

**\$2.3 million city budget is approved**

The 1978-79 proposed budget was approved and adopted effective May 1, 1978 through April 30, 1979 by the Dimmitt City Commission at its Monday meeting.

The \$2,335,509 budget includes substantial increases for several departments, including nearly 300% increases over last year for the water department and the parks department.

A total of \$141,018 is budgeted for payment on the principal, interest and handling charges on the 1977 Water Works and Sewer System Revenue Bond, and an \$844,000 payment is set for the Water Field South.

In the parks department, the largest part of the increase is a \$22,500 capital outlay from Revenue Sharing Funds for four new tennis courts.

Both the Police and Fire Departments were budgeted \$20,000 increases. Most of the increase for the Police Department was in salaries. The Fire Department increase included \$4,439 for the Firemen's Retirement Plan, and considerable increases in supplies and materials, station expense and capital outlay.

The Administrative Department had a \$45,773 increase, \$29,000 of which includes capital outlay. Other increases were in group insurance and retirement plan costs and in legal fees.

Other departments' budgets include \$99,833 for the Street and Alley Dept., \$1,660 for the airport, \$12,400 for the Shop Dept., \$35,965 for the Public Health Dept., and \$128,295 for the Garbage Dept.

Total budget expenses are estimated at \$1,981,481, with a planned operating reserve of \$351,028. Estimated revenue is \$944,429 plus a \$1. [See BUDGET, Page 14]

**Street rebuilding plans aired**

"We're not going to cut off your driveway—we'll find a way to keep you in access," a highway official assured business owners Tuesday night in a public meeting on the reconstruction plans for US 385 and State 86 in downtown Dimmitt.

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The rebuilding project is scheduled to start May 30, and highway planners said they hoped it would be completed by Nov. 1.

During that period, Jake Diel Construction Co. will tear out and rebuild US 385 (Broadway) from the railroad crossing north of town to Belcher Street, and State 86 (Bedford) from West Tenth Street to beyond the east city limits.

However, at least half of each street will be open to traffic at all times during the construction period, officials said.

More than 50 persons—many of them worried about the effect the construction will have on their businesses—attended Tuesday night's meeting, which was sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce.

Most local business owners seemed relieved after hearing assurances from both Diel and state officials that "we will cooperate with you in any way

that we can" to keep access open to stores during the project.

However, a major problem cropped up for the grain elevators along East Bedford.

The state plans to design a continuous left-turn lane in the center of the street, and the five-lane design will require that curbside parking be prohibited. Elevator men argued that the parking restriction will make it impossible for grain trucks to line up for unloading, and said the street design "is going to eliminate our business."

The elevators' problem remained unresolved during the meeting, but Mayor Elmer Youts said afterward that the city and state will call in a traffic engineer to study the problem, and that "maybe he will see a solution."

Meeting with the crowd of Dimmitt business people were District Highway Engineer

George C. Wall Jr. of Lubbock; Rhea Bradley of Littlefield, project engineer in charge; Jake Diel of Hereford, prime contractor; Warner Lawson of Hereford, construction superintendent; and five other local and area officials of the Texas Dept. of Highways and Public Transportation.

Chamber of Commerce President Jerry Marvin explained that Tuesday night's meeting was "simply to give us an opportunity as business people to be prepared for this construction work when it gets underway."

"We know there are going to be some inconveniences and some interruptions," Marvin said, "and we are concerned about those problems. But we know, too, that these streets will have to be rebuilt either now or later."

Wall explained that sections of the highways to be rebuilt are from 19 to 40 years old, and that "due to a lack of funds, we've had to patch the streets" for the past several years until money came available this year to rebuild them.

Lawson explained that the project will start on State 86 east of the city, and that US 385 will then be rebuilt before West Bedford.

"We'll find a way to keep you in access to your business," Lawson added. "Just tell us what you want, and we'll do our best to see that it's done your way. Our project inspector will be all up and down the street in a yellow pickup that you can see a mile away. Just tell him what you need, and we'll work it out."

"As far as I know, we're not going to change any parking along the streets until the project is finished," Bradley said. "Anytime you can find a place to park, go ahead. We'll put in access ramps across the construction area anytime we can, to make it easier to get into your store."

**Baccalaureate to open final week of school**

Baccalaureate services for the Dimmitt High School graduates will be held at 8 p.m. Sunday in the school auditorium, with the sermon by Rev. Marvin Roark, pastor of the First United Methodist Church.

Commencement exercises May 26, also in the DHS auditorium, will close the high school careers of the 70-plus members of the Class of 1978. The final day of school, completing examinations for underclassmen, will be May 25, when pupils in all buildings will be dismissed early.

The last week of school activities begin today (Thursday) with the Key Club banquet, after the annual Fine Arts Show Wednesday evening with concerts by choirs and bands, and displays in the art and industrial arts departments.

Seniors will take their final exams Monday and Tuesday and hold their final assembly Tuesday afternoon.

**Injury dashes Dimmitt hopes at state meet**

A pulled muscle in Dennis Veals' leg after he took the baton on the last lap of the sprint relay in the state UIL track meet Friday cost Dimmitt High School a place in the event.

