Boys game for third place will be at 5:30 p.m. Saturday, and girls will play for this spot at 6:45 p.m.

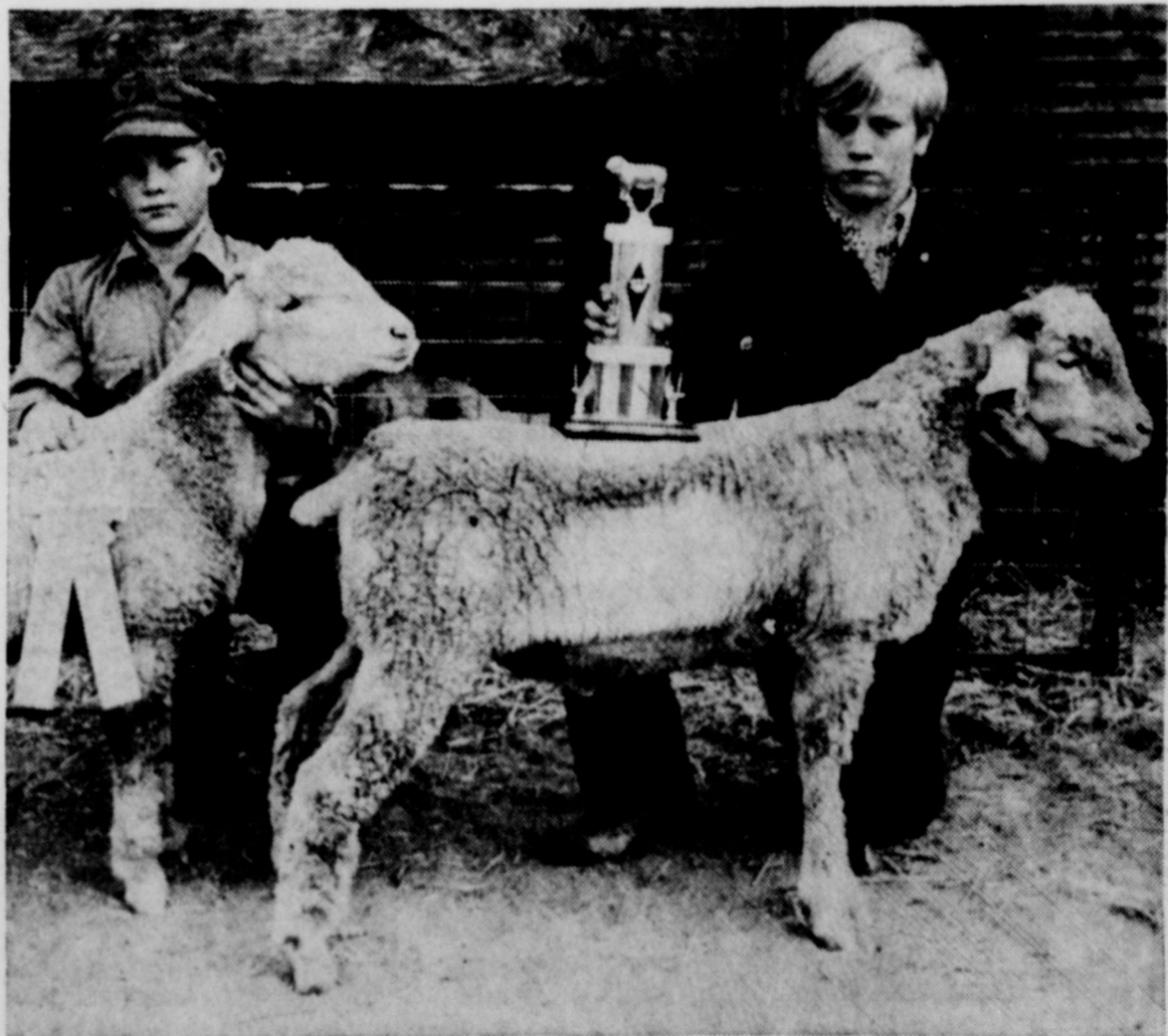
Championship finals for boys will be at 8 p.m. Saturday, followed by the girls championship game at 9:15 p.m.

Equalization Board Named

Bronte School board of trustees met Monday night and appointed a board of equalization for 1974. Named to the board were Edward Cumbie, C. E. Bruton and Bill Thomas, with James Allen to serve as alternate.

In other action the board:

- * Approved procedures for evaluating the school's professional personnel.

- * Accepted the resignation of Bill Luckett as a trustee because he is a candidate for commissioner of Precinct 2. The board decided to leave the resulting vacancy unfilled until April when a regular trustee election will be held.

- * Held a lengthy discussion on scheduling athletic, band and other activities in an effort to avoid conflicts.

- * Revised hiring policies to permit handling of the head coach's contract in March instead of February.

- * Received word that the five day allowable for dismissing school because of bad weather has been cancelled.

- * Voted to declare a holiday for the 1975 Coke County Livestock Show, since more and more local students are participating.

- * Noted that 17 pieces of used, unneeded classroom furniture has been donated to Divide School whose main building burned recently.

- * Approved a one year extension to the contract of Supt. C. B. Barbee.

- * Approved December bills.
