Ditmore Funeral Set for Saturday

Claude Ditmore, 79, long time Coke County commissioner and retired stock farmer, died Thursday at 7:10 a.m. in Bronte Hospital. He had been hospitalized for the past 11 days.

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 2 p.m. in First United Methodist Church where he was a member. The pastor, the Rev. Russell Heaner, will conduct the services, assisted by Kenneth Green, Church of Christ minister of Robert Lee. Burial will be in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Newby Funeral Home.

Mr. Ditmore was born April 13, 1894, in Tom Green County. He moved to Coke County in 1939 and was engaged in stock farming. He was elected commissioner from precinct four and served in that capacity 14 years. He was a member and past Worsnupful Master of Bronte Masonic Lodge and was past Worth Patron of Norton Eastern Star Chapter, but was a member of Bronte Chapter of the Eastern Star at the time of his death. He was a veteran of World War I.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Pearl Schooley Ditmore of Bronte; one daughter, Mrs. Elton McGinnis of Eldorado; two sons, Raymond Ditmore of Abilene and Douglas Ditmore of Robert Lee; three step-daughters, Mrs. D. W. Sheffy of San Angelo, Mrs. Turney Casey of Robert Lee and Mrs. Dean Taylor of Springtown; one step-son, Cecil Schooley of Brownwood; 20 grandchildren and 23 great-grandchildren.

Grandsons will be pallbearers.

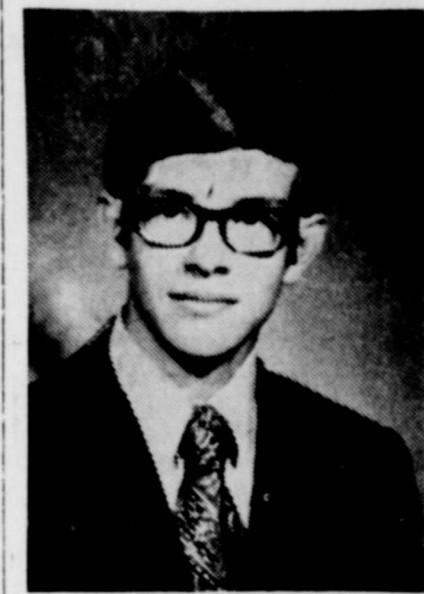

Larry Hooper, 1973 graduate of Bronte High School, has been selected to receive a \$600 Carl B. and Florence E. King Foundation Scholarship by the Texas Interscholastic League Foundation.

The King Foundation provided funds for ten \$600 grants to be given to outstanding 1973 Texas high school graduates. TILF administers the scholarship program.

Hooper earned eligibility for the scholarship by participating in the University Interscholastic League contests in Spelling, Ready Writing, Persuasive Speaking and Typewriting.

In 1971 he won first in district and regional and third in state in Spelling. In 1972 and 1973 he swept through to win all top honors at district, regional and state in Spelling.

In 1973 he won first in district in Ready Writing, and took first in district and fourth in regional in Persuasive Speaking. In the same year he won third in district in typing. He also won a division I rating in the piano solo contest.

Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough, chairman of the Coke County Historical Survey Committee attended the annual meeting of the Texas Historical Commission held Oct. 26 and 27 in Fort Worth.

Approximately 400 history buffs from over the state were present at the meeting, which opened with a festival of films on preservation topics.

Featured speaker of the convention was the well known Texas historian, Dr. Joe B. Frantz, author of 6,000 Miles of Fence: The XIT Ranch of Texas.

In addition to various sessions for discussions, delegates were treated to a barbecue at the Pate Museum of Transportation, courtesy of Dr. and Mrs. A. M. Pate Jr. of Fort Worth. A "Sampler" of the Fort Griffin Fandangle was presented by the people of Albany who produce and direct the historical musical drama which has become so well known.

Mrs. Yarbrough drove to Balinger and went from there to Fort Worth with Mrs. J. Dexter Eoff, a member of the Runnels County Historical Survey Committee.

Longhorns Eliminated From 3-B Race, 28-13

It was a beautiful night in Jayton last Friday when the Bronte Longhorns were eliminated from the District 3-B race, 28-13, by a surprisingly strong Jayton Jaybird team.

First Quarter

After Jayton returned Alan Barbee's kickoff to the 43, it took the Jaybirds just eight plays and 2 minutes and 35 seconds to score with Bobby Kelly carrying it in from the 1. Mark Fincher's conversion run failed and the score was Jayton 6, Bronte 0.

