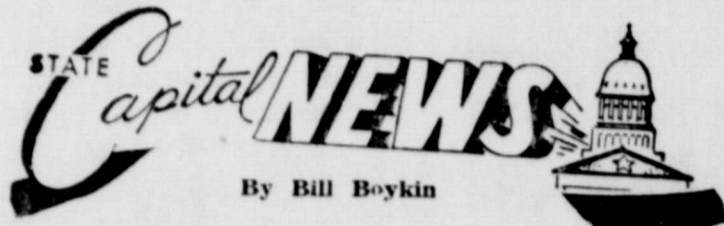

Austin — Dozens of logjammed major highway projects will move forward now that President Nixon has signed the three year \$20 billion federal highway act.

In addition to funds for mass transit, the act also provides \$2 billion for safety projects.

State Highway Engineer Luther DeBerry said replacement of narrow bridges is high on the priority list. Hazardous intersections and rail crossings will also be eliminated as facilities are designed with modern built in safety features.

"This act does not solve all our money problems, but even though it is not everything we need here in Texas, it is a good act," said DeBerry.

Highway trust revenues will remain as they have been in the past during fiscal 1974. Up to \$200 million in urban funds can be used for highway buses or used either for roads or purchase of buses in fiscal 1975. By 1976, all or part of the urban funds may

fixed rail transit with State Highway Department concurrences.

July highway bid lettings were cancelled due to shortage of federal funds. Although the federal act's passage will allow the state to proceed with vital projects

DeBerry warned a backlog will remain. Texas has been financing some work with leftover money from previous acts of Congress and with state funds. Texas is among states which sends the federal government more tax revenue from gasoline and vehicle accessory sales taxes than is returned.

Interstate highway construction is financed with 90 per cent highway trust fund money and other federal construction gets 70 per cent aid. The new act provides money for bicycle trails and metropolitan transportation studies. It also permits building the San Antonio North Expressway with state funds (if lawsuits don't stop it again).

AG RULES — Youthful of-

enders must be released from correctional institutions for delinquents when they reach 18, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other opinions concerning the new 18 year old majority rights law, Hill concluded:

* Persons 18 years of age can no longer collect survivor's benefits as a result of death of fathers who are law enforcement officers or firemen.

* Parents of retarded youths 18 and over are no longer obligated to pay cost of their care in state institutions.

* Eligibility to run for office is extended to 18 year olds, along with the obligation to serve on juries.

* Parental consent is no longer necessary for boys to obtain marriage licenses.

* Students whose parents live out of state can qualify for resident tuition rates at Texas colleges and universities at age 18 if they meet the year's residency and gainful employment requirement.

* Persons who are married, regardless of age, have the status of adults.

* The late President Lyndon Johnson's birthday, Aug. 27, definitely replaces Jefferson Davis' birthday, June 3, as an official state holiday.

* State contributions to employees' insurance coverage can not exceed \$12.50 per month.

* A new constitutional amendment providing tax exemptions for disabled veterans and their widows and surviving children is not effective without enabling legislation, and the legislation enacted in anticipation of the amendment's adoption is invalid.

OIL ALLOWABLE HELD AT 100 PER CENT — For the 18th straight month, the Railroad Commission set the oil production allowable for September at 100 per cent.

Meanwhile, Commission Chairman Jim Langdon warned the nation is facing a "very critical situation."

The Federal Power Commission, said Langdon, is predicting an 18 per cent reduction in energy fuels this winter as compared with 1972. FPC asked all states to survey winter requirements, supplies available and possible substitute fuels which will be needed to cope with shortages.

Texas' production rate has dropped 26,000 barrels a day, in spite of the 100 per cent production allowable, Langdon said.

CREDIT INSURANCE HEARING SET — The State Board of Insurance has scheduled a September 13 hearing on credit insurance rates.

A survey indicates the rates may be 20 per cent too high, according to Board Chairman Joe Christie.

Credit insurance is designed to insure payment of loans for installment plan purchases in event the borrower dies, becomes disabled or is otherwise unable to meet his payments.

