 4. Absentee voting will start Monday, July 16.

It was little more than a year ago, on June 6, 1972, when an election to legalize the sale of beer was defeated 334-251.

The first election, and the one to be held Aug. 4, are to legalize the sale of beer for off premises consumption.

The new rates as set forth in the bank's ad in this issue of The Enterprise are: 5% on passbook savings accounts and on certificates of deposit from 30 to 89 days; 5½% on CD's from 90 days to one year; 6% on CD's from one year to 2½ years; 6½% on CD's for 2½ years and over.

Glenn noted that the increase in interest makes savings accounts an even more attractive investment.

He also commented on the growth which the bank has enjoyed for several months, stating that on Tuesday, July 10, deposits were in excess of \$5,350,000.

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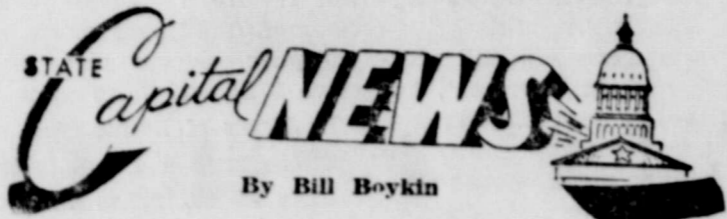

Austin — Annual public hearings to determine auto insurance rates were held here this week (July 10) amid predictions that premiums will drop again this year.

Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie expressed hope that evidence will bring a reduction for insurance buyers in most of Texas' 40 statistical rating territories.

This year's hearing was conducted against a backdrop of new legislation and a price freeze which applies to insurance as well as the usual review of accident frequency, claim cost and inflationary factors.

Laws which will be considered are comparative negligence, repeal of the guest statute, personal injury protection and the new deviation or competitive rating plan.

Texas Safety Association will also ask for additional credit for persons completing the defensive driving course. Board rules now allow a 10 per cent reduction in auto insurance rates for those certified as having taken the course.

Meanwhile, House Insurance Committee Chairman Rep. Ben Bynum of Amarillo predicted the average premium will drop 10 to 15 per cent when new rates are set this fall.

Competitive rates may mean drops of as much as 20 to 30 per cent for drivers with good safety records, Bynum said.

"Nobody can definitely state what the final rates will be until the statistics and the impact of new insurance laws are weighed in detail after the hearing," said Christie.

REVISION SCHEDULE SET — The Constitution Revision Commission will meet here July 27-29 to review policy presentations of its seven standing committees on specific areas.

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Commission members will hold briefings for the press during the three day meeting. Members of the Texas Press Association and Texas Association of Broadcasters will meet with commission members on Friday, July 27.

Commission action on the committee reports will be taken Sept. 6-8 and 13-15.

Consideration of the final document is slated for meetings Sept. 20-22 and 27-29, and the presentation, together with supporting reports, Nov. 1, followed by briefing of legislators in December.

Commission members bogged down at a recent meeting here on adoption of basic guidelines for their mission and postponed consideration of a statement of principles until their July 27-29 meeting.

Instead, they agreed tentatively to write a "revised" constitution — the minimum assignment of voters last Nov. 7 when they directed wheels be set in motion toward overhauling basic state laws. Two members thought even that non-specific commitment was premature.

House and Senate committees, meanwhile, have been named to make preliminary plans for the January-May constitutional convention, draft rules and agree on procedures.

14 MORE GAS SUITS FILED—

Atty. Gen. John Hill has filed 14 more suits to recover full market value of royalty gas produced from state lands. The first such suit was filed May 18 against Exxon Corporation.

The state contends it is not limited by long term contracts, nor to any regulated ceiling prices promulgated by the Federal Power Commission.

Defendants, according to state allegations, are selling gas at about 20 cents per 1,000 cubic feet, or less, while the market value is around 45 cents per 1000 cubic feet.

Suits now filed cover about 80 per cent of all lease contracts involving gas royalties, Hill said.

COURTS SPEAK — A four year prison term assessed Amarillo former State Rep. Walter Knapp for using \$1,200 worth of state issued postage stamps to buy a used pickup truck was affirmed by the Court of Criminal Appeals, on a three to two split vote.

The same court reversed and remanded conviction and 20 year sentence of a Mineral Wells man for alleged delivery of heroin because of testimony concerning beatings by police officers.

ROAD CONTRACT LETTING OFF—Monthly state highway contract lettings scheduled July 24-25 for 18 projects costing about \$22 million were cancelled due to failure of Congress to approve a federal aid bill.

Texas Highway Engineer B. L. DeBerry said the state had no alternative. Highway aid bills have been tied up in conference committee after the U. S. Senate and House passed different versions. Dispute is largely over diversion of highway trust fund revenues to urban mass transit.

The Highway Department in recent months has been financing all highway construction with state funds under an interim congressional action calling for reimbursement at a later date when the congressional bill is passed.

CITIES HONORED — San Antonio, San Marcos, Temple and Lubbock have been designated as national bicentennial communities.

The cities are to be recognized nationally during the Bicentennial observance of the American Revolution in 1976. Thirteen other communities in Texas will also have bicentennial programs submitted for consideration.

Bicyclers beware . . . There are an estimated 80 million bike riders — nearly four times the number of people who live in California. And this year, nearly 750 riders will be killed and another 150,000 seriously injured in bicycle accidents. Why is this? Well, many simply don't know how to ride a bike; others ride bikes that don't "fit."

