

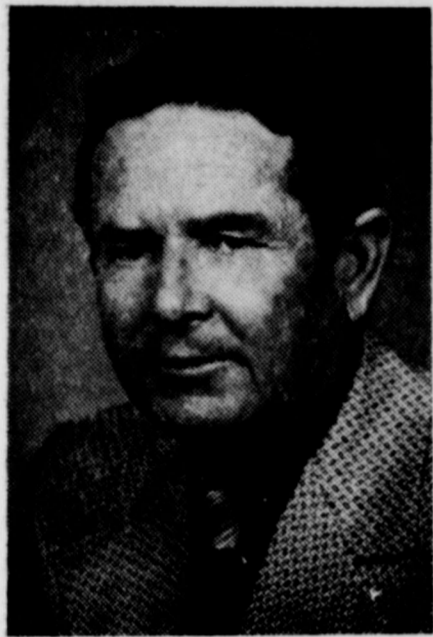

Sheriff Childress To Retire Oct. 1

Sheriff Melvin Childress has announced that he will retire, effective Oct. 1. The sheriff said he would have a statement to make before his retirement becomes effective.

Childress was first elected sheriff in 1960 and took office in January 1961. He succeeded Paul Good as Coke County's top law enforcement officer. He was re-elected in 1964, 1968 and 1972 and has served about 12½ years. His term does not expire until the end of 1976.

Sheriff Childress is a certified law enforcement officer having completed a 170 hour course of instruction at ASU.

The Sheriff's Department of Coke County lost its chief deputy last week when Don Thorpe who had served almost two years as deputy at Bronte, resigned to accept a ranch job in Menard County. Thorpe's reason for resigning was that he could not support his family on the salary the county pays.

He was born April 12, 1922. He was a veteran of World War II and a farmer.

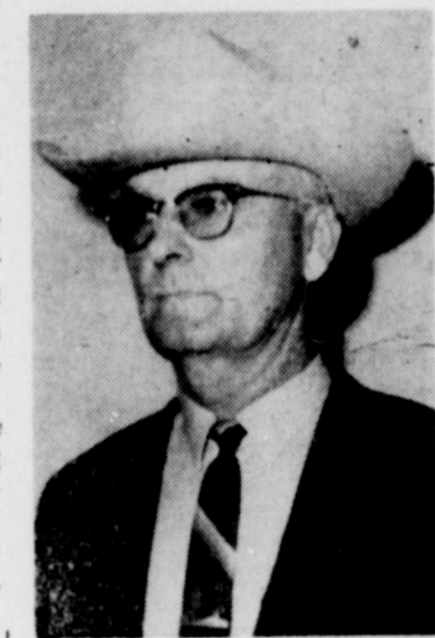

Hurricane Brings Rain to Bronte

Hurricane Delia apparently is having a tremendous effect on the weather of West Texas as it has moved inland and is expected to dissipate somewhere in the area of Brownwood.

Windy rainy weather has been the rule around here since late Tuesday when a front moved in and winds gusted to 40 and 50 miles an hour. Windblown rain amounting to .3 inch fell Tuesday night. Dave Seibold had .4 inch on Wednesday and up to press time Thursday had .8 inch. His total for the year stood at 15.3 inches through Wednesday.

Joe McCutchen reported .7 inch Wednesday and .4 Thursday morning at his place west of town. J. B. Mackey measured 2 inches at his place east of town.

The storm Tuesday night blew leaves off of trees, but no serious damage was reported in the Bronte area. Big Spring was heaviest hit by the storm. Winds up to 100 miles per hour overturned mobile homes and killed two persons. Planes at Webb Air Force Base were damaged and other property damage was heavy.

It was still raining at press time and the forecast indicated more moisture can be expected.

Gen Tel Making Improvements

General Telephone Company of the Southwest has begun an expansion project in Bronte which is scheduled for completion in March 1974. Included in the project is the expansion of the present central office building and the installation of additional switching equipment, according to Jack Goss, San Angelo division manager.

The present 380 square foot building is no longer adequate and will be enlarged to 578 square feet in order to meet immediate requirements and provide for future growth, Goss said. This portion of the two phase project is scheduled for completion in January 1974.

Phase 2 of the project calls for the installation of switching equipment to provide for 100 new telephone customers in the Bronte exchange. According to company surveys the equipment should adequately meet customer needs until 1978 when forecasts indicate additional equipment will be needed.

