

Standard parts are all parts normally stocked and covers nearly all auto and pickup parts except engines, short blocks, cylinder heads, brake drums, transmissions and rear axle parts.

We will give a 25 per cent discount on all parts purchased by our customers over the counter for use by them in repairing personal cars and pickups. Again, there will be no discount unless the ticket is paid for at the time of delivery. We will not install any parts purchased in this manner in our shop. This discount is for customers who wish to do many of the minor jobs on their vehicles.

If you need terms longer than 30 days, please see your banker before ordering repairs on your car. Beginning January 1, all accounts past 30 days will be discounted to First National Bank in Bronte if they are good accounts, and turned over to our attorney for collection if they are not good.

This new policy will enable us to stay solvent, and do a better job servicing the people in our trade territory. Your cooperation will be appreciated in helping us serve you better.