Jim Dan Raughton returned the kickoff to the Bronte 28. Barbee got 5, 3 and 4 for a 1st down. Three plays failed to net another 1st and the Longhorns chose to run rather than kick and lost the ball on the 50. Jayton couldn't move the ball either and punted to the Bronte 11.

Barbee got 5, a Nelson Coulter to Kim Barrett pass fell incomplete, and Barbee got 3 plus 15 yards when Jayton was charged with a face mask violation. Bronte picked up five more 1st downs mostly on short runs by Barbee and Barrett, with a 13 yard completion to Bailey.

Second Quarter

On the second play of the second quarter Barrett carried it in from the 2. Barbee converted and Bronte led 7-6.

Barbee's kickoff went into the end zone and Jayton ran three plays before Louis Martinez recovered a Jaybird fumble at the 27.

Bronte ran four plays, lost 8 yards and gave the ball to Jayton. Jayton picked up one 1st down and punted to the Bronte 20. Two running plays and an incomplete pass resulted in a Barbee punt that he boomed to the Jayton 20.

Jayton, behind the strong running of Mark Fincher, moved the ball to the Bronte 24 before giving it up on downs. There was only 0:32 showing on the clock when Bronte took over and had a 1st down aerial intercepted on the 20.

There was still 0:10 showing when Bobby Kelly hit brother Allen with a scoring strike. The same combo worked for the extra points and the Longhorns went to the dressing room trailing 14-7.

Third Quarter

Barbee took the kickoff at the 10 and returned to the 38. Barbee made 9 and Barrett 4 to give Bronte its eighth 1st down. Another pass incompletion proved their undoing and Barbee punted to the Jayton 28.

The Jaybirds got four 1st downs before Fincher carried it in from the 15. The pass conversion fell incomplete. Jayton 20, Bronte 7.

Following the kickoff, Barbee picked up 3 and 4 yards and a pass incompletion brought on a Barbee punt, this time a 60 yarder that died on the Jayton 15.

Fourth Quarter

A Coulter to Barbee to Raughton, pass got 20 and despite two pass incomplections a Coulter to Barbee pass got 22, but four more incomplections caused the Longhorns to cough up the ball on the 15.

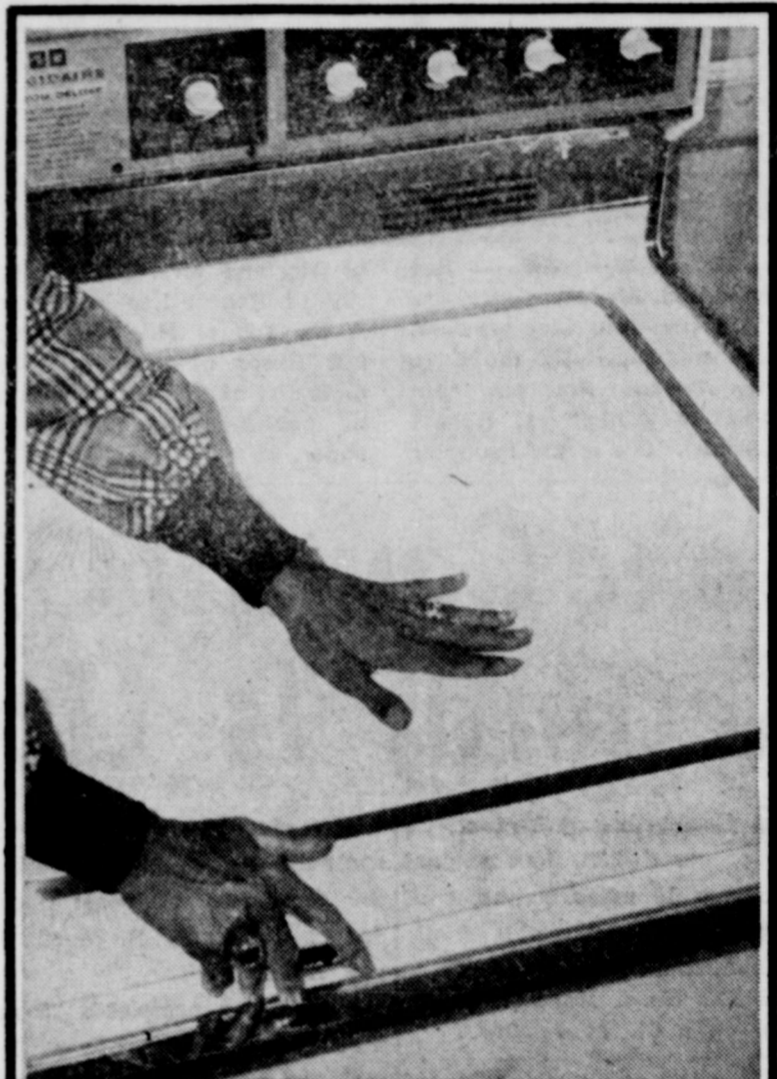
Jayton ran three and punted to Raughton on the 50 and he returned to the 40. Bobby Bailey caught a 32 yard pass and a piling on penalty placed the ball on

the 4. Barbee carried it in from there, but a mix up on the conversion snap left the score: Jayton 20, Bronte 13.