It is not supposed to be a profit making proposition for the seller or creditor, said Christie, but to provide protection. Consumers in three-fifths of the other states pay lower premiums for the protection than Texans do, according to the regulatory agency head. Texans pay 75 cents per \$100 indebtedness per year for credit insurance.

Short Snorts

Texas business activity declined three per cent in June, partly in response to a sharp cut-back in plans for new construction.

A \$10 million clean water bond issue has been sold to a Texas syndicate.

Texas Folklore Festival's program is set for San Antonio Sept. 6-9.

A plan for waste water manage-

ment in the Colorado River Basin is slated for public hearing by Texas Water Quality Board Aug. 24.

State Insurance Board won a judgment for \$1 million in damages from First National Life Insurance Company under the conservatorship statute.

Republican Maurice Angly blamed Watergate and disinterested voters for his loss to Democrat Lloyd Doggett, 26, in the Travis, Blanco, Burnet, Caldwell and Hays county special senate election Aug. 14.

WEIGHT CONTROL FALLACIES

In the past year I have, for some reason, received several letters inquiring about the same thing—a column I wrote in 1971 in which I listed common fallacies concerning weight control. The American Dietetic Association had collected data on food misinformation that were in wide circulation in the United States. And I published some of the fallacies listed by the association. My correspondents this past year remembered the columns but wanted the list. This got me thinking that it might be a good idea to repeat the list this week.

People Go For Fads

It certainly is true that the subject of weight control is surrounded by fad diets. I would say there is generally better information published now than a few years ago. But still, people seem to go for exotic and "far-out" presentations on the subject.

The special foods that some diets require can be expensive. But the biggest objection to fad diets is not just that they are not sound, but that they confuse people and do not lead to the retraining of eating habits that usually is necessary if a person is to reduce and stay reduced.

So, to help clear the air, here is a list of statements that are commonly-held fallacies. All are false:

1. Obesity is due entirely to heredity.
 2. In the experience of some people, all foods turn to fat.
 3. Meal-skipping is a good way to lose weight.
 4. You can eat all you want and still lose weight if you take "reducing pills."
 5. Special low-calorie bread should be used in reducing diets.
 6. Toast has fewer calories than bread.
 7. One must not drink water when trying to lose weight.
 8. Candy enriched with vitamins may be eaten when a person is reducing.
 9. Washing rice after cooking reduces calories.
 10. Sugar is not as fattening as starch.
 11. High-protein foods and fruits have no calories.
 12. Gelatin dessert is non fattening.
 13. Milk should not be included in a weight reduction diet.
 14. "De-starched" potato chips do not have calories.
 15. Meat burns its own calories.
 16. Margarine contains fewer calories than butter.
 17. For reducing, eat high protein foods for a week; then eat anything you want for a week.
 18. Grapefruit will reduce a person.
- Remember the statements are all false, not true.

What Is Personal Injury Protection?

Briefly, this Family Automobile Policy coverage provides that if any of the following persons: you as the named insured, any member of your household, other persons occupying the insured auto, anyone using such auto with your permission... if any of these sustains an accidental bodily injury in a motor vehicle accident, then Personal Injury Protection will pay up to the limits of liability you have purchased, (1) all reasonable and necessary medical expenses, (2) loss of income (3) and the reasonable and necessary cost of essential services performed for the family by a person who is not a wage earner.

Is It a "No Fault" Policy?

No, it is not. However, it is a step in that direction and we heartily recommend it. The law was enacted by the 1973 Legislature and is mandatory on all Family Auto Policies unless rejected as pointed out in the last paragraph.

What Are the Costs?

More than likely, your present policy provides for medical payments in the event that medical treatment is required because of an automobile accident. If so, the new Personal Injury Policy costs very little more although it provides broader coverage.

