

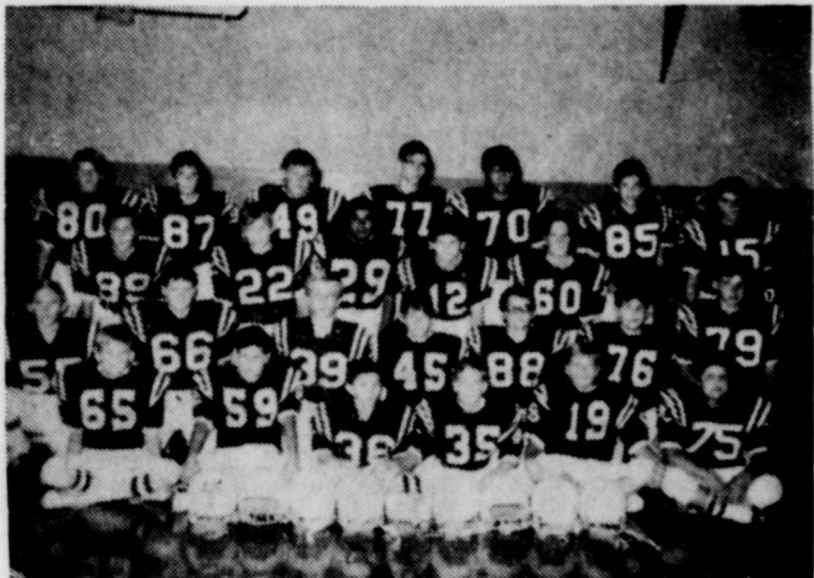

Bronte Shorthorns are the winningest football team Bronte has to boast of this year. The junior high bunch has just completed a season without a loss, but did battle to a scoreless tie in the first game of the season with Roby.

The Shorthorns completed their schedule last Thursday night when they battled Roby to a 28-12 win. The lads have been

scored on in only three games during the season.

In a business meeting the club voted to present a \$10 Christmas donation to the San Angelo Center at Carlsbad.

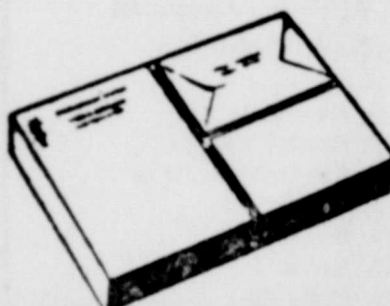
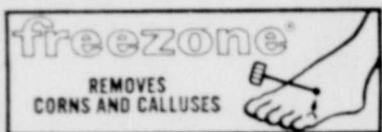

Bus and Tractor**

Bronte School's board of trustees decided to buy some new equipment at their meeting last Thursday. The members agreed to requisition a new 48 passenger school bus and purchased a new Ford tractor. They agreed to make a \$2,000 note at First National Bank to purchase the tractor and amended the 1973-74 budget accordingly.

In other business the board:

- * Approved a loan of \$1,500 to the Region 15 Special Education Small Schools Coop. Bronte School is a member of the co-op and through it is participating with one full time teacher and one full time aide.

- * Tabled action on a campus maintenance agreement.

- * Discussed at length the programming and scheduling of sports, primarily on the secondary level.

- * Reviewed the school depository bond pledge which has been raised \$100,000 and is now sufficient to cover all deposits made by the school.

- * Reviewed bus drivers' records as processed by the Texas Education Agency and Department of Public Safety in Austin. This program is a new requirement which became effective this year. All Bronte drivers' records were satisfactory.

- * Certified Supt. C. B. Barbee as a member of the Education Service Center joint committee.

- * Review sketches of fencing and lighting of tennis courts.

- * Approved October bills.