Barbee kicked off to David Fincher at the 10. He proceeded up the middle for 90 yards and 6 points. Steve Kidd ran the conversion. Jayton 28, Bronte 13.

Bronte still had seven minutes to win the ball game but pass incomplections were the nemesis, and Jayton ball possession kept the ball from the Longhorns.

FISHING REPORT from Lake Spence



Black bass fishing has been the center of attention at Lake Spence during the past week and some good strings of striped bass have also been noted at the Coke County lake.

Spinner baits have accounted for most of the good hauls of blacks and the fish seem to be hanging out in about five feet of water. Some large stripers have also been caught lately by bait casters chunking spinner type

lures. A few nice bass have also been picked up with top water lures.

Trotliners continue to take the large stripers on perch baited lines.

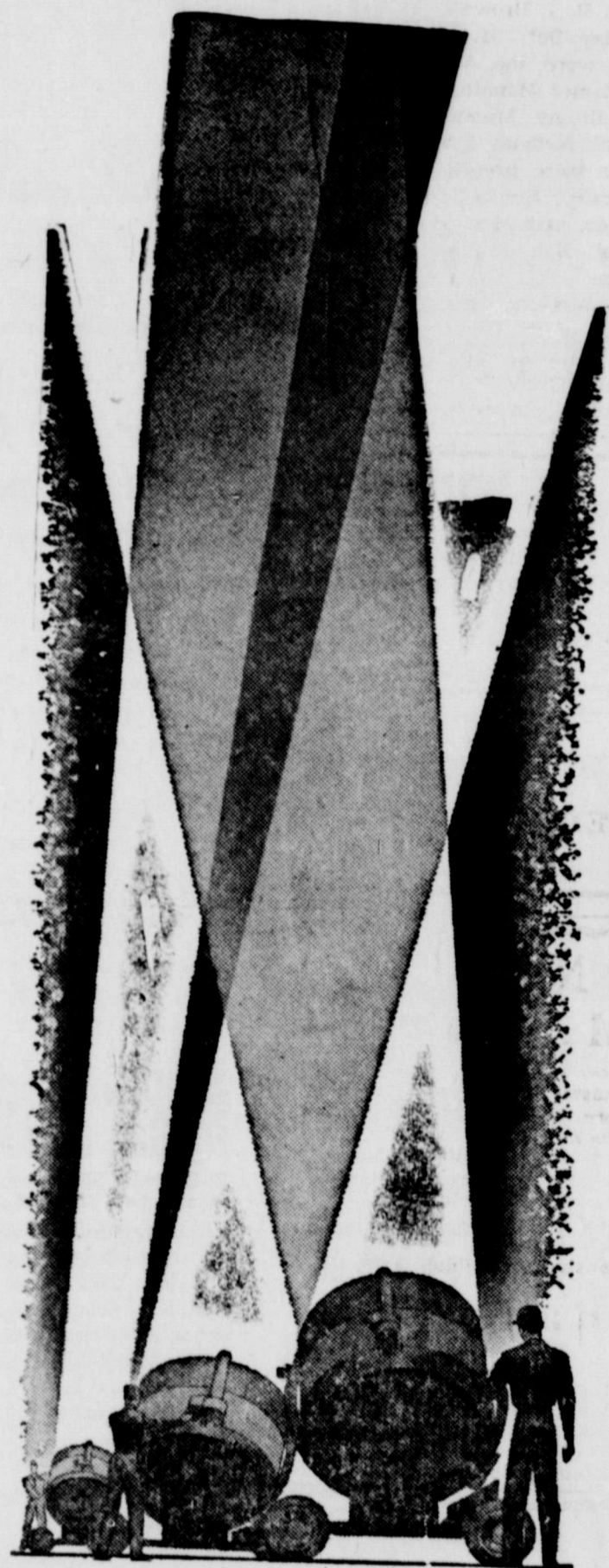

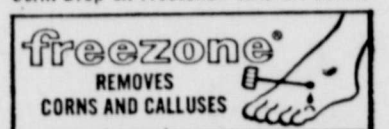
