> Food Stamps will be issued at the U. S. Post Office in Bronte, according to Postmaster Noah L. Pruitt Jr. They will also be issued in Robert Lee as soon as some minor repair work is done on the post office building.

> Households are certified eligifor food stamps at the food stamp office at the City Hall conference room in Bronte. Certified households will then receive Authorization to Purchase (ATP) cards in the mail at the beginning of each month which will tell them how many stamps they are eligible for and how much money, if any, they must pay for them.

> Planticipating grocers will accept food stamps for the purchase of most foods and food products. Food stamps cannot be used to buy alcoholic beverages, tobacco, paper goods or non-edible items.

> Bronte stores participating in the program are Sims Fooid Store, Quicl:-Shop Food Store, Spencer's Grocery & Station and Minnick's Country Store.