DHS runners in the meet at Austin were in third place when the speedy anchorman was stricken.

Columbus High School finished first in the Class AA division. The Slaton team which placed second to Dimmitt in the regional contest was fifth at Austin.

Larry Bossett, Jimmy Stewart and Thompson Mayberry are other members of the DHS team, which ran the 440 relay in 43.1 seconds to qualify for state competition.

Through resolutions adopted at their county conventions Saturday, local Democrats and Republicans showed they were in agreement on nine key national issues.

Both voted support of a national farm program which would assure crop producers 100 percent of parity in the sale of their crops, would control importation of farm products and would secure prompt use of their present powers by the President and the Secretary of Agriculture to relieve the current price crises in American agriculture—all objectives of the American Agriculture Movement.

Stands were taken by both groups to oppose the ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment, also federal support to the International Woman's Year and the International Year of the Child programs.

The Gun Control Act of 1977 also drew opposition of both parties, as did moves to legalize abortion.

Similar views were expressed in resolutions concerning national defense, as the Demos voted for strengthening of the US defense posture and a GOP resolution called for reinstatement of the draft.

On energy, the county Republicans favored deregulation of energy sources while Democrats asked fairness in pricing of natural gas and protection in the priority of its use.

Purchase of land by aliens should be declared illegal, the Democrats said, while a GOP resolution opposes a proposal to grant amnesty to illegal aliens in the US.

**Democrats' session lively, harmonious**

In a "lively but harmonious" convention Saturday afternoon, Castro County Democrats adopted 24 resolutions ranging from womens rights to agricultural concerns.

Forty-five Democrats attended the 2½ hour meeting, including 37 voting delegates representing all 16 of the county voting precincts.

Elected to represent the county at the state Democratic convention were Carl King, Oscar Wylie, Reta Welch and Jo Beth Shackleford as voting delegates and Ben Scott, Richard Connell, Edgar Dennis and Cindy Sides as alternate delegates.

County Democratic Chairman Oscar Wylie was commended by the convention "for his untiring work for the party" this year. Wylie was recognized for his "representation of the party in court and in public meetings under very difficult circumstances."

Carl King, chairman of District 31, was also commended for his work in the party.

During the convention, in

which "everybody cooperated and did a very good job," these key resolutions were adopted:

—Promoting the private sector of society control for the child development program.

—Supporting an amendment to the US constitution to allow each state to pass its own individual laws on abortion as well as an amendment to make abortion illegal, and that requires babies aborted alive be given all medical attention available.

—Proposing the rescinding of the ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment in Texas, and in other states, and rejecting any attempt to extend the deadline for the amendment's ratification.

—Rejecting federal funding for the International Women's Year plan of action or continuation of the national IWY committee.

—Proposing that the Texas legislature oversee and direct the activities of the Texas [See DEMOCRATS, Page 14]

**County GOP adopts stand on 17 issues**

Delegates to the Republican State Convention next September were elected and 17 resolutions were approved by party members of Castro County at their county convention Saturday evening in the Dimmitt City Hall.

Jim Killingsworth was named delegate to the convention and Deanne Clark, county GOP chairman, was elected as first alternate.

Mrs. James Baker announced that a county Republican headquarters will be opened in the former location of A&H Supply, and Mrs. L. C. McLain urged a "get out the vote" campaign for the June 3 runoff election between Jim Reese and George Bush Jr., who led the three-man field of Republican candidates for the party nomination seeking the 19th Congressional District seat.

The approximately 20 persons present for a pot-luck supper and convention business were reminded that a person who did not vote in either the Democratic or Republican primary May 6 is eligible to vote in the runoff primary. Absentee voting will begin May 25, at the county courthouse.

Resolutions approved at the conventions spoke out against legislation favoring the equal rights amendment, IWY, IYC, abortion, marijuana decriminalization, gun control, national health plan and amnesty to illegal aliens.

Resolutions favored deregulation of energy sources, reinstatement of the draft, action to curb inflation by balancing the federal budget, and objectives of American Agriculture.

Texas' Republican Senator John Tower and other legislators opposing bills which promote compulsory unionism were congratulated in another resolution, and advised of the county GOP support.


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**On Wall Street**

Last year General Motors began mass-producing the diesel-powered automobile. At the time GM predicted that 25% of automobile sales would be diesels by 1985. But, though the diesel is selling well, scientists believe that diesel emissions can cause cancer. Other car makers are holding off entering the diesel market because federal regulations may eliminate the diesel. A lot of money would be spent in development and retooling to produce a car that might not be acceptable.

The federal government encouraged production of the diesel in the first place due to much improved gas mileage. An Oldsmobile gets 30% better fuel economy results vs a gasoline powered model of comparable size. But the diesel is noisier, smokier, smellier, and harder to start in cold weather. They are also more expensive.

The government has also spent money to encourage use of diesels. New York City received funds from the Transportation Dept. to experiment with diesel taxicabs. The diesel taxis got 50% better mileage.