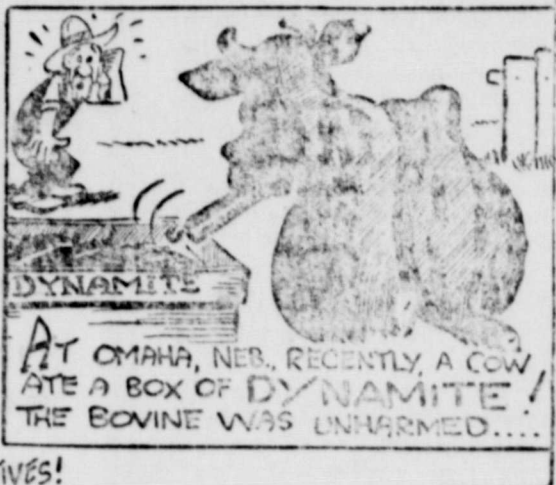

It's Almost Unbelievable... Stocker Cattle Numbers Also Show Increase... Screwworm Season Approaching.

Crop conditions throughout the state are described in almost unbelievable words: excellent, best ever, prospects couldn't be better.

Already, a wheat crop of more than twice the size of last year has been harvested in Texas, a total of 95,200,000 bushels plus a new record high per acre yield of 28 bushels. Texas is the fourth ranking state in the nation in winter wheat production.

Grain sorghum harvest is virtually complete in Central Texas with excellent yields reported. Several farmers have reported yields of 5,000 pounds and above on dryland. Prices, too, are the

best ever. Over the state, grain sorghum harvest is halfway finished. On the High and Low plains, good rains have increased dryland crop potentials.

Peanut harvest is active in the southern half of the state, but is still behind last year's schedule. A good dryland crop is now indicated.

Cotton harvest in the southern area is also lagging behind schedule. Cotton from the High Plains to the coastal bend is making good to excellent progress.

Insects, as usual, have been problems in many areas. Cotton root rot is also a problem in Central Texas due to rains in June and July.

Soybeans, a crop which is going to become more and more important in Texas in the years ahead, are making excellent progress throughout the state in areas where it is produced — the High Plains and the upper Gulf Coast.

Soybean acreage in Texas this year is twice that of last year. Total acres are now set at 450,000.

Good rains recently throughout parts of the state have revived short range conditions and replenished stock water. Range conditions are described as generally quite good.

One of the best hay crops in history has been made in Texas this year; the only problem is a shortage of baling wire in some localities.

Fall sheep and goat shearing is underway on the Edwards Plateau and the Trans-Pecos areas.

STOCKER cattle on Texas farms and ranches as of July 1 is estimated by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service at 5,495,000 head. This compared with 4,911,000 as of Jan. 1. Stocker cattle exclude cows, replacement heifers, 500 pounds and above, bulls, and cattle on feed.

Stocker cattle numbers as of July 1 were sharply above Jan. 1 where the cow-calf operations are dominant. Numbers as of July 1 are down from Jan. 1 levels on the northern High plains where Jan. 1 numbers were at a higher level because of stocker cattle shipped in for winter wheat pastures.

Stocker heifer, steer and bull calves under 500 pounds total 4,534,000 head, which represents 73 per cent of the 1973 estimated calf crop.

SCREWWORM build-ups are expected throughout the state as the fall season approaches. Generally, this has been one of the best screwworm-free years in Texas in a decade.

With the fall season's approach, producers are urged to check livestock regularly, treat wounds on livestock for screwworm control, and submit suspected screwworm samples to the fly laboratory at Mission for verification.

Cooperating with this plan can mean a continuance of the success of the screwworm eradication program the rest of the year, officials at the fly lab at Mission say.

Maverick Revival Concluded

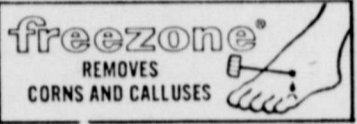

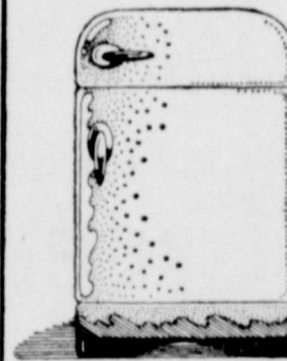
