That was the Tuesday that was. Election Tuesday, that is, Reams of copy have been written during the past week analyzing the results of the election and how come. If there is one thing that the political analysts agree on it is that election campaigns are too long. Instead of eight to ten weeks of the ordeal a much shorter time, possibly four or five weeks, would be sufficient. After the charges and counter charges of the first two or three weeks very little, if anything new develops, and from there on in it is the same old mud and by election day it is very dry mud. If any credence can be placed in the various political polls the last several weeks of the campaign had very little effect on the outcome of the election, as the election returns were about the same as the results obtained by the pollsters in the early stages of the set-to.

At the present time a very serious situation exists in the United States politically. And I am not referring to that usual prediction by the ultra-conservative. The one about our having had our last election and that all freedoms will disappear because a democratic administration is upcoming. That one doesn't cause me any concern because I know it just isn't true. The serious problem facing our country today is the possibility of our much wanted, and flaunted, two party system coming to an untimely end. The success of our democratic government has been based on a two political party system. This we are told is essential to the survival of our nation. As of today, if we are to believe the analysts, the Republican party is in eminent danger of regrouping under the direction of two different leaders or groups of leaders, this would be disastrous to our political system.

Senator Goldwater has already said that he has no intention of relinquishing the leadership of his party, and according to reports the Republican National Committee is composed of a large majority of Goldwater supporters. In addition the Republican national chairman, George Burch of Arizona, has no intention of relinquishing his post before his four year term is up. He is a Goldwater appointee. As of now it looks pretty certain that the Goldwater forces can control the national republican machinery. The Goldwater effort in this past election can hardly merit a return engagement, but it is very doubtful if the ultra conservatives, under the Goldwater leadership will relinquish any authority to the rank and file republicans. Apparently a break in the Grand Old Party is inevitable. It is for politically sure that the mainstream Republican party, cynically referred to by Goldwaterites as the Eastern Establishment, are not going to sit idly by and see a candidate nominated again in 1968 that they cannot in good conscience vote for. If they cannot work through their fully constituted party, the one taken over by a well organized minority, then we can expect the emergence of another republican party, one offering a home for responsible conservatives, liberals and moderates.

I am a dyed-in-the-wool brass-collar, loyal democrat, but even as politically biased as I am I still want to see a strong responsible republican party. I think it is necessary for the best interests of our country, and after all that is what political parties are for, to serve the best interests of the nation. While I am feeling charitable I will go a little further and admit that I really want the republicans to win an election now and then on very rare occasions. I would probably never admit that the time was right for a republican victory, it would just have to come without my vote or consent.

During the past 30 years every important institution has used this method to teach reading. The literacy program is already established in Dimmitt and trained teachers are needed.

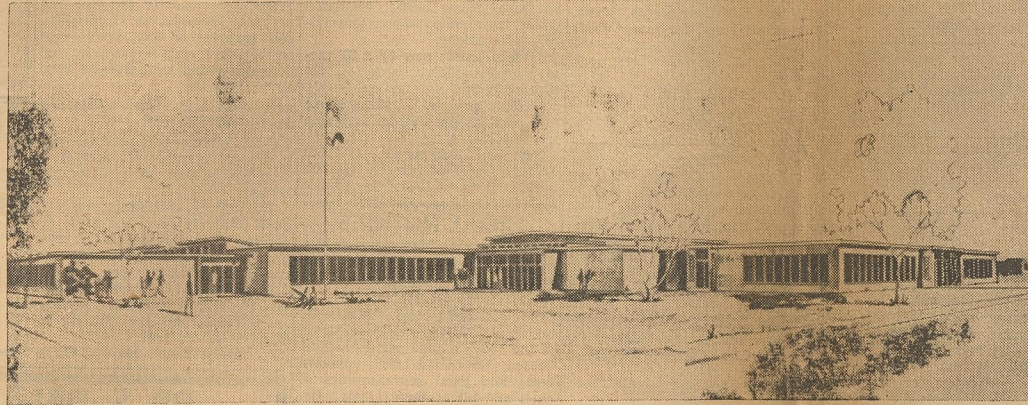

The present dining room will seat 315 comfortably.

## Clean City Aids In Keeping Fires At Low Minimum

Dimmitt is working on lower insurance rates than average city its size announced Guy Waldrop, fire marshal today. The low rates are due to less fire losses.