Diesel exhaust contains many more carbon particles than gasoline exhaust. These carbon particles can attach to a person's lungs and may cause cancer. There is no EPA standard but because a diesel produces 30 to 90 times the carbon particles produced by a regular car using unleaded gas, new standards will be in effect by the end of this year.

The big obstacle is the lack of data on what the maximum emission level should be since it's a brand new area for pollution control regulations. Animal tests are being conducted now by the EPA with results to be announced in July. All parties want a speedy decision but it is a complicated question.

**McMurry grad from Dimmitt earns honors**


Leigh Ann Roark Jones of Dimmitt graduated cum laude from McMurry College in spring commencement ceremonies May 7.

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

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
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

3) Fixed incomes — retirement incomes usually are small and fixed.

4) Living alone and cooking for one often makes one not "bother" and most of us don't like to eat alone.

5) Some people live with adult children.

6) As we get older we have less energy.

7) Poor eyesight makes it hard to read recipes.

8) Special diets are often the rule and sometimes require special foods.

9) Weight control is necessary, and as we get older our body is less able to handle excess food and weight gain occurs.

If you'd like more information about food needs and meal planning, feel free to call the Extension office. All of us should eat by the basic four and have daily: 4 servings of vegetables and fruits, 4 servings of bread and cereal, 2 servings of meat and 2 servings of milk.

In the last several years government funding agencies have pressed libraries to measure their effectiveness. That's a worthy task, true, but it is easier said than done.

My first encounter with the task of measuring program effectiveness was at the University of Arizona when our sadistic professor assigned a 30 page article called "Performance Measures in Public Libraries." As you would know, the original was already out of the library and the only copy remaining was the Xerox copy. If you've ever tried to read 30 pages of poorly Xeroxed material, you know that your eyes drop out of the sockets about page number 12. Plus this fact, my professor said he was sorry that the reading could not be more interesting. That was an understatement. So after a hot afternoon of hard work, I finally finished the confounded manuscript, hoping never to read another thing about library performance measures.

Yet, since its publication, dear old "Performance Measures" has been the mainstay of library administrators trying to peg their library's effectiveness. It has also been used by city administrators to judge how well the library is doing and if it deserves more funding. There's only one problem. We who have used this measurement method

find that it is unworkable. Every library comes up with an artificially low effectiveness quotient. Only one library scored fair, and that was, mirabile dictu, the Library of Congress!

In opposition to these states of affairs, Daniel Gore, well known librarian and writer,

### City sales tax rebate \$3,333 for Dimmitt

The City of Dimmitt has received a check of \$3,333.48 from the state comptroller's office as its rebate on the one percent city sales tax collected on retail sales of the past month.

The amount compares with \$6,604 rebated for the same period last year. It brings the total of 1978 payments to date up to \$42,204, compared with \$55,236 by the same time in 1977.

No allocations were made to either Nazareth or Hart this month. Rebates to Hart for the year amount to \$4,297 compared with \$5,934 for the period last year. Nazareth has received \$3,268 in 1978, only slightly less than the \$3,318 to May of 1977.

Rebates reported to other cities in this area include Hale Center, \$1,088 to Earth, \$7,517 to Muleshoe, \$1,946 to \$4,595 to Littlefield, \$620 to Olton, \$4,085 to Tulia.



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

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

Total outstanding bonded indebtedness for the city is \$1,645,000, with \$110,000 in principal payments and \$97,900 in interest payments scheduled under this budget.

Total estimated property tax collections is \$289,005.

In other action, the commissioners approved a motion to suspend a proposed electrical rate change until Oct. 14, as advised in a letter from the Texas Municipal League.

Mayor Elmer Youts brought up a discussion on a "buy-back time" proposal on the necessary consolidation of the old firemen's pension plan with the new plan under S.B. 411. In a lump sum the proposal would involve \$40,392. The commissioners agreed to study all aspects of the proposal and possibly bring it to action at the special meeting called for Monday at 1 p.m. in the Mayor's office.

The special meeting is for the purpose of opening bids on the construction of four new tennis courts.

Several residents of East Halsell Street appeared before the commission to request the paving of three blocks of Halsell from NE 5th to NE 8th. They presented a petition bearing the signatures of most of the residents of the area. The commission agreed to obtain a per-foot estimate from city engineers McMorries and Associates and determine the cost to each resident so that they would know the cost involved and could sign an agreement rather than going through the six-month assessment procedure.

If you have not certified to your crop acreages, field by field, please do so as soon as possible but no later than Aug. 1.

We are required to make spot-checks; therefore, you are asked to make every effort to measure and certify your acres accurately. Measurement service is again available.

Failed wheat and barley acreage must be appraised by the county ASCS office prior to making other use of the land.

Set-Aside — Castro County has been approved for emergency grazing of 1978 set-aside until June 1.

Your set-aside acres may not be clean tilled, and must either be seeded to a suitable cover or have stalks or stubble from last year's crop provided

sufficient stubble remains to control wind and water erosion.

If you have any questions concerning your set-aside, please come by and visit with us.