"The biggest problem today is inappropriately-sized bikes," says Harris Faigel, M.D., an expert in pediatric emergency services. Too large a bike is difficult for a child to control, says the doctor, who pedals a three-speed English model to work everyday in Brookline, Massachusetts. One too small is harder than necessary to ride.

For a proper fit, the seat must be high enough so that when the pedal is at the bottom of its sweep, the rider's leg is fully extended. Otherwise, the expert says, the rider cannot deliver enough power to the pedals to safely maneuver.

Bicycles should have chain guards, and the shift levers on racing models should be mounted on the handlebars. Those located on the crossbar just ahead of the seat can cause groin injury. Dr.

Faigel explained that the Food and Drug Administration recently condemned this type as "unsafe."

Seats for infants and young children should provide chair, arm rests, and leg protector molded of a single piece of plastic, to prevent tiny feet, ankles, and shins from entangling in the spokes.

Statistics show that bicycling accidents most often result from errors in judgment. Among the major causes are:

1. Swooping into the street from driveway without looking.
2. Pushing off from a blind spot between two parked cars.
3. Coasting too fast downhill in traffic.

"Children who ride cycles do need to be cautious and they do need to be reminded of that, especially at the start of the season," says Dr. Faigel. "The lesson of bicycle safety may be best learned in the family, when the parents get out and ride, safely, with their children."

Miss Percifull is a 1973 graduate of Robert Lee High School and her fiance is a graduate of Bronte High School. He is attending Angelo State University.

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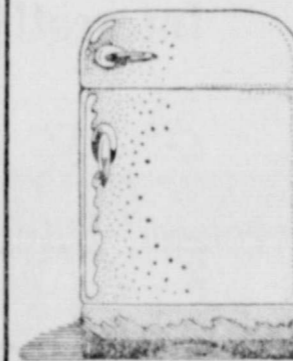

A Weekly Report Of Agri-Business News

Compiled From Sources

Texas Hog Producers Join in . . . Cattle and Calves Marketed Show Increase . . . Above Normal Grazing.

Texas, which is currently 14th in the nation in hog production, is showing a 19 per cent decline in numbers of hogs on farms as of June 1. Nationwide, the number is also down, but by only one per cent.

Hogs kept for breeding purposes on Texas farms totaled 150,000 head, down 18 per cent from a year ago. Market hogs and pigs totaled 810,000 head, down 19 per

cent from last year. Hog farmers in Texas intend to farrow 102,000 sows from now through November; this will be 11 per cent less than farrowings for this period last year. Reasons for the decline include the increased costs of feeds and the fact that retail prices are frozen.

The December-May pig crop totaled 729,000 in Texas. This is 18 per cent below the 1972 December-May pig crop. Pigs per litter averaged 7.29 compared to 7.50 last year.

Nationwide, hogs and pigs on farms as of June 1 is down one per cent from a year ago. The December-May 1973 pig crop is estimated at two per cent less than the same period in 1972. Pigs per litter averaged 7.16 compared with 7.32 last year.

Hog producers intend to farrow 6,000,000 sows now through November, which is virtually unchanged. If intentions are realized and projected pigs per litter are reached, the pig crop will be 43,600,000 head, up one per cent from 1972.

SALES of cattle and calves as well as sheep and goats at auction markets in Texas show an increase compared to a year ago. Hog sales are down from year ago levels, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes.

Cattle and calves marketed through auctions during May numbered 731,000 head, 26 per cent above a year ago, and 70 per cent above a month ago.

Sheep sales at livestock auctions during May at 230,000 head were 37 per cent above a year ago and 191 per cent above a month ago. Goats sold during May at 36,000 head were 24 per cent above last year and 20 per cent above last month.

Hogs sold during May at 41,000 head were 25 per cent below a year ago, but 21 per cent above a month ago.

EXCELLENT moisture conditions over most of Texas are maintaining ranges and pastures in above normal grazing conditions. Livestock condition is good to excellent. Horn flies and ticks have been bothering livestock but weight losses have not been severe. Rains have ruined some curing hay in East Texas but prospects for third and fourth cuttings are outstanding.

Screwworm outbreaks over the state are minimal compared to a year ago when the screwworm situation was completely out of control. Livestock producers are reminded to continue to submit suspected screwworm samples to the fly laboratory at Mission.

VEGETABLE crops are making good progress in the Hereford-High Plains-Panhandle area.

Moderate shipments of potatoes and onions are now underway, with heavier supplies expected during the latter half of July.

A market news office has been opened at Hereford.

MANUFACTURED dairy products utilized 23 per cent of the 1972 Texas milk production; nationwide, manufactured dairy products utilized 52 per cent of the 1972 milk production.

Frozen dessert production in Texas totaled 62,656,000 gallons in 1972. This is one per cent below the 1971 production. Ice cream production was three per cent above the 1971 production in Texas.

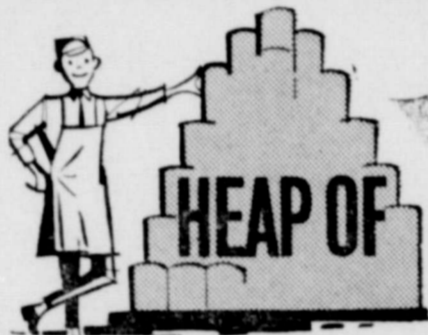