Dimmitt volunteer firemen urge citizens to keep the city clean, free of excessive trash and weeds in order to keep this record.

According to Waldrop, the less fire losses the city has, the lower the insurance rates. If Dimmitt continues to keep their fire losses to a minimum the next two years, the insurance rates could be lowered 10 per cent. Insurance rates are lowered 5 per cent per year if fire losses are kept at low minimum.

Dimmitt's net loss in fires for 1963 was \$4,819 according to Waldrop. If the fire losses are held down to a minimum, the home owners would save 5 per cent of the cost of their fire policies and that could be continued until they have a total credit of 25 per cent.

The insurance rates can go as high as 115 per cent if heavy fire losses are incurred during the year. Waldrop says, "The city will be glad to haul off all trash and debris if it is piled in alleys by trash barrels."

Business district and warehouses would be where the big fire losses would occur says Waldrop. Firemen say be careful of stored inflammable liquids, greasy rags, weeds and discarded boxes. These are easy starters for fires.

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# DIMMITT LASHES ANTELOPES IN 12-6 WIN, FRIDAY NIGHT

A stubborn defense that only allowed Abernathy seven first downs blocked two punts and partially blocked another and had one pass interception, set the stage for the Dimmitt Bobcat first clear out victory of the season, 12-6, over the Abernathy Antelopes, Friday night, there.

The Bobcats won the toss and elected to receive. The kickoff was returned to the midfield stripe by Steve Hutton on a reverse handoff. The yardage was erased by a clipping penalty. The Bobcats had the ball first and ten on their own 22 yard line. Three plays later they had to kick the ball out.

The Antelopes took the ball on their 30 and moved it down the field on two pass plays to the Bobcat 30. There Pat Hale, Abernathy's hard running fullback, took the ball on a trap play up the middle for a touchdown. The extra point kick

failed and Abernathy led midway in the first quarter 6-0.

The Bobcats took the kickoff back to the 38 yard line but were held and had to punt. Bobcats held and on a fourth down punt by Abernathy's Don Moore, the 'Cats broke through, partially blocked the punt and Tony Young caught it just across the line of scrimmage and returned it 47 yards for a touch-down. A key block on the run was thrown by Jack Flynt. The extra point kick was blocked and the Bobcats tied up the game 6-6 at the end of the first quarter.

The second quarter got off to a good start when Don Moore intercepted an Antelope pass and returned it seven yards to the Abernathy 33 yard line. The Bobcats drove the ball down to the six yard line where their drive was stopped by a 15 yard holding penalty. Abernathy took over but were

never able to get the ball out to midfield and the Bobcats couldn't put enough plays together to push across another score and the half ended in a deadlock 6-6.

The Bobcats kicked off to Abernathy to start the second half and held them on their 1st three plays and once again on fourth down and blocked a punt and Danny Land took the ball on Abernathy's 27 yard line.

The Bobcats drove the ball down to the one yard line on successive short yardage plays with Ray Bradley and Danny Land carrying the ball through holes opened up by the Bobcat line. On a third down and goal to go, Steve Hutton hit Tony Young on a quick flat pass in the end zone for the touch-down. The pass for extra point failed when Abernathy knocked the ball down.

The remainder of the third quarter and deep into the fourth period saw a defensive stand-off with neither team able to move the ball with any success. Ronnie Kenmore out distanced Abernathy's punter to keep Abernathy with their backs to the wall.

The last few minutes of the fourth quarter was filled with long passes as Abernathy vainly tried to get another score but Muriel Bussey, Jack Flynt, Gene Carson and Don Minchew kept putting a hard rush on the passer and they were never able to successfully complete an aerial. Dimmitt took the ball with 45 seconds left and ran the clock out to win 12-6.

This was the best defensive ball game this year. The 'Cats kept Abernathy from running wide and passing which they have been able to do against other teams. Don Moore did a good job rushing on the punts and this one factor was probably the big difference in the game. The Bobcats were able to get their punts off in good shape and blocked two of Abernathy's punts and partially blocked another one.

Coach Covington remarks, "I was really pleased with the way we kept carrying the fight to them in this game. It made the difference."

Covington made the following explanation concerning the data of blocking statistics. "On our statistics sheet for blocking we grade each player, as we study the film of the game over the weekend, as to whether he blocked his man or missed him. His grade is based on the number of successful attempts he makes out of the number of attempts he has."