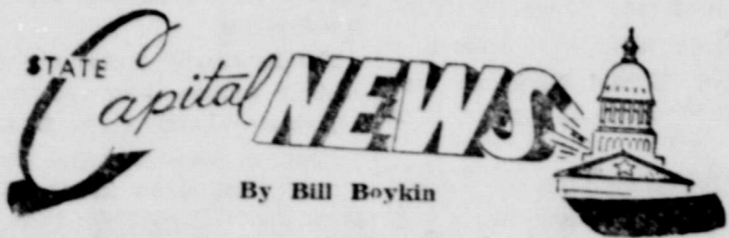

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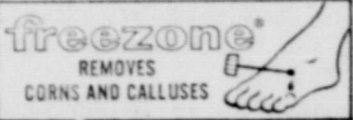
Austin — Next big political campaign shaping up is for legislative pay raises and annual legislative sessions on the Nov. 6 election ballot.

Top four elected Texas officials launched the campaign with the cooperation of 35 citizens' organizations.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe, Atty. Gen. John Hill, Lt. Gov. Bill

Briscoe's Criminal Justice Council and as legal advisor to the governor. Briscoe appointed him two days after Tunnell's resignation.

Tunnell was appointed to the powerful three member oil, gas and transportation regulatory agency by former Gov. John Connally in 1965, succeeding Ernest O. Thompson. He was reelected to a six year term in 1972.

TELEPHONE SAVINGS CLAIMED — Legislative Budget Board approved a new telephone system for state agencies which reportedly will save a million dollars a year.

The system, pushed by Governor Briscoe, would link all state agencies over Texas and provide toll free long distance service nationwide. An installation charge of \$170,000, plus \$350,000 a month is required for the TEX-AN communications network.

LBB advised Briscoe to be cautious he is not buying more out of state service than necessary. One member Rep. W. S. Heatly of Paducah, said the telephone company should be required to improve service to ordinary citizens before the state purchases TEX-AN. Present state telephone service now costs about \$431,201 a month for long distance and WATS lines.

800,000 NEW ADULTS — Texas picked up about 800,000 new adults overnight Aug. 27 when a law took effect granting majority rights to 18 to 20 year olds.

Under the new law, the young Texans can buy alcoholic beverages, enter contracts, get married without their parents' consent, and serve on juries among other things.

A total of 249 acts of the 63rd Legislature took effect last week. Among them was reduction of the penalty for first offense possession of marijuana (up to four ounces) to a misdemeanor.

Short Snorts

Dr. George Willeford of Austin is expected to step down as state Republican chairman in October.

American Petrofina Company of Texas announced price increases up to 15 cents a barrel for crude oil purchased from leases as did Cosden Oil and Chemical Company.

The House Administration Committee reaffirmed a decision to buy a new \$721,000 voting machine in spite of criticism from Lt. Gov. Hobby and others.

Among new laws which just went into effect is one prohibiting denial of credit and loans on the basis of sex.

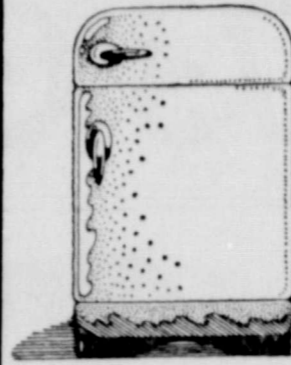

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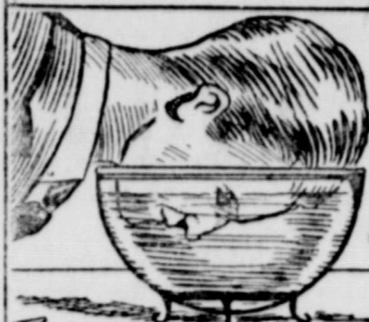
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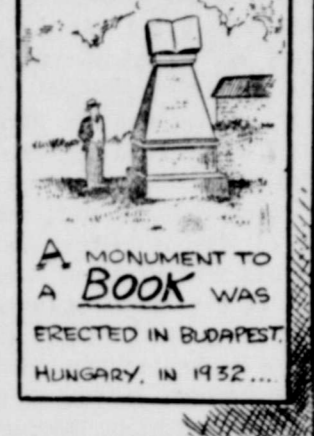

Hot weather has driven the fish deep at Lake Spence. Most of the successful fishermen are either trolling deep for striped bass or they are casting plastic worms in deep water sections of the lake for black bass.

Some small schools of stripers have been noted feeding on top during the early morning hours, but the majority of all stripers caught recently have been the results of deep diving baits.

Striper fishermen stick near the river channel and around 40 feet of water. Fishing near the dam has also produced some good hauls of the exotic imports.

Catfishing has been fair at Spence lately, but line users caution fishermen to run their lines on a regular basis, because catfish have been wilting quickly, due to warm water and less oxygen in the water.
